

Coastal Theater presents America's musical, "1776"

The award-winning musical comedy "1776" opens Friday, April 23 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Performances continue Saturday, April 24 at 7:30 p.m. and Sunday, April 25 at 3 p.m. Tickets are \$8 for adults and \$5 for students.

"1776" is the winner of the 1968-1969 New York Drama Critics' Circle Award, and the 1969 Tony Award for the best musical comedy. The central issue of the musical is the writing of the American Declaration of Independence.

The Coastal Carolina Theater production is directed by Charles Whetzel.

Whetzel said, "How does one tell a prospective ticket buyer that what lies ahead is an evening devoted to a musical concerning the drafting and signing of the Declaration of Independence, and convince the ticket buyer to go? But one can forget about any dreary historical tableau with pompous speeches. Instead, '1776' offers a stage crowded with living men concerned with freedom. '1776' is a suspenseful, moving and funny cliffhanger."

Broadway critic Clive Barnes said, "The authors have really captured the Spirit of '76. The characters are most unusually full for a musical, and even though the outcome of the story is never in any very serious doubt, '1776' is consistently exciting and entertaining for the book is literate, urbane and, on occasion, very amusing. It is a musical with style, humanity, wit and passion."

The timeliness of a musical about independence has not escaped the Coastal Carolina College theater staff. "How could we resist?" said Theater Department chair David Millard. "The bill to make Coastal Carolina College an independent university is now in the South Carolina State Legislature."

Jordon Alexander is musical director and conductor. Alexander is an instructor of music at Coastal and a candidate for a Ph.D. in music at USC. In summer 1990 See "1776" Award on page 2.

Scenic and light design are by Lee Shepherd with costumes by Vivian Brooks. Shepherd is a visiting professor of theater at Coastal. He has a master's of fine arts degree in scene design from the University of South Carolina. Brooks has worked with Whetzel on Coastal Carolina Theater productions of "The Imaginary Invalid" and "Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead." Most recently she designed the women's costumes for Coastal Carolina Theater production of "Our Town."

The cast is headed by local musical comedy favorite Joe Garrell as Ben Franklin. Garrell, who is president and CEO of LITUS Properties, has appeared locally as Daddy Warbucks in "Annie" and as Tevye in "Fiddler On the Roof."

Tim Hughes plays the central character of John Adams.

Christie Inman is his wife Abigail.

Musical "showstoppers" are sung by Richard Flood as South Carolina's Edward Rutledge, an employee of AVX; and Russell Johnson, a Coastal student, who sings the mournful "Mamma Look Sharp."

Also featured in this cast of 25 are Coastal students Michael Matthews and Cheryl Felder as Tom and Martha Jefferson, and Surfside Beach resident Dean Jackson as John Rutledge of Pennsylvania. Jackson is retired from the United States Air Force.

Other Coastal students in the cast are Dean Reynolds, Eric Lavoie, Mark Duncan, D.L. Page, Jason Vail, Darryl Cook, Joe Powers, Dargan Baldwin, Chad Feagan, Donnie Guyton, and Chad Grimm.

Community cast members in addition to Garrell, Flood and Jackson include Sam Sands and Bruce Chestnut from Murrells Inlet, Byron Fowler from North Myrtle Beach, Socastee High School choral music director Norman McQueen and Jim Blackburn, assistant professor of French at Coastal Carolina.

Key speakers will offer their views of the Declaration of Independence. The speakers are:

• Paul Peterson, who recently had a paper, entitled "Ronald Reagan and the Reformation of American Conservatism," accepted for presentation at the Ninth Annual Presidential Conference;

• Jack Riley, who specializes in political philosophy and American politics with special attention to the founding of the nation; and

• Arthur Coleman, a partner in the law firm Nelson, Mullins, Riley and Scarborough of Columbia, who specializes in constitutional law and civil rights litigation. He was a member of the Clinton-Gore Transition Team, Justice and Civil Rights Cluster, from December 1992 to January 1993.

Portrayal of George Bernard Shaw, actress Stella Campbell's relationship to be presented

"Dear Liar," the professional theater portrayal of Irish playwright George Bernard Shaw and British actress Stella Campbell, will be performed Thursday, April 29 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Tickets are \$10 and \$7 for students.

"Dear Liar" is the story of the impossible romance between a very married Shaw and the actress-widow he was smitten with. The play is set in the first 40 years of the 20th century. Critics write that "Dear Liar" describes

Critics write that "Dear Liar" describes a "witty, tempestuous and flirtatious relationship between two strong personalities." The play chronicles Shaw and Campbell's stormy relationship through letters – in which they confide in the many things they could not do in real life.

The play "Pygmalion" was written for Campbell, who played the original Liza Doolittle.

The Jerome Kilty adaptation of the Shaw-Campbell relationship is performed by Lynn and Merle Lentz, who have worked together professionally in stage,

television, film and radio. Merle Lentz has been a professor of theater for more than 25 years and directed the Performing Arts Center in Anchorage, Alaska, until 1985. Lynn Lentz has taught acting and dance and has choreographed for opera and theater.

Kilty launched "Dear Liar" in 1957, and since then, the play has been translated and performed in Moscow, Warsaw and Belgrade. The play was selected by the President's Cultural Exchange Program to represent American theater at the International Dramatic Festival in Paris.

"Dear Liar" is presented by the Cultural Arts Committee of the Wheelwright Council for the Arts and is the final event of the 1992-1993 Wheelwright Passport season.

Paul Gayes and Doug Nelson recently participated in a series of oceanographic cruises aboard NOAA's research ship Ferrell. On the first portion, Gayes collaborated with researchers from University of Delaware to determine the history of deposits at the mouth of Delaware Bay. The second portion involved Nelson and two marine science students in a study of sediments from Cape Fear to Edisto Island. The fault that caused the 1886 Charleston earthquake was recognized in several localities under the sea floor and will be the subject of a future article by these marine scientists.
