
Hunt, a professor of education at Coastal, joined the university's faculty in 1975. A native of Tabor City, N.C., he earned a bachelor's degree from Campbell University in 1969, a master's degree in 1971 and a Ph.D. in 1975, both from the University of North Carolina.

"We are fortunate to have someone with Gilbert Hunt's long experience and dedication to lead the College of Education," said Idoux. "Coastal's College of Education plays a vital role in our county, state and region by training teachers for our classrooms, and Dr. Hunt will continue to set high standards for the college."

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Coastal forms exchange partnership with German university

Officials from the University of Applied Sciences in Mainz, Germany (Fachhochschule Mainz). met Coastal administrators Feb. 14 to discuss the final details of a partnership establishing a series of business exchange programs, including a dual degree in international business. The two universities will begin offering a series of exchange programs beginning in June 2001.

Summer exchange programs are also being explored by both universities. The first of these exchanges will begin in June 2001, when six of Coastal's Wall Fellow students will travel to Mainz for a three-week course on issues relating to

European integration.

"This program will benefit Coastal by exposing our students to diverse business and educational environments outside the United States," said Coastal President Ronald R. Ingle. "Our faculty will have the opportunity to expand their professional expertise through exchanges with colleagues in Germany. Also, as students from Germany and other parts of the world serve internships with local industries, the entire Grand Strand area will profit through the development of international contacts."

"Today's economy is a global economy, and today's business students need a global viewpoint," said President Michael Morath of the University of Applied Sciences in Mainz. "Exchange programs are invaluable in helping different cultures to learn and understand each other. Also, because there are many German companies in South Carolina, it makes sense for our institution to link with universities in the state."

The agreement to establish a partnership between the two universities was signed in fall 2000 after Darla Domke-Damonte, assistant professor of management at Coastal, traveled to Mainz to visit the campus and discuss details of the exchange arrangement. The proposal was initiated by President Ingle during a visit he made to Mainz in 1998 as part of a delegation from the state of South Carolina to investigate opportunities for cooperation between the German state of Rhineland-Palatinate and South Carolina. The two states have an official sister state designation. Mainz is the capital of Rhineland-Palatinate.

The University of Applied Sciences in Mainz was created in 1996 as a result of a merger between the Mainz I and Mainz II branches of the Fachhochschule of the Rhineland-Palatinate. The original institution was established more than 100 years ago, offering programs in engineering, fine arts and business. The University of Applied Sciences has approximately 4,000 students.

During his career as a Coastal professor and administrator, Hunt has held many key leadership positions in the College of Education. He has been chair of the Department of Professional Programs in Teacher Education and codirector of the Center for Excellence for Standards-Based Education. He is also past chair of Coastal's Faculty Senate.

He has published numerous scholarly articles and books during his academic career. He is coauthor of *The Middle Level Teachers' Handbook: Becoming a Reflexive Practitioner* and *Effective Teaching: Preparation and*

Implementation, both published by Charles C. Thomas Ltd.

In February 1999, Hunt was honored in a resolution by the South Carolina House of Representatives for his achievements as an educator and a scholar. The resolution commended Hunt for "outstanding teaching and the great impact he is having on the lives and careers of his students."

Hunt received the Distinguished Teacher/Scholar award from the Board of Visitors of Coastal's College of Education in June 1998.

Ingle elected commissioner of accrediting agency

C o a s t a l President Ronald R. Ingle has been elected to the 77m e m b e r Commission on Colleges of the regional accrediting association, the Southern



Association of Colleges and Schools. The Commission accredits approximately 780 colleges and universities throughout the southeastern region of the United States and in Latin America.

Commissioners are charged with preparing a statement of standards for institutional membership, recommending membership dues assessments, conducting reviews and taking final action on the accreditation of collegiate institutions, reviewing reports from appointed study committees, and overseeing the work of the Commission's administrative staff.

Accreditation is a non-governmental and voluntary process concerned with improving educational quality and assuring the public that member institutions meet established standards.

The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools is one of six regional accrediting organizations in the United States. Its membership consists of more than 12,000 accredited public and private institutions from university level down to prekindergarten level. Founded in 1895 and headquartered in Decatur, Ga., the Southern Association works with schools and colleges in 11 Southern states from Virginia through Texas, in Mexico, the Caribbean, and in Central and South America.

Ingle has served as Coastal's president since 1993, when the institution became an independent public university. He joined Coastal in 1988 as vice chancellor of academic affairs.

Before coming to Coastal, Ingle held faculty and administrative positions at the University of South Carolina, The Ohio State University, Kennesaw College and South Georgia College.

A native of Moncks Corner, S.C., Ingle earned a bachelor's degree in English from Wofford College, a master's degree in higher education administration from Florida State University, and a Ph.D. in psychology from The Ohio State University.

Student-Athletes Impressive in the Classroom

Coastal's 225 student-athletes posted a cumulative grade point average of 2.957 during the fall 2000 semester according to a report released recently by the Office of Institutional Effectiveness. The GPA posted by all Coastal degree-seeking students was 2.737 GPA for the same semester.

"We are very proud of our studentathletes as they continue to prove themselves both in the classroom and on the fields of play," said Warren "Moose" Koegel, Coastal's director of athletics.

Coastal's eight women's teams and their 100 student-athletes combined for a 3.235 grade point average, while the seven men's teams and their 125 student-athletes combined for a 2.763 grade point average. The women's tennis team led all programs with a combined 3.688 grade point average.

Other women's sports and their team fall 2000 GPAs are cross country (3.539), basketball (3.329), soccer (3.237), volleyball (3.222), track and field (3.156), softball (3.120), and golf (3.014). Leading the men's sports was the cross country program with a GPA of 2.979. Other men's programs' grade point averages are tennis (2.954), baseball (2.888), track and field (2.826), soccer (2.744), golf (2.530) and men's basketball (2.196).

Individually, over 52 percent of all student-athletes (118 of 225) earned a GPA of 3.0 or higher.

Sankofa African-American Museum to be displayed at CCU

Sankofa African-American Museum on Wheels will be displayed at Coastal on February 20 and 21 in Wall Auditorium. The museum, which is free and open to the public, will be on display Tuesday, Feb. 20 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Wednesday, Feb. 21 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The exhibit of collector Angela Jennings-Smalls traces African-American history from 1860 to the present. Included in the exhibit are items such as sweet grass baskets, a Martin Luther King Jr. stamp collection, Duke Ellington memorabilia, African masks and headdresses and items invented by African-Americans.
