Academic building ground breaking ceremony to be held following Founders Day convocation

A ground breaking ceremony for the new academic building will be held following Founders Day convocation on Tuesday, Feb. 9. The ceremony, to be held at the site of the new academic building located to the rear of the Edward M. Singleton Building, will begin at approximately 4:30 p.m.

Tom Pegram and Associates is the architect and Hay Construction Company in Myrtle Beach is the building general

contractor.

The \$2.7 million academic building, a two-story building in the center, with onestory wings on each side, will follow the basic exterior design of the Singleton Building. The building, with 30,093 square feet of heated space, will house nine classrooms; 10 faculty offices with secretarial and reception areas; several conference rooms; offices for the Waccamaw Center for Cultural and Historical Studies, including an archaeology lab and a history library; the International Programs offices with a language lab and a foreign language library and conference rooms; a communications lab where students will have access to equipment to use for filming speeches to review/critique their presentations and performances; a computer lab; and an academic center for international students.

The building is funded through the Horry County Higher Education Commission with \$3 million in bonds. The funds will be repaid with tax millage allocated to Coastal by Horry County. Coastal will receive funds from the state for maintenance and building upkeep.

The building is scheduled for completion by January 1994.



Real estate appraisal licensing courses offered

Coastal will offer courses to satisfy the 75-hour education requirement for appraisal licensing as approved by the South Carolina Real Estate Appraisers Board. Offered through Graduate and Continuing Education, the series of three courses will be offered beginning March 5.

"L-1: Foundations for Real Estate Appraisal" (30 hours) is offered Friday, March 5; Saturday, March 6; Friday March, 12 and Saturday, March 13. "L-2: Real Property Appraisal Methods" (30 hours) is offered Friday, March 26; Saturday, March 27; Friday, April 2 and Saturday, April 3. "L-3: Standards of Professional Practice" (15 hours) is offered Friday, April 23 and Saturday, April 24. Friday classes meet from 1 to 9 p.m. and Saturday classes meet from 8 a.m. to 5

Completion of the courses meets the education requirements established by Title XI, Real Estate Appraiser Reform Amendment to FIRREA. In addition to the courses, 2,000 hours of experience must be completed for licensing. The regulations apply to transactions involving federally-regulated lenders, which include the majority of residential

Instructor for the courses is Jack Kendree, professor of business administration at Coastal. His teaching specialty areas are real estate and finance. Kendree earned a Ph.D. from the University of South Carolina in 1989 and has been a member of the Coastal faculty since 1985.

Tuition for all three courses is \$700 if registering before Feb. 22; registration is \$800 after Feb. 22. If courses are taken separately, special tuition breaks also are available for early registration. Textbooks and handout materials are included in tuition costs.

Early registration is advised; enrollment is restricted due to space.

Coastal to present professional theater tribute to Martin Luther King Jr.

Tennessee Repertory Theatre's musical theater tribute to Martin Luther King Jr., "Ain't Got Long to Stay Here," will be presented on Sunday, Feb. 14 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium as part of the Wheelwright Passport. Tickets for the performance are \$12 and \$8 for students and are available in the Wheelwright Box

"Ain't Got Long To Stay Here" is a play with music that chronicles the life and times of the famed civil rights leader. Authorized by King's estate, the play was developed from letters and speeches by Barry Scott, who plays King in the production.

Traditional spirituals and original music included in the play are sung by community choir members in the various cities where the production is presented. Approximately 25 young adult gospel choir singers from the area will perform with the professional touring production.

Beginning in 1955 in Montgomery, Ala., when Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat on a bus, through the 1968 assassination of King in Memphis, Tenn., the play depicts the heroic life of a man who challenged and ultimately changed the attitude of a nation.

According to Scott, who developed the production over a 17-year period, "I believe it's important to pass the story along to give people who were not there an opportunity to catch up on it, and give those who were there a reminder of what happened.'

"This is clearly a tribute to Martin Luther King Jr., but it's also a tribute to the men and women who participated in those changing times in America in the late 1950s and 1960s, that period that we associate so strongly with the civil rights movement," Scott said.

Scott is a graduate of Tennessee State University. He has appeared in episodes of network television's "I'll Fly Away," and "Rescue 911," and has a recurring role in the series "In the Heat of the Night." Scott also starred in the Jim Varney film "Ernest Goes to Jail" and portrayed the disabled veteran in the Travis Truitt music video "Any More."

"Ain't Got Long To Stay Here" is directed by John Briggs. Briggs has served as artistic director for the Burt Reynolds Institute for Theatre Training and has directed the Theatre Club of Palm Beach, Florida Shakespeare Festival, Shakespeare Festival of Dallas, Pan Asian Repertory Theatre in New York City and the Alabama Shakespeare Festival.

"Ain't Got Long To Stay Here" premiered with rave reviews in October 1991 in Nashville, Tenn., where Scott is resident artist for the Tennessee Repertory Theatre. A limited tour was conducted in Tennessee in 1992. Columbia Theatricals is handling the tour direction for the current tour which opened in Washington, D.C., in January

Tennessee Repertory Theatre was established in 1985 as the theater-inresidence at the Tennessee Performing Arts Center. The company performs five productions per season including drama and Shakespeare. The major focus of the company is the American musical. "Ain't Got Long to Stay Here" is one of two original musical dramas to receive national attention during the past year. The other, "Some Sweet Day," was performed for sell-out crowds at the Goodspeed Opera House in East Haddam, Conn., in August 1992.

This production is funded, in part, by the Horry Cultural Arts Council and the South Carolina Arts Commission, which receive support from the National

Endowment for the Arts.

The Wheelwright Passport also will feature "The Actor and The Assassin," based on Abraham Lincoln's assassination, on March 31; college theater productions of "The Homecoming" March 3 through 7 and the musical "1776" April 23 through 25; the second part of the Young Artist Showcase on April 1; and "Dear Liar," the theatrical portrayal of the relationship between Irish playwright George Bernard Shaw and British actress Stella Campbell

Live videoconference offered for educators, parents on whole language

Coastal is offering a live, interactive videoconference for educators and parents, entitled "Moving Into and Moving With Whole Language," on Saturday, Feb. 27 from 11 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. in GCEC 003. The videoconference is \$15 and includes lunch and an information packet. Registration deadline is Wednesday, Feb. 24.

"Moving Into and Moving With Whole Language" focuses on the whole language classroom and will include topics such as the look and design of the room, strategies used by experienced whole language teachers and curriculum design. The program includes more than 75 minutes of video footage of whole language classrooms.

Featured speakers are Dorothy Watson, professor in the College of Education at the University of Missouri, and Jerry Harste, president-elect of The Whole Language Umbrella. With Watson and Harste, educators representing elementary and junior high schools will provide the theoretical framework and practical application of whole language in the classroom.

The viewing audience will have the opportunity to call-in questions during the program.

The videoconference is presented by Graduate and Continuing Education at Coastal and co-sponsored by the Coastal Area Writing Project. Supporting organizations for the program include The Whole Language Umbrella and Oklahoma State University.

Top high school students to participate in Coastal's math contest

The Department of Mathematics will hold the 14th annual Mathematics Contest for High School Students on Friday, Feb. 12. More than 240 high school students representing 23 schools are expected to participate in the competition.

The competition is funded, in part, by a grant from GTE to Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc. The 1993 contest marks the second of a projected three-year sponsorship by GTE. The contest winner will be awarded \$500 in scholarship funds derived from the GTE gift.

In addition, the Horry County Higher Education Commission will award the top finisher from Horry County a full tuition scholarship to attend Coastal for four years and major in mathematics.

Participating South Carolina high schools are: Andrews, Aynor, Brookland-Cayce, Cardinal Newman, Conway, Hammond, Pee Dee Academy, Hemingway, Georgetown, South Florence, West Florence, North Myrtle Beach, Marion, Irmo, Manning, Socastee, Myrtle Beach, Green Sea Floyds, Loris, Wando, James Island and Johnsonville. In addition, Dobyns-Bennett of Kingsport, Tenn., will participate.

Students in the competition will be given one-hour examinations consisting of written, objective questions. Participants compete for individual awards on two levels: Level I questions are taken from Algebra I, Algebra II, and Geometry; Level II questions are from Algebra, Geometry, Advanced Algebra, and Trigonometry. For each school, the top three scores in each level will be added together to determine a team score. An awards presentation follows the competition. Registration begins at 9:30 a.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium, examinations will be held from 11:20 a.m. to 12:20 p.m., and the awards presentation will be held at 2 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Guidelines for medical emergencies on campus

The Health Information/Medical Referral Office and the Law Enforcement and Safety Office would like to inform the campus community that the college does not provide emergency medical services on campus. All medical emergencies should be handled by the Emergency Medical Service (EMS) by telephoning "911."

Medical emergencies requiring EMS services include life-threatening conditions such as cardiac or respiratory emergencies, the presence of severe bleeding, medical conditions or acute illnesses such as severe asthma attacks, repetitive seizures, diabetic emergencies, stroke, poisoning, and trauma-related accidents resulting in possible fractures or multiple injuries.

The campus police should always be notified when "911" is called in case their assistance is needed to direct EMS

personnel to the emergency location or to assist with crowd control, etc.

For minor medical concerns, such as skinned elbows, nosebleeds, or a broken toe or finger, the campus police can be called for information and assistance from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, at extension 2177. They will contact the Health Information/Medical Referral Office for nursing assistance as available. The campus police may also assist with transportation to Conway Hospital for minor medical concern requiring immediate attention.

In case of a medical emergency after 5 p.m. or on weekends, do not hesitate to call "911" for assistance.

"Shuttle off to Buffalo" . . . or where?

Effective March 1, the System Library Services on the Columbia campus will no longer log or track mail or other materials sent through its shuttle delivery because of personnel losses and the amount of time required to record each item.

The shuttle delivery service was originally established for the delivery of interlibrary loan items and newly cataloged library books to the regional and four-year campus libraries but has since grown into a multi-purpose delivery service for the entire University system. Increased usage of the delivery service and a shrinking budget make continuance of this service at the present level impossible, according to Linda K. Allman at the Columbia campus.

Departments or individuals who would like to continue using the System Library Service shuttle delivery may do so "at their own risk." The System Library Services staff will continue to transport mail and materials in a conscientious manner, however, they will not take the responsibility for lost or damaged items. Individuals or departments should consider sending valuable or priority items by other means (U.S. mail, UPS, etc.) or they should contact the individual(s) designated to receive these items to make them aware of the expected receipt date at their campus.
