Gerald to speak during South Carolina Archaeology Week

Veronica Davis Gerald will present a slide-illustrated talk on the burial customs and practices of the Gullah people of Western Africa who have lived along the coastal regions of South Carolina and Georgia since the early 1700s Wednesday, Sept. 29 at 7 p.m. in the Little Theater. The one-hour presentation is free and open to the public.

The lecture is part of South Carolina Archaeology Week, (Sept. 25 to Oct. 7) which consists of more than 120 programs, exhibitions and demonstrations that have been scheduled around the state to bring South Carolina's past to life.

An assistant professor of English, Gerald is the author of numerous poems,

Professor publishes essay

An essay by Preston L. McKever-Floyd is included in a recently published book entitled Religion in South Carolina.

The book, edited by Charles Lippy and published by the University of South Carolina Press, consists of 14 essays written by religious studies scholars. It has been called "the first comprehensive appraisal of the major denominations, topics, and issues that have defined the religious history of the Bible Belt state.' It sketches an overview of religion in the region and then looks specifically at the traditions that have forged South Carolina's religious structure.

McKever-Floyd's essay, entitled

professional essays and short stories. Her interest in her own family history has led to what will be her first book, There was a People: Ancestor and Spirit Worship among the Gullahs in the South Carolina Lowcountry.

Gerald joined the Coastal faculty in 1982 after spending the previous year as visiting professor of English. She received a master's degree from Atlanta University in 1975, and in 1986 entered Emory University in Atlanta as a Ph.D. candidate. While at Emory, she held several prestigious titles including Patricia Roberts Harris Fellow and Emory Fellow. *

Masks of the Sacred: Religious Pluralism in South Carolina, addresses that religious pluralism exists in South Carolina.

An assistant professor of philosophy and religion, McKever-Floyd's essays have appeared in several publications. He has also produced numerous religious lectures and papers. McKever-Floyd joined the Coastal

faculty in 1980. He received a master's degree from Duke University in 1979, conducted doctoral work at Emory University in Atlanta, and was a Fulbright Scholar to India in 1988. 🍋

Hear Ye! Hear Ye! . . . Announcing A Summer Program for Faculty and Staff at Manchester College in England

Coastal faculty and staff are invited to spend 11 days at Manchester College in England during the summer of 1994. The group will leave for England on Wednesday, July 13 and return Saturday, July 23, 1994. Some activities will coincide with student excursions, and others will be for the faculty and staff group alone.

Early registration is advised as space is limited to approximately 20 participants. Priority will be given to faculty and staff; however, spouses and significant others will be welcomed on a space available basis.

Double-occupancy accommodations will be at Manchester College at Oxford for the first seven nights and at Wellington Hall in London for the final three nights. Breakfast and dinner will be provided while at Manchester College and breakfast only will be provided while in London. During the Oxford stay, day trips will be organized to visit Stonehenge; Winchester, Stratford, to see a Shakespeare play; Blenheim Palace, where Winston Churchill was born; and Windsor Castle. In London, the group will visit museums; Covent Gardens; Harrod's Department Store; St. Paul's Cathedral; Buckingham Palace and view the Changing of the Guard; the Tower of London; and the Houses of Parliament. London's subway system is safe and efficient and gives participants access to the city. In London the group will sample one of the West End

Roy Talbert has been appointed to the Non-Government Records Task Force of the South Carolina Historical Records Advisory Board. As the central advisory body for historical records planning in general and specifically for all projects in South Carolina funded by the National Historical Publications and Records Commission, the Advisory Board is developing a new state plan for historical records programs. Talbert's Task Force will focus on a wide variety of repositories across the state that contain private records and manuscripts.

Tim Touzel had an article, entitled "Portfolio Analysis: Windows of Competence," published by the Educational Resources Information Clearinghouse for Teach Education at The Ohio State University. The publication was based on Touzel's portfolio theater offerings which boast plays as performed on Broadway in New York City, such as Cats, Phantom of the Opera, Les Miserables, and Miss Saigon.

Cost of the 11-day trip is \$1,850 which includes round-trip airfare; double occupancy room and board in Oxford and London (single occupancy is an additional \$175); day excursions listed above and admission to corresponding sites; the play performances in Stratford and London; and airport transfers. Expenses not included in the trip are lunches in Oxford; lunches and dinners in London; subway and travel in London (a three-day subway pass can be purchased for approximately \$7); and the cost of admission to the various points of interest in London, other than St. Paul's Cathedral and Buckingham Palace. Museums and palaces in London charge from \$7 to \$10 for admission. Participants should be able to average between \$15 and \$20 per day spending money (depending on the exchange rates in effect.) - that is, if too much time isn't spent in local pubs.

A \$200 deposit is required by Wednesday, Dec. 1, 1993; however, individuals who pay their deposit by Monday, Nov. 1 will receive a \$100 discount on the total cost of the trip. Deposits are non-refundable.

In case of emergency . . .

The Office of Information Technology Services (formerly Computer Services and Communications) is placing emergency information stickers on all campus telephones.

In case of emergency, callers from campus extension telephones should dial "9" to get an outside line before dialing "911." The caller should then call extension 2177 to allow Campus Law Enforcement and Safety personnel to assist emergency personnel in locating the person needing emergency treatment. Pay telephones on campus and telephones is dorm rooms are not campus extension telephones; therefore, the caller should dial "911" without dialing a "9" for an outside line.

The following guidelines are provided by the Coastal's Office of Health Information and Medical Referral and the Office of Law Enforcement and Safety.

• Coastal Carolina University does **not** provide emergency medical services on campus. All medical emergencies are handled by the Emergency Medical Service (EMS) by calling "911." Examples of emergency situations handled by EMS are life-threatening conditions such as cardiac or respiratory emergencies, the presence of severe bleeding, medical conditions or acute illnesses such as severe asthma attacks, repetitive
