ENROLLMENT UP AGAIN AT COASTAL

Enrollment at USC-Coastal Carolina College increased significantly again this fall. Numerical returns were incomplete at the time THIS WEEK went to press, but Coastal Admissions Director Marsh Myers says enrollment increased this fall by approximately seven per cent. "Our enrollment was 1,759 last fall," Myers explains, "and we expect this fall's enrollment to be appoximately what we projected, which was 1,884 students."

Coastal's registration was interrupted when Hurricane David forced the college to close, but an extension provided significant additional registration by students who could not register sooner because of the storm.

ARCHAEOLOGY CLASS SEARCHES FOR COLONIAL CONWAY

Coastal's student archaeologists are hastily excavating a historic site in downtown Conway. The dig is located at the corner of Main Street and Third Avenue on the approximate site of the colonial village of Kingston, which later became the city of Conway. Kingston was founded by the colonial government in 1733 as part of Royal Governor Robert Johnson's attempt to expand the colony's population. Named for Britain's King George II, Kingston probably received its first settlers in 1737. The site of the dig will soon be paved as a municipal parking lot, but the Conway City Council, which is concerned with preserving the area's history, granted the college permission to excavate the site before paving begins.

COLLEGE COMMUNITY INVITED TO ART PROGRAM

Coastal's faculty, staff and students are invited to a program on traditional and contemporary Southeastern art by Ted Potter, director of the Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art in Winston-Salem. The program is scheduled for Thursday, Sept. 13th at 8 P.M. in the Myrtle Beach Convention Center. It's sponsored by the Waccamaw Arts and Crafts Guild and is organized by Marianna Hamilton of the Art Department. There is no admission charge.

FIELD TRIP SEARCHES FOR FLY-TRAPS

Dr. Joseph Pinson led members of the college community on a field trip to the Buist tract between Conway and Myrtle Beach last Saturday. Sponsored by the South Carolina Nature Conservancy, the trip provided participants with a rare glimpse of Venus fly traps and pitcher plants in their natural environment. The trip also included a discussion of forest management techniques on International Paper Company property.

SOCCER TEAMS WINS SEASON OPENER

Coach John Farrelly's Chanticleer soccer players passed their first test of the 1979 season Monday, defeating The College of Charleston 3-2 at Seahawk Stadium. The College of Charleston has been favored as the soccer champion of the district - a title Farrelly's players hope to claim for Coastal.
