## COASTAL BUDGET REMAINS IN COMMITTEE: SENATORS HOPE TO RESTORE AT LEAST 80%

Coastal Carolina's \$4.1 million budget remains in a joint House-Senate Conference Committee this week. The committee is trying to create a compromise version of the 1979 State Appropriations Bill, which was significantly amended by the Senate last month.

Coastal's budget was cut by more than \$1 million in the Senate Finance Committee and in the full senate. Now three members from each legislative body are trying to develop a compromise budget favorable to House and Senate members.

Senior Senator Rembert Dennis (D-Berkeley), an influential member of the Conference Committee says he expects most of USC's budget to be restored, including most of Coastal's budget.

"Coastal should receive at least 80% of the budget approved by the House," Dennis says. "I don't think there's any question about that. We're actually going to try to restore everything that was taken out by the Senate Finance Committee, although we might have to compromise a little somewhere along the way."

Coastal supporters in the House and Senate say the committee should reach a compromise in the next two weeks.

## ARCHAEOLOGY FIND ON DISPLAY IN KIMBEL

Artifacts uncovered during a recent dig by Coastal's Archaeological Research Program are now on display in Kimbel Library. Directed by Dr. Reinhold Engelmayer, the student archaeologists excavated the site of a settlement of the Woodland Period (400-800 A.D.) on Mossy Ridge near the Dolphus M. Grainger Steam Plant on highway 501. More than 800 artifacts were recovered and will eventually be donated to the proposed Horry County Museum.

## PAID NOW, TEACH LATER

Coastal professors teaching in summer sessions will be paid on three dates, according to Dr. Lou Gillis, spokesman for the Faculty Welfare Committee.

"Those who are teaching the first session and those who taught during the May Semester will get their first paycheck on Tuesday, July 10," Lou explains.

"This check will be limited to 15% of the instructor's nine-month salary, so if someone taught May Semester and two courses in Summer II, thus earning 22½%, they'll have 7½% of their pay deferred until Second Session.

"During Second Session, instructors will get half of their pay on July 31 and the other half will be paid on August 15. No funds will be withheld for insurance payments in the summer, although taxes and retirement funds will be withheld."
