

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2000 Coastal Economic Conference to be held April 6

The 2000 Coastal Economic Conference will be held April 6 from 2 to 5 p.m. in Coastal's Wall Auditorium. The conference topic will be "The Past, Present and Future of Doing Business on the Grand Strand." The event is free and open to the public. Participants may pre-register by calling the Wall School of Business at 349-2071.

The four-member panel includes: Maxine Clark, chief executive for The Build-A-Bear Workshop of St. Louis; Brad Dean, chief financial officer, Myrtle Beach Area Chamber of Commerce; Thomas Secrest, director, Center for Economic and Community Development, Coastal Carolina University; and Chuck Tremel, real estate manager, The Home Depot, Atlanta.

Clark is considered one of the pioneers of America's retail industry. As president of Payless Shoe Source from 1992 to 1996 she developed the shoe retailer into the world's number-one seller of licensed children's footwear. Since 1996 she has focused her talents on launching Build-A-Bear Workshop, a teddy bear-themed store which allows children to create their own bears on an interactive assembly line.

Dean's background includes working with General Electric, where he worked his way to the position of controller for a \$60 million manufacturing operation. He was also employed with Rank Organization as a senior financial analyst and worked closely with its Hard Rock Cafe division. In 1995 he assisted with the financial analysis of several potential markets for new Hard Rock Cafes and was later named general manager of the Myrtle Beach operation. He currently serves as chief financial officer of the Myrtle Beach Area Chamber of Commerce. Secrest is an assistant professor of economics and director of the Center for Economic and Community Development at Coastal. The center is a bridge between Coastal and the community, providing faculty and students with

opportunities to conduct applied research for local business and government agencies. Secrest's research interests include the study of options, derivative securities, fixed income investments, market micro-structure, and bank management. Tremel, a former real estate agent, is

employed by The Home Depot and is responsible for real

> estate growth in the Carolinas.

During his career, Tremel, a graduate of Indiana University, has sold both residential and commercial properties.

Coastal's Women's Cross Country Named Academic All-American Team

For the fourth consecutive year, Coastal's women's cross country team has been named an Academic All-American Team by the Women's Intercollegiate Cross Country Coaches Association. This year, the Lady Chanticleers made the list "With Distinction" as the student-athletes on the squad combined for a 3.54 grade point average.

Coastal's 3.54 grade point average ranked seventh nationally out of the 317 institutions which sponsor NCAA Division I women's cross country. The top-10 programs were: Belmont (3.78), Southwest Missouri State (3.77), Nebraska (3.68), Western Michigan (3.66), Northern Arizona (3.60), Xavier (Ohio) (3.57), Coastal Carolina (3.54), Duquesne (3.53), Butler (3.52) and Minnesota (3.52).

A program must have at least a 3.00 grade point average to be named an Academic All-American Team and must maintain at least a 3.25 GPA to receive the honor "With Distinction."

Coastal Carolina Theater Production stages Schedule of Classes Dario Fo farce Can't Pay? Won't Pay!

Grand Strand theatergoers have a rare opportunity to experience the unusual comic mind of Nobel Prizewinning Italian playwright Dario Fo thanks to the Coastal Carolina University Theater production of Can't Pay? Won't Pay!, scheduled for Friday, April 14 and Saturday, April 15 at 7:30 p.m.; and on Sunday, April 16 at 3 p.m. Tickets are \$10; \$5 for students under age 18. Coastal students, faculty and staff admitted free with Coastal I.D.

Fo's approach to theater is a unique combination of comedic improvisation and radical politics. Born in 1926 in rural Italy, Fo was fascinated as a child by the troupes of itinerant actors who roamed the countryside performing skits which lampooned the ruling classes - a centuries-old tradition of anti-authoritarian protest. Adapting this tradition to the modern stage, Fo's plays poke irreverent fun at the social and religious platitudes of the establishment.

Although Fo, who received the 1997

Nobel Prize for Literature, is immensely popular in Italy and Europe, his work is seldom produced in America. An unreconstructed Marxist, Fo relentlessly attacks the rich and powerful and extols the working class. As a result of his uncompromising stance, vividly communicated through his plays, Fo has been arrested, sued for slander and blasphemy, and threatened with murder by political enemies. In 1973, his wife, left-wing politician Franca Rame, was kidnapped and raped by neo-fascists.

Can't Pay? Won't Pay!, like all of Fo's plays, has an open-ended structure which invites performers to add topical material from their own place and time," says David Millard, director of the production. As a nod toward Fo's own method of inserting vaudeville and circus elements such as mimes, magic and juggling into his work, the Coastal production will offer karaoke before and after the show, according to Millard.

Noted Country Music historian to speak

Bill C. Malone, author of *Country Music U.S.A.* and America's leading historian of country music, will speak at Coastal on Monday, April 10 at 7:30 p.m. in the E. Craig Wall School of Business 308. The event is free and open to the public.

The presentation, sponsored by the Waccamaw Center for Cultural and Historical Studies, is titled "Take This Job and Shove It: Country Music and Southern Workers."

"Malone is an eloquent writer and speaker," said Charles Joyner, director of the Waccamaw Center. "He is a fine singer and musician, too, who often seasons his presentations with performances of the songs he discusses. This time he says he is going to sing the entire lecture, not just the particular songs that illustrate his points."

Malone was born into an east Texas tenant farm family, whose members included a singer in the Pentecostal gospel tradition, a former square-dance caller, and several guitar players. An accomplished singer and guitarist himself, he as appeared on SCETV's "The American South Comes of Age." Malone, along with his mandolin-playing wife, Bobbie, led a country music band in New Orleans.

Among his other books on country music are Stars of the Grand Ole Opry, Southern Music/American Music, and Singing Cowboys and Musical Mountaineers.

Malone earned his Ph.D. in history at the University of Texas and taught for many years at Tulane University, where he is professor emeritus. This year he is a fellow of the Center for Documentary Studies at Duke University.


a fund-raising event for the Children's Miracle Network benefiting McLeod Children's Hospital in Florence, S.C.


