

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Follett to operate campus bookstore

Coastal has selected the Follett Higher Education Group to operate and manage the university's bookstore.

Under the five-year agreement, Follett, one of the nation's largest usedtextbook providers, will begin operating out of Coastal's current bookstore location by March 2. By June, the bookstore will move into its new location on the first floor of Coastal's new welcome center, which is under construction. Follett will assist in the development of the 11,000-square-foot new store, including interior design and furnishing.

"We are pleased that Coastal Carolina University selected Follett as an educational partner," said James W. Baumann, president of Follett. "We look forward to providing the products and services that will meet or exceed the university's expectations."



Coastal professors study shark, dolphin populations in Winyah Bay area

The Georgetown County Environmental Protection Society (GCEPS) has awarded a \$3,000 grant to Daniel Abel and Robert Young of Coastal's Department of Marine Science for the continuation of their study of shark and dolphin populations in Georgetown's Winyah Bay and surrounding waters. The study was initiated last year with a \$10,000 grant from GCEPS.

Since the study began last year, Abel and Young have caught and tagged a variety of sharks in Winyah Bay, including sandbar sharks, blacktips, Atlantic sharpnose, finetooth, and others. By comparing resident and migratory dolphin and shark populations, both in Winyah Bay and in the comparatively pristine North Inlet, Abel and Young, with the help of Coastal students earning undergraduate credit, have begun to establish baseline popu-

lation data and will ultimately trace long-term habitation trends. "This study is also allowing us to begin assessing the impact of humans on these predator populations," said Abel. "Our data will be of interest to other researchers studying these species in the United States and abroad."

Dolphins are monitored using a video camera, according to Young. Dorsal fins are photographed from a *continued on page 2*

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small boat equipped with a high resolution 8mm video camera. "The dolphin is 'caught' on video and 'tagged' according to the individual natural markings and the distinctive outline shape of the fin," said Young. "With repeated weekly surveys of the area, a catalogue of fins is developed recording dates, location and behavior. Also, to establish habitat patterns, specific 'focus groups' of dolphins are followed and studied."

Sharks, both juveniles and adults, are captured on longlines, identified, tagged and immediately released, according to Abel.

GCEPS is a local charitable organization whose purpose is to monitor, protect and enhance wetlands, bays, creeks, estuaries and rivers of Georgetown County. "It is important that we try to determine the impact we humans have on our coastal resources so that steps can be taken to maintain a reasonable balance between Mother Nature and the human presence," said Brooks McIntyre, president of the organization.

Abel, senior instructor of marine science, joined the Coastal faculty in 1994. He earned a Ph.D. in 1986 from the Scripps Institution of Oceanography in San Diego. Abel has published many scientific articles on sharks and tropical air-breathing fish, and co-wrote the recent textbook *Issues in Oceanography*, published by Prentice Hall in 2000.

Young, associate professor of marine science, joined the Coastal faculty in 1992. He earned a bachelor's degree in biology in 1986 from the University of Virginia and a Ph.D. in biological oceanography from the University of Rhode Island in 1992. He has served as president of the South Carolina Marine Educators Association.

He earned a bachelor's degree from the North Carolina School of the Arts, a master's degree from the University of South Carolina, a doctoral degree from the University of Maryland, and the Diplome/1st prize with grand distinction from the l'Academie de musique de Boitsfort in Brussels, Belgium.

Tully, an adjunct instructor of flute at Coastal, is a member of the Long Bay Symphony and is a frequent freelance performer throughout the Grand Strand. Her past performance experience includes the Wilmington Sea Flutes, Wilmington Symphony Orchestra, Opera House Theatre Company (Wilmington, N.C.), and the Northwestern University Early Music Ensemble. She earned a bachelor's degree in flute performance from the University of North Carolina at Wilmington and a master's degree in musicology from Northwestern University.

Kirkman is the percussion instructor at Coastal and principal timpanist with the Long Bay Symphony. His professional experience during the past 20 years includes performances with symphony orchestras, chamber groups, Broadway show tours, and concerts backing popular entertainers. He earned bachelor's and master's degrees in music from the North Carolina School of the Arts, where he studied with J. Massie Johnson.

Craddock has performed with numerous big bands, ensembles, and combos throughout the Southeast, and in sessions with such jazz luminaries as Marvin Stamm and Bill Mays. He has also performed in all of the Calvin Gilmore Productions in the area. A fixture on the area music scene, he was bassist with the house band of the Crook and Chase Show.

Kimbel Library adds ScienceDirect

Coastal's Kimbel Library recently announced the addition of ScienceDirect® to its collection of Internet-accessible electronic resources. ScienceDirect is the premier electronic information service for the interdisciplinary research needs of academic, corporate and educational institutions, offering comprehensive coverage of literature across all fields of science.

ScienceDirect offers access to the Elsevier Science journal collection (more than 1,200 titles), along with journals from a host of prestigious societies and STM (science, technology, medical) publishers. The full text collection of more than 1 million articles from 1995 to present covers a wide variety of subject areas and disciplines, including:

The addition of ScienceDirect was made possible through the efforts of the libraries at nine South Carolina universities (University of South Carolina, Clemson, Medical University of South Carolina, The Citadel, College of Charleston, Wofford, Presbyterian, Francis Marion and Coastal). These institutions forged an agreement with Elsevier Science to license access to the service as a consortium, with the possibility of other South Carolina institutions joining at a later date. Under this license, the nine institutions have access to all 1,200 Elsevier journal titles through calendar year 2001. Beginning with calendar year 2002, the institutions will have access to the Elsevier titles subscribed to by the group as a whole. By the end of 2001, the nine libraries will have adjusted their subscriptions. to allow for the greatest number of unique titles possible.
