## Franken named dean of the School of Humanities and Fine Arts

Lynn Franken has been named dean of the School of Humanities and Fine Arts and professor of English at Coastal, effective July 1, 2000. She will be responsible for all administrative aspects of the school, which comprises nine departments and has 65 full-time faculty members.

Franken comes to Coastal from Butler University in Indianapolis, Ind., where she has served as chair of the Department of English since 1994. She also served as associate dean of Butler's College of Liberal Arts and Sciences from 1992 to 1994. Franken earned a bachelor's degree and a master's degree in English from Texas Tech University and a Ph.D. in English from the University of Texas at Austin.

During her tenure as chair of Butler's English Department, the number of majors has doubled and the curriculum has been expanded to include new approaches to teaching in the Humanities, particularly regarding freshman English and writing courses.

In addition to her teaching and administrative duties, Franken serves on the Education and Programming Committee of the Indianapolis Opera board, where she has been an effective advocate for linkages between academic learning and the performing arts. She has published numerous articles in scholarly journals and presents regularly at academic conferences.

"Lynn Franken will bring a variety of experiences to the position, both as an administrator and as a teacher-scholar," said John Idoux, provost and vice president for Academic Affairs at Coastal.

"She will help to build on the excellent base which has already been established and will guide the progress of the school as it moves into its new home, the Humanities and Fine Arts Building which is now under construction."

More than 100 applicants applied for the position of dean. Final candidates were recommended to Idoux by a search committee consisting of faculty from each department in the school and chaired by Jack Riley, associate professor of politics at Coastal.

Departments within the School of Humanities and Fine Arts which report

to the dean are: art, English, foreign languages, history, music, philosophy and religion, politics and geography and theater. The Waccamaw Center for Cultural and Historical Studies also reports to the dean.

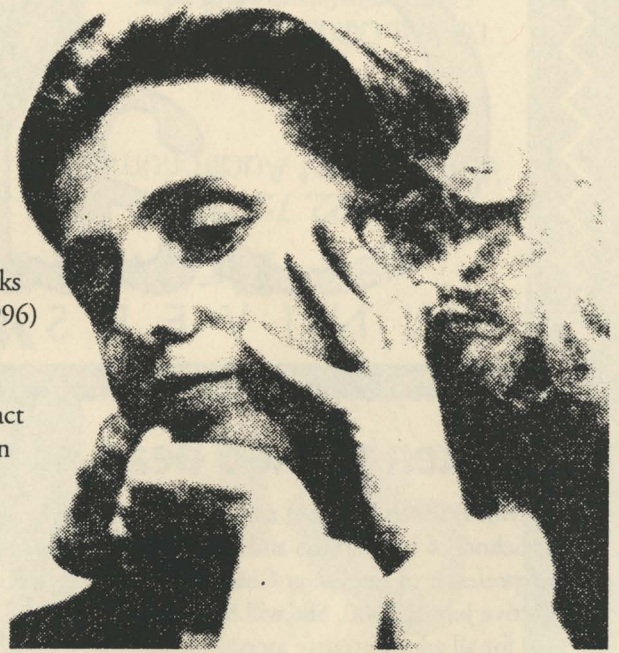
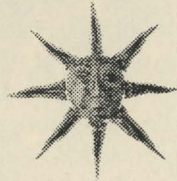
## Leading Latin American writer to speak at Coastal

Elena Poniatowska, a leading Latin American writer, will speak at Coastal on Friday, March 10 at 10:30 a.m. in Wall Auditorium. The event is free and open to the public. Poniatowska's appearance is in conjunction with the 47th Annual Conference of the Southeastern Council on Latin American Studies (SECOLAS), which is scheduled for March 9 to 11 at the Myrtle Beach Martinique Resort Hotel.

Poniatowska is internationally famous for emphasizing the role of women and the voiceless in Mexican society. She has written novels, short stories, essays, biographies and has also produced short films. Her published work has been translated into 10 languages. Her ingenious use of

journalism techniques revolutionized Latin American literature in the late 1960s. She has received journalism and literary awards in Mexico and around the world. Her most recent works includes *Paseo de la Reforma* (1996) and *Juan Soriano, niño de mil años* (1998).

## Coastal inducts four into Athletics Hall of Fame

Four former Chanticleers were inducted into Coastal's Athletics Hall of Fame during halftime of Coastal's men's basketball game against Charleston Southern University Saturday, Feb. 26 in Kimbel Arena. Those honored were Mark Clemons, Claud Huggins, Matt Logue and Michelle Minton.

Clemons, a native of Cumberland, Md., was a pitcher on the Chanticleer baseball team from 1981 to 1983. He still ranks second all-time at Coastal with a 2.61 career ERA and 234 strikeouts. He also ranks third with 28 career victories. Clemons also helped the Chanticleers to

back-to-back NAIA World Series appearances in 1982 and 1983.

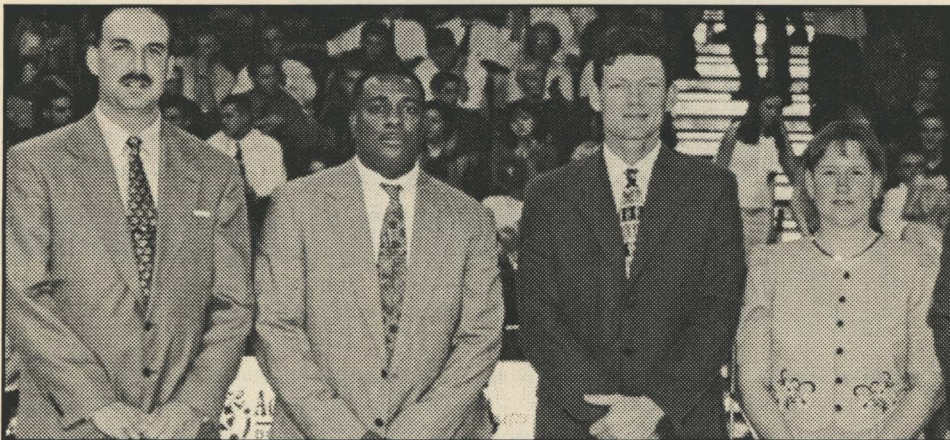
Huggins, a native of Mandeville, Jamaica, was a member of the Chanticleers men's soccer program from 1985 to 1988. He was a three-time member of the Big South All-Conference Team and was selected to the 1986 NCAA All-Region Team. He still ranks sixth all-time at Coastal with 93 career points as he recorded 34 goals and 35 assists. After starting 82 games in four seasons at Coastal, Huggins went on to play professionally in England.

Logue, a native of Ellerslie, Md., was

a standout relief pitcher for the Chanticleers from 1986 to 1989 and has more appearances than any other pitcher in Coastal history. His Coastal and Big South Conference record of 28 career saves still stands today. Logue helped the Chanticleers win two regular season Big South Conference Championships and a pair of Big South Tournament titles.

Minton, a native of Walterboro, S.C., was a two-sport standout while at Coastal. From 1991 to 1994, she starred in both basketball and softball. It was on the softball field where she left her mark as a three-time NCAA All-South Region selection, a four-time Big South All-Conference member and a three-time Big South All-Tournament honoree. Minton helped Coastal's softball program post a 159-75 overall record and an amazing 36-5 record against Big South Conference teams during her career. In the NCAA Division I Softball record book, she is listed in several categories, including third in career batting average at .458, third in hits with 308 and third in career runs with 194.

Coastal has 26 members in its Athletics Hall of Fame.

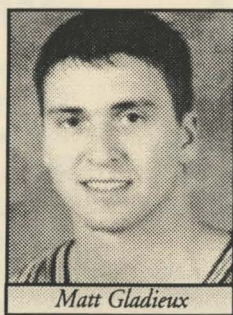


Hall of Fame inductees Matt Logue, Claud Huggins, Mark Clemons and Michelle Minton

# Matt Gladieux named to GTE Academic All-District Team

Coastal senior guard Matt Gladieux has been selected to the GTE Academic All-District III Basketball Team. The GTE Academic All-District teams and GTE Academic All-America Team are voted on by the College Sports Information Director's of America.

Gladieux, a native of Rossford, Ohio, is the lone senior selected to the squad. He is joined by Shane Battier, a junior from Duke University; Colin Ducharme, a junior from University of Virginia; Nathan Jameson, a junior from UNC

Greensboro; and Joseph Lumpkin, a junior from the College of Charleston.

Gladieux is a proven student-athlete. As a business finance major, he carries a 3.429 grade point average, while on the basketball court he leads Coastal in scoring (17.0), rebounding (3.8), assists (2.6) and steals (1.9).

District III is made up of all NCAA Division I schools in Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina and Virginia. To be eligible for GTE Academic All-District recognition, a student-athlete must have a cumulative

grade point average of 3.2 or higher. These players are now eligible for the national GTE Academic All-American Team, which will be announced March 14.

## DUI: A Powerful Lesson



Mark Sterner, who was involved in an impaired driving car crash that left three of his friends dead, will present a pre-spring break program on drinking and driving Thursday, March 9 at 6 p.m. in Coastal's Wheelwright Auditorium. The Coastal community is encouraged to attend.

Sterner, the driver of the car, has spoken to more than 300,000 high school and college students about how his life has drastically changed since the accident. Although he was the least intoxicated of the group, he ended up with three felony convictions and spent three years in jail.

During his presentation, Sterner wears his orange prison uniform and shows a video the group made during the night of the crash. Images of laughing college students driving from bar to bar, downing shots of alcohol and dancing are followed by still photos of the car after the crash.

## CCU to sponsor communication workshop

Howard Rankin, author and clinical psychologist, will lead the workshop, "The Art of Effective Communication," Friday, March 17 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at The Breakers Resort Hotel in Myrtle Beach. The fee is \$159 (includes lunch). If more than three people from one business or organization attend the workshop, the fourth will be admitted free. The workshop is sponsored by Coastal's Division of Extended Learning and Public Services.

The workshop will teach the principles of good communication including the essentials of listening as well as verbal and non-verbal behaviors that establish symmetry, a key communication tool. Participants will learn the six keys to effective influence and the implications for the design and delivery of effective messages.

Rankin has appeared on CNN and his work has been featured on ABC's "20/20." He has been in private practice for more than 25 years and holds master's and doctoral degrees from the University of London. Rankin has held academic appointments at the University of London, Oxford University and the University of South Carolina, where he is an adjunct professor in the School of Public Health.

Rankin has published more than 50 scientific papers on addictions and eating

disorders and for 10 years was the editor of the scientific journal *Addictive Behaviors*. In his clinical practice he was chief of the eating disorders unit at St. Andrews Hospital in Northampton, England. His private practice focuses on relationships, eating disorders, stress, depression and trauma. Rankin is founder and director of the Carolina Wellness Retreat, a lifestyle change program at the Crowne Plaza Resort on Hilton Head Island and The Master Communicators Institute, an educational and consulting agency. His books include *Seven Steps to Wellness*, *Ten Steps to a Great Relationship*, and *Power Talk: The Art of Effective Communication*.

## Coastal's SIFE Team helps Students

During the week of February 6 to 12, the Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) Team from Coastal's Wall School of Business worked with students at Carolina Forest Elementary School and Myrtle Beach Middle School to gain an understanding of career opportunities on the Grand Strand as part of SIFE's Teach a Child About Business Week.

Developed by SIFE as a special competition, Teach a Child About Business Week encourages college SIFE teams to develop projects for children grades K-9 that further their comprehension of the free enterprise system by increasing their awareness of how businesses operate, responsible consumerism, professional opportunities, and how business impacts our daily lives.

SIFE is a non-profit organization that works in partnership with business and higher education to help students take what they are learning in the classroom and apply it in real working situations.

Coastal's SIFE team worked closely with Horry County Schools to develop two special projects for the week. A

poster design contest was sponsored in the art classes led by first, second and fourth graders at Carolina Forest Elementary School with the theme "Great Jobs on the Grand Strand in 2010: Perceptions of Horry County Elementary Schoolchildren." Ninety-eight students participated. These posters were also displayed in the Wall School of Business during the Celebration of Inquiry festivities held from February 16 to 18.

The second project involved working with 87 sixth and seventh graders in career classes at Myrtle Beach Middle School to identify outstanding career opportunities and the paths that students need to follow to get into those careers. Students were invited to participate in pre- and post-tests and a training session structured like the game show, "Who Wants To Be A Millionaire?," with questions built on issues relating to career opportunities on the Grand Strand.

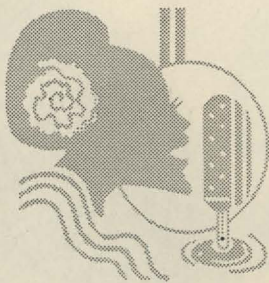
