Message from the Chancellor

Welcome back to faculty and staff who have been away from campus during the summer. One of the real pleasures of working in higher education is that every year we start fresh with new ideas and new visions.

This year, thanks to the hard work of staff and faculty, our enrollment is up, and we have an increase in the number of fulltime students. Headcount is up one percent to 4,023 students, but more important to our fiscal situation, FTE enrollment is up 3.4 percent to 3,454.73.

The new freshman class increased by 6.4 percent to 635. The average SAT score is 863, an increase of 13 points, and 16 percent of our new freshman scored over 1,000.

As most of you have heard, the downside for the coming year is our budget situation. The South Carolina Supreme Court overturned the Budget and Control Board's initial plan which called for reductions based on each state agency's increase last year. The resulting 4 percent, across-theboard cut will double Coastal's total budget reduction to more than \$400,000.

At this point, no jobs will be lost at Coastal. However, to meet this deficit, we must undergo serious fiscal belt-tightening. We will postpone filling vacant positions when possible, we will eliminate equipment purchases, and we will cut back on travel. I ask that each of you scrutinize travel expenditures and find less costly alternatives. I also ask that everyone cooperate in reducing long distance telephone charges and cutting back on supply purchases. If each of us makes appropriate reductions, we will weather this budget crisis. I want to stress that we will do everything possible to avoid a mid-year tuition increase, because our students should not bear the brunt of the budget shortfall.

Financial concerns aside, we are beginning what promises to be one of the most exciting years in Coastal's history. I hope each of you will share my enthusiasm as we plan and work toward a bright future for our institution.

First Annual Conference For Women offered via satellite

Coastal is offering the live videoconference "First Annual Conference For Women" on Wednesday, Oct. 14 from 1 to 3 p.m. in GCEC 003. The videoconference is \$15 and includes lunch, which will be served at 12:30 p.m. Faculty and staff will be admitted free; students will be admitted for \$5.

"First Annual Conference For Women" will address how women in the workplace can develop skills and strategies they need to improve their leadership, visibility and effectiveness in their organizations. Ann Morrisson, co-author of *Breaking the Glass*, and Juanita Hinshaw, vice president and treasurer of Monsato Company, will talk candidly about professional development for women. Key topics of the videoconference include: moving successfully from manager to leader, how to develop your professional leadership plan, and building credibility to reinforce your authority.

The program will consist of presentations, panel discussion, pretaped role plays with professional actors, and nearly 40 minutes of telephone questions and answers between the viewing audience and panelists via an 800 number.

Third Quarter program gears up for semester

Coastal Carolina College invites those age 55 or older to enroll in Third Quarter, an academic and cultural program for older students.

The fall 1992 session begins Monday, Oct. 5 and continues through Thursday, Dec. 10; each course meets once a week, excluding Thanksgiving week. No educational prerequisites are required for participation in Third Quarter.

Developed through Graduate and Continuing Education, Third Quarter is supported through a membership fee that covers the cost of courses; a campus parking decal; Coastal identification and student privileges; use of Kimbel Library; and discounts on the purchase of the Wheelwright Passport, the college's cultural arts package.

Course offerings include:

• Gender Wars: The Male and Female in Literature and Language. Address the use of stereotypes and social reactions to gender in novels by Jack London, Eudora Welty, Ernest Hemingway, and more. The class meets Mondays from 1 to 2:30 p.m. Instructor: John Beard.

• History and Culture of Eastern
Europe and the CIS: The
Contemporary Period. This course will
review the history, culture, religion and
people of the new states of Eastern Europe
and the Commonwealth of Independent
States from the end of World War II to the
present. Also included will be discussion
of Soviet expansion and domination of
Eastern Europe after 1945 and the fall and
collapse of the Communist system. The
class meets Mondays from 3 to 4:30 p.m.
Instructor: James Farsolas.

• Current Events: Election '92. In this year of elections, this course will examine such topics as the electoral process, party issues and specific idiosyncrasies of the 1992 elections. The class meets Tuesdays from 1 to 2:30 p.m. Instructor: Paul Peterson.

• Introduction to the Great Books.
Students in this course will encounter ideas

in literature, philosophy, history and psychology and will learn to interpret them. The class meets Tuesdays from 3 to 4:30 p.m. Instructor: Jack Riley.

• Horry County Outback. This course will blend geography, history, biography and oral history interviews to introduce the sometimes remote and interesting places that make-up Horry County. The class meets Wednesdays from 1 to 2:30 p.m. Instructor: Catherine Lewis.

• Medicine In Cultural Context. This course examines the complex relationship between history and medicine by focusing on topics from antiquity through the 19th century, including Hippocratic medicine, the Black Death, the growth of modern surgery, and more. The class meets Wednesdays from 3 to 4:30 p.m. Instructor: Brian Nance.

• American Short Stories. This course will explore a wide range of short stories including works by Edgar Allan Poe, Nathaniel Hawthorne, Herman Melville, Mark Twain, William Faulker, Ernest Hemingway, Flannery O'Connor, and more. The class meets Thursdays from 1 to 2:30 p.m. Instructor: Virginia Cremen-Rudd.

• Creative Writing: The Narrative.

Designed for beginning as well as advanced writers, this course will deal with character, conflict, and atmosphere in writing. Participants will publish an anthology of their writings. The class meets Thursdays from 3 to 4:30 p.m.

Instructor: Susan Meyers.

For one or two classes, the fee is \$35 per course. One person may take up to four courses for \$100. If you have a friend, spouse or neighbor interested in joining Third Quarter, the two of you make take four courses each for \$150 (\$75 per person).

Registration continues through the first week of classes in the Graduate and Continuing Education Office.

Coastal receives flag from MBAFB

As one of his last official orders of business in the community, Col. Richard H. McDow, Commander of the 354th Fighter Wing of Myrtle Beach Air Force Base, presented a United States Flag, which had flown at the base, to Coastal Carolina College. Chancellor Ingle accepted the flag during a flag-raising ceremony held Friday, Sept. 18 on the Horseshoe on campus.

The flag presentation was a symbolic gesture signifying the 38-year relationship between the college and the base. According to Ingle, the base and the college have served together as partners in the community and both have been among the areas largest employers. That relationship became official in 1968 when the USC System began offering college courses, taught by Coastal faculty, at the base. In 1978, Coastal took over the program and it continued through the

Native American-Catholic sister to address spirituality, discovery of America

Sister Jose Hobday, Native American and member of the Order of St. Francis of Assisi, will speak Wednesday, Sept. 23 at 7 p.m. in the Brookgreen Gardens Education Center. Brookgreen Gardens is located on Highway 17 in Murrells Inlet. Hobday's lecture, "One Native American's View of Columbus and the Quincentennial," will address the earth-centered traditions of Native Americans and the Catholic church and the significance of Columbus' arrival in America. The lecture is free and open to the public.

The lecture is the third in a series called the Homeland Lectures and Dialogues. Co-sponsored by Aynor-based Blackwater Partnership of Horry County and Coastal Carolina College, the series is addressed to citizens of the Waccamaw Neck, Pee Dee, and Grand Strand regions.

Hobday is a Native American of Seneca Iroquois descent on her mother's side and Seminole from her father. She also is member of the Order of Sisters of St. Francis of Assisi. Hobday is a staff member at the Matthew Fox Institute for Culture and Creation Spirituality in Oakland, Calif.

Hobday has a master's degree in American literature and has completed additional graduate studies in theology, Native American literature, and architecture and engineering at such institutions as the University of North Colorado, Notre Dame University, and UCLA. She has taught at secondary and university levels at institutions including the Native American Culture Center at UCLA. She also has conducted ministries and has lived and worked with the Sioux and Assiniboine tribes of Montana and the Papago tribe of Arizona.

The forum will be moderated by Paul Gayes. The panel will accept questions from the public.

Grant information available on network

The Office of Grants and Sponsored Research has established a new source of funding information available to faculty and staff who are on the campus Local Area Network (LAN). Currently, information about funding sources with deadlines through December, 1992 is located in a series of ASCII files that can be viewed using any editor or word processor. Please note that you cannot edit them unless you copy them first to your private directory or local disk drive. A simple "viewer" program is also located with the files if you want to quickly browse through them. To use the viewer enter the command SHOWME <filename.ext>.

To access these files you must first log onto the LAN, change to either your F or G drive and then change to the GRANTS directory by issuing the command "CD\PUBLIC\GRANTS". If you plan on using your word processor, you may want to start it before changing to this drive and directory. When you finish, you will probably want to change back to your original directory.

File titles are descriptive of the types of grant information they contain. For example, FINEARTS.SEP contains information on the fine arts (including the performing arts.) Currently all files have the extension ".SEP"; files will be updated

monthly and the extension changed to indicate the starting month. Files for the following disciplines are currently available: FINEARTS (fine arts). HUMANITI (humanities), SCI MATH (science, math and Engineering), SPC_SCIE (social sciences), EDUCATIO (education), INTERNAT (international programs), HEALTH (health-related programs), and UNRESTRI (unrestricted.) In addition to these disciplines there are also files containing general information on fellowships (FELLOWSH), equipment grants (EQUIPMEN) and grants for buildings (BUILDIN). Furthermore, more specialized files also can be produced. Currently four such files are: DIVERSIT (diversity and multicultural education), ENVIROM (environmental research and education), DRUG_ALC (drug and alcohol research and education) and AGING (research and education on aging and the elderly). Other specialized files can be produced on a regular basis. In addition to the files listing the funding opportunities, there may be other text files (those with extension .TXT) that contain more detailed descriptions of program opportunities and tips on grantspersonship.
