Barr steps down as dean of Coastal's Wall College of Business

Peter B. Barr will step down as dean of Coastal's E. Craig Wall Sr. College Business Administration, effective Dec. 8, to take a new position with

Burroughs & Chapin Company, Inc., of Myrtle Beach. A national search for a new dean will begin immediately and an interim dean will be announced soon, according to Coastal President Ronald R. Ingle.

"Pete Barr has led Coastal's Wall College of Business through a period of significant development and achievement," said Ingle. "His leadership, integrity and dedication to excellence have helped place the Wall College in the top tier of business programs in the country."

Barr has served as dean of the Wall College of Business since July 1, 1992, and has been a member of Coastal's faculty since 1987. During his tenure, the Wall College of Business earned national accreditation and developed many innovative new academic programs.

Barr was a driving force in the process of accreditation. In June 1998, the Wall College of Business was officially accredited by the AACSB-The Association International Management Education. Only the top 25 percent of the more than 1,200 colleges and universities in the nation offering undergraduate business degrees

earn AACSB accreditation.

Academic programs which have been established at Coastal under Barr's leadership include the Resort Tourism Management program, which prepares students for management-level positions in the hospitality industry, and the Professional Golf Management program, which earned national accreditation Professional Golfers' Association of America (PGA) in 1998. Barr took a leadership role in establishing a unique international cooperative program with the Autonomous University in Barcelona, Spain, in connection with Coastal's golf and tourism programs. The Wall Fellows program, a rigorous leadership training program for Coastal's top business students, also was developed during his tenure.

While he was a professor of business administration, Barr was instrumental in the establishment of Coastal's Center for Economic and Community Development and became the center's first director in 1989. The center functions as a bridge between the university and the community, providing technical and applied research and consulting for individuals, businesses and governmental entities throughout the region.

Resort Tourism Program names Board of Advisers

A Board of Advisers has been estabfor the Resort Tourism Management (RTM) program at Coastal. The board, which consists of local, regional, national and international leaders, recently held its first meeting on Coastal's campus. Initially, the board is scheduled to meet twice yearly.

"The board will provide a bridge between the academic environment and the real world," said Peter Barr, dean of Coastal's E. Craig Wall Sr. College of Business Administration, which administers the RTM program. "They will consult with the university on curriculum, recruitment and development matters of the program. These selected industry experts have great knowledge of the tourism industry and will be tremendous assets to our program."

Students in Coastal's RTM program take specialized courses in the areas of marketing research, commercial real estate finance, public and private partnerships, and tourism planning. The students are also required to participate in four paid internship expericontinued on page 2

This year's theme is "Sharing the Vision, Leading the Way: Continuing Educators in the New Millennium."



American dance and its contribution to, and influence on, American dance and culture. This performance highlights the artistic, social and technical evolution of African-American dance through various styles and genres.





Historian David Hackett Fischer to speak at Coastal

David Hackett Fischer, one of America's most distinguished historians, will give a lecture at Coastal on Thursday, Oct. 19 at 4 p.m. in the Wall Auditorium. The event is free and open to the public.

In his talk, titled "The Revival of History," Fischer will examine how a revolution in thought in the late 20th century has given rise to new approaches to historical thinking.

Fischer, who is Warren Professor of History at Brandeis University, has also taught at Oxford University, Harvard University and at the Universities of Otago and Waikato in New Zealand.

Charles Joyner, Burroughs Distinguished Professor of Southern History at Coastal, calls Fischer "one of the most brilliant scholars of his generation." Joyner also will give a brief talk focusing on local history following Fischer's lecture.

A native of Baltimore, Fischer has received numerous awards for his scholarship and teaching. He is author of 10 books, including such prize-winning works as Albion's Seed, Paul Revere's Ride and The Great Wave: Price Movements in Modern History.

The lecture is being presented in conjunction with the annual induction ceremony of Coastal's chapter of Phi Alpha Theta, a national honor society for history majors. Fischer's visit to Coastal is sponsored by Phi Alpha Theta and Coastal's Honors Program, with support from the Waccamaw Center for Cultural and Historical Studies.

Department of Art submits NASAD Accreditation Review

Evaluators from the National Association of Schools of Art and Design (NASAD) will be on campus Oct. 24 to 26 as part of the accreditation review process for Coastal's Department of Art. NASAD is the agency responsible for the accreditation of all art and design curricula.

The Department of Art was encouraged to seek accreditation following a positive review of Coastal's 1996 visual and performing arts programs by the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education (CHE). "The report helped confirm the department's determination that seeking accreditation was both feasible and in line with our goals and commitment to excellence," says Charles

Wright, chair of the department.

During the past two years many recommendations for improvement have been met, including updating the art, design, art education and art history holdings in Kimbel Library, increasing the number of volumes to 5,000 and upgrading and enlarging the department's slide collection. An art educator and art historian, each with doctorates in their respective fields, have been hired to augment the studio faculty who offer comprehensive courses in painting, sculpture, printmaking, photography, graphic design and drawing. These initiatives have received support from the administration and have been made possible through the receipt

of a \$57,604 performance improvement grant initiated by President Ronald R. Ingle and awarded by CHE.

As part of the accreditation process, the art faculty also completed a Self-Study document which assesses the planned growth and development of the art studio and art studio/secondary education programs.


The on-site visit will focus primarily on the activities and studios in the Art Center. Visits will also be made to Kimbel Library, the Humanities and Fine Arts Building construction site and to the sculpture studio housed in the Atlantic Center.

Computer Science students place in international competition

Students from Coastal's Department of Computer Science placed in the Top 30 out of 77 Southeastern college and university teams competing in the annual Association for Computing Machinery (ACM) International Collegiate Programming Contest, sponsored by IBM. The event was held at Georgia College and State University in Milledgeville, Sept. 29 and 30.

Coastal computer science majors who participated in the event were: Barry Donohue, Ryan Karetas, Mike Pilecki, Michael Wisener, John Wu and Marcus Wu.

"We were excited to be a part of such a prestigious programming competition," said Abdallah Haddad, director of Coastal's Academic Center and Coastal's team coach for the event. Haddad also is a part-time instructor of computer science. "Coastal's two teams took the 29th and 30th spots out of 77 teams. Even better, Coastal's teams ranked eighth and ninth within their division (universities without a com-

puter science graduate program). We are proud of our students for this accomplishment, which reflects the growth and progress of Coastal's Department of Computer Science. We look forward to higher rankings in the future."

Other schools which participated in the competition include Auburn University, University of Central Florida, Clemson University, Georgia Tech, Florida State University and the University of South Carolina. Coastal participated in the competition for the first time last year.

Women's Soccer wins first Big South matchup

Coastal's women's soccer team, in its first season of competition, upset Big South Conference leader Liberty University by a score of 1-0 on Sept. 30 at CCU's Soccer Stadium. The Chanticleers are 1-0-1 in the conference and 4-5-2 overall after dropping a 3-1 decision at UNC Wilmington on Oct. 4.

Versus Liberty, freshman Tiffany Turner posted her sixth goal of the season and second game-winner with just over 12 minutes remaining in the first half.

Coastal's defense allowed Liberty nine shots. Candice Doten recorded her third shutout of the season while posting six saves.

For the season, Kristin Wisse leads the team in scoring with 21 points on six goals and nine assists. Her assist total ranks first in the conference and fifth nationally.

Council National Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) recently approved new standards. Colleges will now be held accountable for their students' teaching performances and will also need to prove that they are adequately funding their teacher education programs and that they are working with elementary and secondary schools. Using tests such as the Praxis II exams, schools will need to show that their students know the academic subject that they will be teaching. NCATE will begin using the new standards in fall 2001 for new programs as well as those seeking to renew their accreditation.


