Celebration of Inquiry Conference scheduled for Feb. 16 to 18

Coastal will host its second Celebration of Inquiry, a university-wide academic conference designed to unite the learning community in cross-disciplinary discussion of a common theme, on Feb. 16 to 18.

This year's conference theme is "Truth, Beauty, and the Imagination in the Academy." Conference sessions will explore the role of imagination and the definition of truth in the various academic disciplines within the university.

Coastal students, faculty and staff as well as community leaders and educators from throughout the United States will offer 168 sessions on a wide range of topics. All conference sessions are free and open to the public. On Feb. 17 and 18 all Coastal classes will be re-directed to conference sessions. More than 160 Coastal students will be involved as presenters in the sessions which will include workshops, performances, panel discussions and lectures.

The conference will begin Wednesday, Feb. 16 at 5 p.m. in Wall Auditorium with an opening address by Anne Swanson, dean of the School of Natural Sciences at Sonoma State University in Calif., on the topic "The Power of Imagination in Seeking Truth and Shaping Lives."

In conjunction with the conference, "Film in 20 Zero Zero: A Symposium of Film in the Humanities" will take place Feb. 17 to 19. The symposium, which will explore and promote the various uses of film in the Humanities, will feature a number of filmmakers and film scholars, including Orlando Bagwell and Catherine Benamou.

On Friday, Feb. 18 at 12:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium, Coleman Barks of the University of Georgia will present "Birds Nesting Near the Coast: the Nature and Uses of Ecstatic Vision." Barks is best known for his translations of the 13th-century Sufi



Bach scores 40 points, named Big South Player of the Week

Alison

basketball
team, scored
40 points in
Coastal's 7868 victory at
Charleston
Southern on
Jan. 29.
During the



game, she hit nine 3-pointers and tallied a season-high nine rebounds and four assists. For her efforts, she was named the Big South Confernece Player of the Week.

Bach, a native of Morristown, Tenn., became only the second player in Coastal history and the first since the Chanticleers joined the NCAA Division I ranks (1986-87) to score 40 or more points in a single game. Her 40 points was the third best in league history and the second best in a conference game. Bach's nine 3-pointers set a school and conference record.

Against Charleston Southern as a team, the Chanticleers also set a school and conference record for 3-pointers made (15) and attempted (34).

Coastal students participate in Careers 2000 in Atlanta

Twenty-three students and several recent graduates from Coastal's E. Craig Wall Sr. School of Business Administration attended Careers 2000, an employment conference held in Atlanta on Jan. 17. More than 55 Fortune 500 companies interviewed students for openings with their companies. Thirteen Coastal students were granted second interviews. Four students have received offers for on-site interviews with companies participating in the conference.

This program is one part of the focus on career development that Coastal's chapter of the Society for the Advancement of Management (SAM) Club has adopted for the 1999-2000 academic year. Other events occurring as a part of the program have included: resume review sessions and cover letter writing seminars conducted by Tara Devers of Coastal's Career Management Services, a dress for success seminar with Belk Department Stores, and a business dining etiquette seminar in partnership with the Fowler Dining Room at Horry-Georgetown Technical College. Through its involvement in the national organization Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE), the club also is currently planning additional outreach activities to local high schools that build on the career development program.

Professor publishes Latin American history reference book

James D. Henderson, professor of international studies, is the principal author and general editor of a new reference book on Latin American history designed to serve as a definitive guide for scholars and students. A Reference Guide to Latin American History, co-written with Helen Delpar of the University of Alabama and Maurice P. Brungardt of Loyola University of New Orleans, was published in January 2000 by M. E. Sharpe Publishers of New York.

"The book was inspired by the one-volume reference to United States history, *Encyclopedia of American History* by Richard B. Morris, published in 1953," said Henderson. "I decided to write the book in 1970, but was unable to get started on it until 1996."

The 615-page book is divided into three sections: a chronological survey of

key events from pre-Columbian times to the present; a topical section devoted to major social, political, economic and cultural themes; and a section of biographical essays on the 300 most notable figures in Latin American history. The book includes 35 maps.

Richard Weldon, director of Distance Education and External Services for the Wall School of Business, is the book's technical editor.

Henderson joined the Coastal faculty in 1986. He earned a bachelor's degree in history from Centenary College of Louisiana, a master's degree in history from the University of Arizona, and a Ph.D. in Latin American history from Texas Christian University. Before coming to Coastal, Henderson was a faculty member at Grambling State University in Louisiana. He has been a Fulbright

Scholar and has written numerous books and scholarly articles on Latin American history and culture.

Orlando Bagwell to speak Feb. 18

Orlando Bagwell, an award-winning veteran filmmaker, will speak at Coastal on Thursday, Feb. 18 at 7 p.m. in Wall Auditorium. A major participant in Coastal's "Film in 20 Zero Zero: A Symposium on Film in the Humanities" scheduled for Feb. 17 to 19, Bagwell will present "A filmmaker's personal exploration of race in America," The event is free and open to the public.

Bagwell is executive producer of Africans in America: America's Journey through Slavery, the acclaimed six-hour PBS series which was first broadcast in

1998. He is founder and president of ROJA Productions, a Boston-based independent film and television production company. He produced and directed Frederick Douglass: When the Lion Wrote History which aired on PBS, and co-produced the critically acclaimed feature-length documentary Malcolm X: Make It Plain for PBS's "The American Experience."

He is creator of the Civil Rights Video Wall, a permanent exhibit for the Simon Wiesenthal Center's Museum of Tolerance. Bagwell also produced and directed *New Worlds, New Forms* for the international series *Dancing*, for which he received an Emmy nomination. As executive vice president for Blackside, Inc., he supervised the production of the PBS series *The Great Depression* and produced two segments of the celebrated PBS documentary *Eyes On The Prize*. Both films were awarded the Columbia School of Journalism's Alfred E. duPont Award and the Peabody Award.

Theme for the 2001 Celebration of Inquiry Conference

Celebration of Inquiry: Seeing the World Anew

"No problem can ever be solved by the consciousness that created it.

We must learn to see the world anew." -- Einstein

Our aim is to choose a theme for each Celebration of Inquiry conference that will hold promise for discussion across all disciplines. The 2001 theme, "Seeing the World Anew," invites participants to look at issues including the following:

- What has happened in the past in each of our disciplines as a result of seeing the world anew?
- What are the theories, technologies, and connections that have/have helped us to see the world anew?
- What are the problems that have been solved and the discoveries that have been made by seeing the world anew?
- What are the problems we face that seem to call for seeing the world anew?

"Seeing the world anew" has resulted in systems thinking (especially in science and business), paradigm shifts, a discussion of multiple intelligences, and a recognition that there are diverse ways of knowing.

Current problems call for solutions that may require seeing the world anew. Some examples are lessons from the Holocaust, racism, gender issues, and environmental issues.

Multiple views of the same topic could show how each group has seen the world anew. Some possibilities include multiple views of the way to organize a government/to govern/to lead, multiple views of religion/God/creation, and multiple views of the human experience.

How do we see the world anew? What helps us break out of our boxes? We get different insights from different kinds of research. We combine insights from more than one discipline to see something in a new way. Poets help us see the world anew. Multiple versions of a "classic" drama help us see the work and the world it represents anew. Multiculturalism lets us see the world through a variety of cultural lenses.
