OFFICIAL USC POLICY ON COLLEGE CLOSINGS

Because of questions about Coastal closing during the recent snow, Chancellor's Administrative Assistant Mildred Allen submits the following USC policy which should apply to future closings:

Employees may be unable to report to work due to hazardous weather conditions. University policy states that if weather conditions make it impossible for employees to get to the University, or if the University is closed due to hazardous weather conditions, employees will be allowed to:

- Make-up the time lost from work at a time scheduled by the department head;
- 2. Use accrued annual leeve; or
- 3. Take leave without pay.

Unclassified employees who do accrue annual leave will use either option 1 or option 3. Use of annual leave or leave without pay should be noted on the time card or turnaround document.

Employees who wish to make up the lost time should do so prior to April first and should contact their department head to make arrangements. If an employee is going to make-up the time, the time missed should be entered on the turnaround document under the "other" category with a brief explantion that the time missed was for hazardous weather. When the time is made up, this time should be entered as "other" with a notation referring to the date of the hazardous weather.

This procedure will be used for instances of hazardous weather in the future. Please call Ext. 116 if you have questions.

USC-COASTAL CELEBRATES BLACK HISTORY WITH PIANIST

Concert Pianist Benjamin Woods Jr. will perform in the Lecture Hall at USC-Coastal Carolina College at 12:30 PM, Monday, February 19th as part of the college's recognition of Black History Month. The concert is sponsored by Cosastal's Music Department and the Afro-American Club. Admission is free to students and the public.

An instructor of music at Francis Marion College, Woods is an accomplished concert pianist and harpsichordist. He earned a Master of Music Degree form Midwestern University in 1972, and holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Music from Lamar University. He also conducted special studies in music at Vienna Academic of Music in Vienna, Austria.

Wood, who lives in Florence, is piano soloist with the Florence Symphony Orchestra and has performed solo concerts in California, Maryland, Michigan and Texas. He has given frequent recitials in South Carolina, including an all-Beethoven concert in Florence in 1979. He has served as official accompanist for the Texas Choral Directors Association and the American Choral Directors Association and he was a featured performer with Baylor Symphony Orchestra.

His February 19th concert at Coastal Carolina College will feature works by Bach, Mozart, Debussy, Rachmaninoff and Liszt.

DR. SKINNER TO ATTEND NUCLEAR SYMPOSIUM IN AUSTRIA

Dr. Ballou Skinner, Professor of Physics at Coastal Carolina College, has been officially nominated by the U.S. State Department to serve as a U.S. participant at the "International Symposium on Management of Gaseous Wastes from Nuclear Facilities", in Vienna, Austria from February 18-22, 1980.

The International Symposium was sponsored by the International Atomic Energy Agency. Skinner is currently serving as a member of the technical panel to the Regulatory and Facility Siting Subcommittee of the South Carolina Joint Legislature Committee on Energy. He is a former member of the South Carolina Nuclear Advisory Council.

GUJER ADDRESSES ARCHITECTS

Coastal History Professor Dr. Bruno Gujer delivered a lecture to the Horry County Association of Architects in Myrtle Beach last week.
