COASTAL CULTURAL ARTS SERIES PRESENTING JAMES DREW TRIO

As a child growing up in New York City's Harlem neighborhood in the 1930's, James Drew was thrown out of a lot of nightclubs. But he always came back. He evaded the club bouncers or slipped in through the kitchen and he always came back. He was determined because he was in love —with lazz.

"It all goes back to Harlem," James Drew says today. "You think of Harlem as being a completely black community." says the white musician, "but it was pretty mixed back in the "30's; People came from many places.

"I was about eight when I started playing the piano. And I played what I heard, which was jazz. When I wasn't playing, I was sneaking into clubs. I guess I was thrown out of more clubs than anyone can imagine."

His persistence paid off. Nightclub owners were so impressed with young James Drew's love for jazz music that they usually relented and let him stand in their club kitchens and listen to their music for hours. Considering his background, it's easy to understand how James Drew became a reknown jazz musician.

Bolstered by a childhood emersed in jazz, James Drew left Harlem for a musical career which put him in concert with Jazz greats like Red Allen, Booker Ervin, Willie "The Lion" Smith and Mel Powell. Along the way, he managed to receive an education in music at the New York School of Music and Tulane University. While not playing jazz, he composed jazz and classical music; scored films, directed dance-theater and performed as a classical pianist. As if those accomplishments weren't enough, he held teaching positions at UCLA, Northwestern University, Cal State and Yale University, where he served as Chairman of Yale's School of Music Theory.

Thursday, February 21st, James Drew, accomplished jazz man and classical pianist, brings his jazz heritage to South Carolina's Grandstrand area in a concert sponsored by USC-Coastal Carolina College. Part of Coastal's Cultural Arts Series, the concert by the James Drew Jazz Trio is scheduled for 8 PM, Feb. 21 at the new Conway High School auditorium. Tickets are \$3 at the door and may be purchased in advance at the college.
