

Coastal sponsored women's golf tournament brings top women golfers to the Grand Strand

Coastal's second annual Carolyn Cudone Women's Intercollegiate Golf Tournament, co-sponsored by The Dial Corporation, will be held Friday, Nov. 12 through Sunday, Nov. 14 at The Dunes Golf and Beach Club in Myrtle Beach. Spectators are welcome to attend the tournament free-of-charge to observe what is expected to be spectacular play.

The tournament is named in honor of Carolyn Cudone, a Myrtle Beach resident and ambassador of the game of golf.

With 48 championships at the state and national levels, Cudone's experience also includes international victories in a 1956 Curtis Cup match between the United States and Great Britain; the 1960 Curtis Cup team, which Cudone captained; and the International Four Ball Match Play Championship in 1962. Cudone also is a five-time winner of the USGA Women's Senior National Championship (1968, 1969, 1970, 1971 and 1972), and finished second twice, and third once.

Cudone has been named to the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame, the South Carolina Golf Hall of Fame, the Carolinas Golf Hall of Fame, and the New York State Hall of Fame.

In 1981 Cudone, with the assistance of area golf professionals, organized the Myrtle Beach Area Junior Golf program, a prototype program that introduces children ages 8 to 18 to the game. In the 13 years since the junior program was established, many young golfers have participated in the popular program conducted at area courses during the summer.

The field includes women golfers from Auburn University, Florida State University, Louisiana State University, Memphis State University, Southern

The Greek letter social fraternity was founded at Yale University in 1845 and has grown to include 54 chapters across the United States. One founding father was from Charleston, S.C.

Alpha Sigma Phi national headquarters sponsors a program, "To Better the Man" that encompasses all aspects of fraternal life.

According to Mark Dinges, Greek Life Coordinator at Coastal, "We are excited to welcome Alpha Sigma Phi to Coastal Carolina University. They are a well-established fraternity with a rich history and are expected to offer much to our university."

Coastal Carolina theater presents *A Fish Story*

Coastal Carolina theater will perform *A Fish Story*, Friday and Saturday, Nov. 19 and 20 at 7:30 p.m., and Sunday, Nov. 21 at 3 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Tickets are \$8, \$5 for students.

Playwright Jon Tuttle, a Francis Marion University professor, calls *A Fish Story* a contemporary domestic comedy with a strangely unsettling happy ending.

Director Sandi Shackelford describes the play as a bold, passionate, and hilarious drama that "will delight all audiences."

A deviation from the traditional domestic comedy, the play's four characters all have individual agendas. The play centers around the family unit, the distinctive roles each member plays, and the stages and passages that families experience.

Nikki Deemer debuts as the confused and confined teenage daughter Annie,

who is desperately searching for a happy ending.

Michael Matthews plays the brash and unpredictable father George. Matthews has performed in previous Coastal Carolina Theater productions including: *Don't Drink the Water*, *Our Town*, *The Homecoming*, *1776*, and *Room Service*.

Pamela Ray, who has written and directed plays as a theater major, plays the spirited and outspoken mother Zee.

Jason Daniel Vail portrays the sensitive and smitten Frank. Vail's theater experience includes *Don't Drink the Water*, *1776*, and *Room Service*.

A forum, "A Fish Story Unraveled," will be presented by Shackelford and Tuttle on Friday, Nov. 19 at 6 p.m. (prior to the evening's performance) in the Student Center overflow area. The forum is free and open to the public and will illuminate the play as a distinctive familial case study. ☛

Hunger banquet dramatization to be held

Students Taking Active Responsibility (STAR) will host a *Hunger Banquet for a World Harvest* on Thursday, Nov. 18 from 6 to 8 p.m. in GCEC 003. Tickets are \$3; reservation deadline is Monday, Nov. 15. All proceeds go to Oxfam America, a non-profit international agency that works to fight hunger around the world.

The banquet will demonstrate the inequities of living conditions among people throughout the world. By random drawing, guests will receive dinners that represent these inequities.

A large meal is prepared and divided among participants in proportions that represent the earnings of people who live in the world's high-, middle-, and low-

income countries.

Figures for the hunger banquet are based on per capita Gross National Product. According to these numbers, 15 percent of participants will be served a gourmet meal, 25 percent will eat rice with beans or broth, and the remaining 60 percent will share rice and water.

"Through this dramatization, we hope to raise consciousness about world hunger while raising money for Oxfam America," said banquet coordinator Paula Sebastian.

The master's degree in education is the first graduate program to be offered through Coastal Carolina University. Additional graduate programs are offered at Coastal through USC Graduate and Regional Studies.

According to Dennis Wiseman, "Graduate study at Coastal Carolina University, moving into its second semester, is off to a good beginning. It is important that all graduate students meet with an education adviser in planning their program of study and in making course selections."
