COASTAL SEEKS HUMANITIES FUNDING

A delegation of officials from Coastal Carolina College and the Coastal Educational Foundation recently returned from a fund raising trip to Washington and Detroit. Chancellor Singleton, Associate Chancellor for College Relations Bill Baxley and Horry HEC official Don Moore first visited the headquarters of the National Endowment for the Humanities in Washington, to which the college is applying for \$400,000 for an endowed humanities program at Wheelwright Theatre for the Performing Arts. The program is called "The Coastal Forum."

While in Washington, the delegation also met with H.E.W. officials. Coastal is seeking Title III funding from H.E.W. and is also asking the department to grant Coastal designation as a "Developing Institution" — a designation which would allow the college to seek additional federal funds.

Leaving Washington, the delegation flew to Detroit, where they met with officials of the Kresge Foundation. Coastal is one of 1,200 institutions seeking funding from the foundation. Coastal's application requests \$200,000 in matching funds to complete Wheelwright's Phase II campaign.

TWO MILLION TRUANTS?

A minimum of two million American students regularly cut school, according to report in NEWSWEEK. According to the magazine, an increasing number of chronic truants are in elementary school. Big-city school systems are apparently hardest-hit. Boston's truancy rate is 25%. St. Louis and Philadelphia report an annual rate of 15%, while New York and Los Angeles regularly record absences of 50% at some schools. Social workers claim chronic truants often turn into high-school dropouts, illiterates and criminals. Some cities seem to be reducing the problem, however. Baltimore, which has a truancy rate half that of comparable cities, has a high anti-truancy staff. Police question school-age children who are on the streets during school hours and the city sometimes takes parents to court if their children are chronic truants. In Oakland, a school system staff checks attendance each morning and monitors absences by telephoning parents. The final answer to the problem, NEWSWEEK suggests, is teaching truants that education will benefit them.
