ARTS FESTIVAL THIS WEEK!

USC-Coastal Carolina College will host the second annual Spring Arts Festival Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of this week.

Spring Arts Festival '80, which will present a variety of arts programs from around the state, will begin at 8 p.m., Wednesday, March 19, with a welcome by Coastal and USC-Columbia officials and a production of playwrite Tennessee Williams' drama, "Twenty-seven Wagons Full of Cotton."

For the next two days, beginning Thursday, March 20th, the Coastal Carolina College campus, located between Myrtle Beach and Conway, will be the center of one of the largest gatherings of artists in the history of the Waccamaw and Grand Strand communities.

Among the events, displays and activities during the two-day festival will be folk dancing, film festivals, batik workshops, dramatic productions, chalk drawing workshops, pottery firing, literary readings, musical reviews, African music, jazz, spirituals, trumpet and voice recitals, choral productions, magic acts, an international coffee house, a wine and cheese party, food booths, art exhibits, continuing events, clowns, mimes and a six-mile run.

All of the events are free and the public is invited to attend the entire fesitval, which continues form 10 a.m. — 4 p.m. Thursday and Friday. Artists from each USC campus and other artists and speakers will highlight the festival. Coastal's "horseshoe" drive will be closed for the festival.

COASTAL JOINS CAN-AM DAYS

Canadian visitors to the Grand Strand will have an opportunity to learn more about USC-Coastal Carolina College during Can-Am Days this year. Officials at Coastal have scheduled an openhouse at the college 10 a.m. — 11 a.m., Tuesday — Thursday, March 18-20.

"We'll be flying the Canadian flag to welcome our Canadian visitors," says Coastal Administrator Mildred Allen, organizer of the Can-Am open-house. "We feel everyone should know what opportunities are offered at Coastal. We've had Canadian students enrolled here in the past and we want Canadian visitors to know we're happy to have them here."

Open house at Coastal will begin at 10 a.m. in the college Administration Building and will include tours of the campus and an audio-visual presentation in the college media center.
