COASTAL STUDENT ELECTED 'LT. GOVERNOR'

Coestal Carolina College junior Melody Murphy has been elected student Lieutenant Governor of the state by the South Carolina State Student Legislature. The Student Legislature is an elected body of college and university sudents which meets twice a year in the South Carolina Statehouse to conduct legislative action on subjects the students think should receive attention by the real legislature.

In this year's first legislature session at the SC Statehouse the Student Legislature elected officers and Coastal's Melody Murphy won the post of Lieutenant Governor by 78-63 vote against Clemson student Jody Zimmerman. Murphy is a 43-year old mother whose oldest son is a student at Horry-Georgetown TEC. She transferred to Coastal after graduating from the Business Administration program at Horry-Georetown TEC with an associate degree. Now she's studying at Coastal as a junior in the college's Business Administration School.

As Lieutenant Governor of the Student legislature, she will recruit new members, raise funds, help choose officers, publish the bills of the legislature, preside over committees and organize contacts with student legislatures in other states.
