SENATORS WORK TO RESTORE COASTAL BUDGET: OFFER AMENDMENT

Members of the S.C. Senate from Coastal's service area are working this week to restore funds reduced from Coastal's budget by the Senate Finance Committee. The S.C. House recently passed the 1979-80 State Appropriations Bill which included \$82-million for the USC system.

The Senate Finance Committee later cut more than \$4-million from the USC budget, reducing Coastal Carolina's budget from \$4,174,236 to \$3,211,721—a reduction of \$958,000.

Senators from the Waccamaw and Pee Dee areas are sponsoring an amendment to restore Coastal's full budget to the state appropriations bill. Authoring the bill are Sen. Ralph Ellis (D-Horry), Sen. Johnny Waller (D-Marion), Sen. Bill Doar, Jr. (D-Georgetown), Sen. Frank McGill (D-Williamsburg), Sen. Ed Saleeby (D-Darlington), Sen. Tom Smith (D-Florence), and Sen. Gene Carmichael (D-Dillon).

Members of Coastal Carolina's administration joined USC officials at a luncheon for members of the Senate in Columbia Tuesday, urging the lawmakers to restore the USC budget.

"We're going to really have to sell this to the Senate," says Sen. Ralph Ellis, "but I think we can get back at least part of Coastal's deletion, if not all of it."

LADY CHANTS SIGN STARS

Two female basketball standouts have been signed by Coastal Coach Steve Taylor to play for the Lady Chants next Season. Taylor's two latest recruits are Sherry Barnhill, a former center with Aynor High School and Denis Dayberry, a star player for Maudlin High School. Taylor says the two recruits will be valuable additions to his team.

TEACHER ED PROGRAM GETS TOP RATING

Coastal Carolina's Teacher Education Program has received a record accreditation evaluation from the South Carolina Department of Education. The program received a "perfect" rating—the best rating awarded by the Department of Education in its six years of evaluating teacher education programs at South Carolina colleges.

Program director Dr. Jim Rex says credit goes to Coastal's faculty and to cooperation from local school district personnel and teachers. "We are extremely pleased," he says, "to have received this resounding approval of the approach being utilized at Coastal Carolina College."

SUN-NEWS OFFER COASTAL COURSE

The Sun-News and Coastal Carolina College are jointly offering an accredited course in marine science entitled *Oceans and Man*. The course work will be printed in regular installments in the Sun-News for the next eight weeks. CREDIT UNION LENDING AT 8.4%

Professor of Business Administration Dr. Lou Gilles says some loans are available at premium rates through the USC Credit Union and the MBAFB Credit Union.

"If you have shares in the USC Credit Union and need some money," he says, "you will lose the entire semiannual dividend (June 30) if you withdraw from your share account now. However, you can borrow against your shares at a per annum rate of 8.4%. The USC Credit Union IS making share loans."

"Also, as an employee of Coastal Carolina College, you are eligible to join the MBAFB Credit Union, which has 12% new car loans and 10.8% 30-year first mortgage loans."
