HCHEC elects 1993-1994 officers

The Horry County Higher Education Commission (HCHEC) has elected its 1993-1994 officers. They are: John Dawsey of Aynor, chair; Ruthie Kearns of Myrtle Beach, vice chair; James C. Hipp of Loris, secretary; and Elizabeth Shaw of Conway, treasurer.

John Dawsey has been a member of HCHEC since May 1970. He earned a bachelor's degree from Clemson University in 1952 and a master's degree in education from Appalachian State University in 1974. Dawsey was superintendent of the Horry County School District from 1979 to 1991.

Ruthie Kearns has been a commission member since July 1984; she was treasurer in 1990 and vice chair in 1991. Kearns received a bachelor's degree from the University of South Carolina in 1968 and is enrolled in the MBA program at USC. She is senior vice president of Coastal Federal Savings Bank.

James C. Hipp was a charter member of the Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc., which became the HCHEC in 1959. He was chair of the commission in 1964 and 1971. Hipp earned a bachelor's degree from Newberry College in 1940. He owns Carolina Furniture Company, Inc., in Loris, where he has worked for 47 years.

Elizabeth "Lib" Shaw has been a member of HCHEC since July 1985, and served as chair in 1990, treasurer in 1991, and was chair of the Finance/Budget/Audit Committee. Shaw has been active in the Coastal Council for Internationals and has chaired the Wheelwright Council for the Arts. She was employed at Canal Industries for 43 years.

The Horry County Higher Education Commission was established by the South Carolina General Assembly in 1959 to create new opportunities for the people of the Waccamaw-Grand Strand Region.

Today, the HCHEC oversees a more than \$500,000 budget that, aside from scholarship and tuition assistance, funds faculty and staff development, research/development centers, and educational support centers.

Vanpool for commuter students continued

A vanpool/commuter program will be available for students of Horry-Georgetown Technical College and Coastal Carolina University who live in the Georgetown/Andrews area and are enrolled in courses or programs not offered on the Georgetown campuses of the two institutions.

The Coastal Rapid Public Transit Authority (CRPTA) van will provide round trip transportation, five days a week, beginning Monday, Aug. 23 and continuing through the semester. The van will leave Georgetown at 7 a.m. and depart from Conway no later than 4 p.m. depending on passengers' needs. The route begins at the Georgetown County Library on Cleland Street and follows Highway 701 to the Conway campuses.

The cost of the vanpool service is \$3

daily, or \$12.50 weekly. In order to keep fares at a reasonable level, a minimum of 10 students must ride in the 14-passenger van. Seats will be available on a first come, first-served basis.

Seats not filled by students or institutional employees will be available to the general public on a first come, firstserved basis. If demand is great, a second van will be provided.

Two students will be needed to serve as driver and backup driver. These students will be compensated for driving and maintaining custody of the van.

Poetry course offered during fall semester

"Writing Workshop: Poetry" will be offered during the fall semester, on Tuesdays from 6 to 8:45 p.m. Fall classes for the regular session begin on Thursday, Aug. 26 and continue through Friday, Dec. 10.

The three credit undergraduate course (CEGL 468) is open to all students.

Paul Rice, an associate professor of English, published poet, and country music songwriter and guitarist, will teach students the craft of poetry in a lively workshop setting. Students will have their poems discussed and will be guided in the preparation and submission of manuscripts for publication.

Some awards Rice has received for his poetry include: Southern Literary Festival Poetry Prize, 1988 Atlanta Writing Resource Center Chapbook Award, 1989 Arts Journal Poetry Prize, and 1990 Kudzu

Poetry Contest Award.

He has read his poetry at the Folger Shakespeare Library in Washington, D.C., the 1990 Spoleto Sundowner Poetry Series Festival, and for the National Science Foundation.

Rice joined the Coastal faculty in 1987 and serves as head of the creative writing department. He specializes in contemporary British and American poetry. He serves as coordinator of the Myrtle Beach workshop of the Nashville Songwriter's Association and is a consultant for the South Carolina Entertainment and Music Association.

Rice earned a master's degree of fine arts in creative writing from the University of Arkansas in 1976, and a Ph.D. in English from The Catholic University of America in 1985.

Music of Africa taught at Coastal

"The Music of Africa and African-American Musical Heritage" will be offered during the fall semester on Mondays from 4 to 6:30 p.m. from Sept. 1 through Dec. 15.

The three credit undergraduate course (CMUS 310) is open to all students.

Donald Harrell, an adjunct faculty member in the School of Humanities and Fine Arts, will provide students with an analytical and theoretical look at African music and the African-American musical heritage from the 15th century to the present. Musical genres include: Negro spiritual, gospel, blues, ragtime, jazz, rhythm and blues, soul, and hip hop.

Harrell is an approved artist with the

South Carolina Arts Commission. He earned a master's degree in African studies from the University of California in Los Angeles in 1983.

Harrell studied for a year at the University of Ghana in Legon Ghana, West Africa. He has served as an African aerobics, drumming and traditional movement instructor; African musical and theatrical director, producer and performer; music teacher and band instructor for the public school system; and music workshop coordinator.

Wetland plant identification topic of special course

The Center for Marine and Wetland Studies will sponsor a course entitled "Wetland Plant Identification", Wednesday, Sept. 8 through Saturday, Sept. 11

Participants will learn to identify wetland plants based on an understanding of taxonomic keys, plant structure and morphology. The course will also cover the practical applications of plant identification in the delineation of freshwater wetlands through an understanding of the "wetland indicator"

The course is recommended for wetland consultants, surveyors, ecologists, and others involved in the field of natural resource management.

Environmental and wetland consultant Paul Booth Jr., Ph.D., and botanical consultant Cindy Aulbach-Smith will conduct the course.

The fee for the course is \$450. Space is limited and early registration is recommended. Registration deadline is Friday, Sept. 3.

Additional wetland issues courses are offered include Basic Wetland Delineation; Advanced Wetland Delineation; and Wetlands: Federal and State Laws and Regulations.
