

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Ingle named to SREB executive committee

Coastal President Ronald R. Ingle has been appointed to the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) Executive



Committee for 2001-2002 by Georgia

Gov. Roy E. Barnes, chairman of SREB. SREB was created in 1948 by Southern states to help government and education leaders work cooperatively to advance education and improve the social and economic life of the region.

SREB assists state leaders by directing attention to key issues; collecting, compiling and analyzing comparable data; and conducting broad studies and initiating discussions that help states and institutions form long-range plans, actions and policy proposals.

The organization is governed by a board that consists of the governor of each member state and four people that he or she appoints, including at least one state legislator and at least one educator. SREB is supported by appropriations from its member states and by funds from private companies, foundations, and state and federal agencies.

Ingle was appointed to serve on SREB in 1996 by Gov. David Beasley and was reappointed by Gov. Jim Hodges in June 2000.

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Horner named CCU's interim provost

Sally M. Horner, executive vice president at Coastal, has been appointed interim provost for the 2001-2002 academic year. In addition to her present duties, Horner will be

responsible for the following areas: academic affairs, deans council, grants and sponsored research, and the School of Continuing Studies (formerly the Division of Extended Learning and Public Services).

According to Coastal President Ronald R. Ingle, a search for a permanent provost will begin this fall.

Prior to being named executive vice president in 1993, Horner served as vice chancellor for planning and fiscal affairs at Coastal since 1984. From 1978 to 1984, she held several top administrative positions at the University of Charleston in West Virginia including acting president, vice president for administrative services, provost, dean of the Morris Harvey College of Arts and Sciences, and acting dean of the College of Health Sciences.



Meredith College in Raleigh, N.C., from 1965 to 1978, where she served as chair of the department of chemistry and physical science, director of institutional research, director of financial aid, and taught courses in inorganic, physical, analytical and general chemistry, physics and astronomy.

She also has held post-doctoral research appointments at Duke University, the Research Triangle Institute in North Carolina and the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.

Horner earned a bachelor's degree in chemistry and a Ph.D. in inorganic chemistry from University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. She was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate, and received a three-year pre-doctoral fellowship from the National Science Foundation.

She served two consecutive threeyear terms as elected commissioner of the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Horner is a member of the Board of Trustees at Conway Hospital and is chair of the advisory committee for the oversight of Kingston Nursing Home of Conway Hospital. She was also appointed by former Gov. Carroll Campbell to the Board of Directors of the Waccamaw Center for Mental Health from 1993 to 1996.

Coastal's Founders' Day celebration to be held Sept. 20

Coastal's 15th annual Founders' Day Convocation will be held Thursday, Sept. 20 at 3 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The ceremony is free and open to the public.

Covel C. Moore Sr., Clyde W. Port and the late Rebecca Randall Bryan will honorary be named founders of the university.

The 2001 recipients of the Founders' Medallion will join 59 other founders and honorary founders who played instrumental roles in the development of Coastal and the promotion of higher education in the region.

Constantine Curris, president of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), will deliver the convocation address. He is the fourth chief executive for AASCU, a national association of more than 400 public colleges and universities. Curris has been associated with AASCU since 1973 and was named president in 1999. A native of Kentucky, Curris has served as president at Murray State University, the University of Northern Iowa and Clemson University. The Murray State Student Center and the Northern Iowa Business Building bear Curris' name.

Moore, pastor of the Good Hope AME Church in Centenary, retired in 1981 from the Horry County School District where he worked for 28 years as a science teacher at Whittemore High School and Socastee High School. He also served for 12 years as chair of the science department at Socastee High School. Moore is a longtime member of Coastal's ABLE (A Better Lifestyle Experience) class, which helps promote





health, wellness and a positive social

atmosphere for adults 50 and older. He

has also been involved with Coastal's

Lifelong Learning Society. Moore has

served as past president of the Horry

County Education Association and as a

Ingle has served as Coastal's president since 1993, when the institution became

A native of Moncks Corner, S.C., Ingle earned a bachelor's degree in English from Wofford College, a master's degree in higher education administration from Florida State University, and a Ph.D. in psychology from The Ohio State University.


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Rebecca Randall Bryan Art Gallery dedication planned

The dedication and opening of Coastal's Rebecca Randall Bryan Art Gallery will be held Thursday, Sept. 20 at 4 p.m. The art gallery is located in the new Thomas W. and Robin W. Edwards College of Humanities and Fine Arts Building. The dedication is free and open to the public.

The gallery's premiere exhibit features selections from the South Carolina State Art Collection, which will be on display through Nov. 23.

The State Art Collection is the most comprehensive public collection of works by contemporary South Carolina artists. Established in 1967 as one of the first programs of the South Carolina Arts Commission, the State Art Collection has grown to include more than 400



works in a variety of media and styles.

The purpose of the program is to create a collection of historic importance and cultural vitality for the people of South Carolina that will serve as a tool to help promote the state and its cultural resources on the state, regional, national and international levels; to make available to citizens throughout the state the best work of the state's contemporary artists; and to encourage and support the creative visual artists of South Carolina.

Division of Extended Learning renamed School of Continuing Studies

Coastal's Division of Extended Learning and Public Services has been renamed the School of Continuing Studies.

"Gaining school status is a reflection of the growth and the quality of programs we provide," said Peter Balsamo, dean of the school. "The name change also reflects a similar trend at universities across the nation which have continuing education programs that coordinate and administer degree programs."

Richard Weldon has been named assistant dean of the School of Continuing Studies. His responsibilities include overseeing Coastal's Higher Education Center in Myrtle Beach and its Georgetown campus. Weldon had been director of continuing education and external services for Coastal's E. Craig Wall Sr. College of Business Administration.

The School of Continuing Studies is a comprehensive continuing education operation, managing programs such as the award-winning Lifelong Learning Society, the Bachelor's of Arts in Interdisciplinary Studies (BAIS) degree, professional development workshops and seminars, specialized technologies certification, contract training, travelprograms, Coastal study Youth Academy, leisure learning, Command Spanish, credit and non-credit distance learning, high school dual credit, and the SuperSonic Summer Youth Program for children.

The School of Continuing Studies is located in the H. Dale Williams Center for Extended Learning, which is on the second floor of the new University Hall on Coastal's campus.

• Elissa Howard is an assistant professor of health promotion. She earned a Ph.D. in health behavior and a minor in research methodology and a specialization in human sexuality from the University of Florida. She received several awards while completing her doctoral degree at the University of Florida, including "Graduate Student of the Year" in the department of health science education and also the "Graduate Teaching Award."

• Julia Orri is an assistant professor of exercise science and physiology. She most recently did research on high altitude physiology in Albuquerque, N.M. She earned a Ph.D. in health, physical education and recreation with a concentration in exercise science from the University of New Mexico. She will also be in charge of developing the exercise physiology lab at Coastal.

• Jean Reid is an assistant professor of human growth and development. She earned a Ph.D. in educational psychology from the University of Florida. She won the 1999 Isabel Briggs-Myers Memorial Research Award. She has worked at the Center for Applications of Psychological Type, which offers training in the Myers-Briggs instrument.

• Jonathan P. Bernick is an assistant professor of computer science. He earned a Ph.D. in computer science from the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology. Bernick's research interests focus on the computational techniques in modeling the availability of integrity algorithm for Global Positioning System (GPS).

• Sharon L. Gilman is an assistant professor of biology. She earned a Ph.D. in biological oceanography from the University of Rhode Island. She has served Coastal for seven years in a number of positions including instructor of biology, education/research coordinator for the NSF-AIRE Program and lecturer in the marine science department. She will coordinate the college's and the Department of Biology's science education programs.

• Jean-Louis Lassez is a professor of computer science. He will join the Department of Computer Science in January 2002. Lassez earned a Ph.D. in computer science from Purdue University. He is

Luken comes to Coastal after serving as a professor of biology and director of the environmental science program at Northern Kentucky University. He has received the Distinguished University Scientist Award from the Kentucky Academy of Science and was named Outstanding Professor at Northern Kentucky University.

• John E. Reddic is an assistant professor of chemistry. He earned a Ph.D. at the University of Georgia and did postdoctoral work at the University of South Carolina. His postdoctoral research has involved the use of small metal particles as potential catalytic materials to destroy chemical warfare agents.

• Stephen E. Shauger is an assistant professor of mathematics. He earned a Ph.D. in mathematics at Texas A&M University. His research interests focus on graph theory, combinatorics, and algorithms.

CCU Theater presents Faybulous in new Edwards Theater

Faybulous, a "sing play" for children based on Aesop's Fables, is the first production to be presented in Coastal Carolina University's new Edwards Theater in the Thomas W. and Robin W. Edwards College of Humanities and Fine Arts Building. The production is scheduled for Thursday and Friday, Sept. 27 and 28 at 7:30 p.m.; Saturday, Sept. 29 at 1 p.m. and 7:30 p.m.; and on Sunday, Sept. 30 at 3 p.m. Admission is \$10, \$5 for students under the age of 18. Coastal students, faculty and staff will be admitted free with a Coastal I.D.

Designed expressly for student training, workshops and smaller productions, the new Edwards Theater can be adapted to accommodate many different arrangements of staging and seating. "Although *Faybulous* will be presented in the traditional proscenium format, this production will be much more intimate and close to the audience," says Sandi Shackelford, professor of theater at Coastal and director of the production.

Written by David Bankston, assistant professor of music at Coastal, and Tony Makarome, a composer and graduate of the Berklee College of Music in Boston, Faybulous is based on adaptations of three of Aesop's fables, each one a mini-morality tale in a distinctive American musical mode: "The Tortoise and the Hare" is transformed into "Daddy Cool Turtle and Jacky Rabbit" with a hip jazz-gospel style; in "The Hen that Laid the Golden Egg," Granny grapples with would-be thieves Wayne and Dewayne, mixing tango, blues and country music; and "The Poor Woodsman and the Magical Rivermaid" is done in musical theater style.

"This show is a labor of love for me," says composer Bankston. "Both Tony and I have very diverse musical backgrounds, which accounts for the variety of styles in *Faybulous*. Aesop's fables are timeless - they're fun and instructive for children and adults alike."

The cast and technicians include Coastal faculty members Bankston, who sings the role of the narrator; Anne Denbow-Gilbert, instructor of music; Philip Powell, associate professor of music; and Robin L. Stephens, dance instructor.

The cast also includes Coastal students Matt McCarty, Carl Mueller and Chris Bergamo, and alumni Farrah Dill and Ollie Marseglia.

Faybulous was first presented in Wheelwright Auditorium in August 2000. The new production is an updated version with new costumes, additional dance numbers and many new cast members.

Koepfler receives National Science Foundation grant

Coastal has been awarded a \$221,000 grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF) to establish a microbial ecology laboratory on campus.

The new lab, which will be located in Coastal's Center for Marine and Wetlands Studies, will give Coastal faculty and students the tools to conduct better research, particularly relating to microbial ecology and water quality, according to Eric Koepfler, associate professor of marine science at Coastal and recipient of the grant. The threeyear grant will also enable Coastal's College of Natural and Applied Sciences to expand its microbial ecology and biology curricula. Microbial ecology is the study of microscopic organisms and how they interact with the physical and chemical environment. Changes in water quality rapidly affect microbial communities in shallow coastal environments, and monitoring these communities may be an important way to gauge environmental impacts due to population growth.

"This grant will allow us to better conduct local research, both in the lab and out in the field in places like Waites Island and the Waccamaw River," says Koepfler. Similar research in microbial ecology has been conducted in cooperation with the Baruch Marine Field Laboratory near Georgetown, a facility of the University of South Carolina.

According to Koepfler, the grant will be used to purchase state-of-the-art equipment including a research-quality compound microscope, image analysis system, oxygen and carbon dioxide respirometers, *in situ* fluorometers, temperature controlled incubators, computers, and a GPS equipped multiprobe.

Koepfler, who earned a Ph.D. from the College of William and Mary, is also director of the Loggerhead Sea Turtle Protection Program sponsored by Coastal's Center for Marine and Wetlands Studies.

Coastal's athletic department prepares for NCAA Certification

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Weisbrod named NCAA Woman of the Year for South Carolina


Brooke Weisbrod, a former standout on Coastal's women's basketball team, has been selected as the 2001 NCAA Woman of the Year for South Carolina.

She is now on a list with 50 other finalists for the overall NCAA Woman of the Year honor to be announced Oct. 21 in Indianapolis.

The NCAA Woman of the Year honor is awarded annually to honor outstanding female student-athletes who have excelled in

academics, athletics and community leadership. This year, 350 student-athletes were nominated, with 51 being chosen representing each state and the District of Columbia.

Weisbrod, a native of Cincinnati, completed the best overall career of any women's basketball player in Coastal history in 2001. She completed her



career as the first women's basketball player to ever earn Big South Player of the Year or Big South Rookie of the Year honors. During the 2000-2001 season. Weisbrod led the conference with 19.7 points per game and earned the Player of the Year honor. She is just the second player in Coastal history to tally more than 1,000 points, 300 rebounds and 200 assists.

Weisbrod earned a bachelor's degree in marketing with a 3.70 GPA

and was a member of the prestigious Wall Fellows Program. Her community service work included many speaking engagements with Coastal's Student-Athlete Speakers Bureau. She also volunteered many hours to the United Way.

Weisbrod is playing professionally with the Marburg Marlins in Marburg, Germany.

Learning vacations offered for adults

For adult travelers looking for more than sightseeing and sandy beaches, Coastal offers travel-study programs to 16 foreign destinations. The tours emphasize learning, with opportunities for first-hand education about history, culture and customs. On-site lectures, seminars and field experiences provided by faculty escorts and in-country specialists together with "people-to-people" contacts foster an insight and understanding of foreign cultures not available on more conventional tours.

Accommodations are first class, meals are included and groups are small, allowing participants to receive individual attention and make friends. Coastal's groups average 14 participants with some groups as small as eight members, allowing for a close interaction between participants and guides. Winter 2002 programs will be to Antarctica, Belize, Costa Rica, Egypt, Galapagos Islands and Ecuador, and Kenya.

Spring 2002 programs will include Belize, China, Costa Rica, Egypt, Galapagos Islands and Ecuador, Greece, Ireland, Italy, Morocco, Spain and Turkey.

These two-week learning vacations for adults range from \$2,000 to \$5,000 and include meals, first class accommodations, unique learning experiences, and airfare from the tours' departure cities.
