Coastal's literary magazine receives national honors

Archarios, Coastal's literary/art magazine, has received the Best of Show Award at the College Magazine Advisers (CMA) Convention held in Dallas, Texas, in October. In addition, the magazine received an All-American honor rating from the Associated College Press.

The CMA convention is held annually in cities across the United States. Competition categories include: literary/art magazine, news magazine, yearbook, and newspaper.

In Dallas, more than 2,000 students and advisers representing more than 250 schools from around the nation attended the convention. Nine judges from the Dallas/Fort Worth area reviewed 35 magazine entries and awarded *Archarios* the first place trophy, or Best of Show Award, in the literary/art magazine category.

In a separate competition, the magazine was mailed to New York for judging by the Associated College Press. Points are assigned by judges based on

Coastal professor publishes book

Marios Katsioloudes has recently published a book entitled *Strategic Planning for the Non-Profit Sector ... Theory & Cases*.

The book, published by McGraw-Hill, Inc., addresses the importance of strategic planning, defined by the author as the disciplined effort to produce fundamental decisions and actions that shape and guide an organization. According to Katsioloudes, the book is designed to help leaders, managers and students of the non-profit sector understand the need for a strategic planning process.

Eight case studies appear in the book, representing a wide variety of non-profit organizations in Horry and Georgetown counties.

Katsioloudes has worked and taught in Cyprus, Greece and the United States in a number of international profit and non-profit institutions. He served as an analyst and consultant with the Cyprus Development Bank and was a research assistant for several state and federal projects in Washington, D.C., Pennsylvania, and Athens, Greece.

Katsioloudes joined the Coastal faculty in 1990. After receiving an undergraduate degree in Athens, Greece, he received a master's degree in urban studies from the University of Bridgeport in Connecticut in 1978. In 1980, he received a master's degree in city and regional planning from the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania; in 1990 he received a Ph.D. from the same institution. He was a Fulbright Scholar to the United States from 1977 to 1980. ■

Volunteers needed for excavation of rice planter's plantation

Volunteers are needed to assist with an excavation which began Dec. 1 of *The Oaks*, the plantation home of Joseph and Theodosia Burr Alston who were wealthy rice planters who lived in the Waccamaw Neck in the early 1800s. The dig is lead by Jim Michie and funded by private gifts to Brookgreen Gardens.

Last year Michie led a search for the ruins of *The Oaks* and established the layout of the entire plantation including the location of the plantation home, overseer's and driver's homes, slave cabins, and barn and service buildings. Michie was hopeful that a project could be dedicated to the excavation of the house in the future.

Michie, two full-time workers, and volunteers are preparing for the excavation of the 233-year-old plantation house. "By finding footings, we can determine with a high degree of accuracy architectural design, while revealing other things forgotten long ago," Michie said. "Recovering hundreds and hundreds of artifacts from the house site will tell us a lot about the house and the Alston's quality and quantity of life," he said.

The team will continue working through Tuesday, Feb. 15, 1994.

From historical writings and documentation, Michie said certain things are known of the former inhabitants of the plantation house. For example, Theodosia Burr, the daughter of Aaron Burr, married Joseph Alston and moved to the Waccamaw Neck in 1802. The son of a wealthy rice planter, Alston had acquired considerable wealth and had inherited *The Oaks* from his grandfather.

Two years later, Theodosia gave birth to a son, Aaron Burr Alston. During the same year, her father shot and killed Alexander Hamilton, an American

statesman and political and economic theorist, in a duel. Although acquitted of murder charges, Burr left the country in self-imposed exile and did not return until 1812. Letters reveal that Theodosia's life was filled with embarrassment and even though she had her child, she longed for the love and support of her father. When Burr finally returned, he was in New York for only a short time when he received a letter from Theodosia explaining that her son had died.

In December 1812, she decided to visit her father. She boarded the *Patriot* in Georgetown and sailed on the last day of the year. She was never heard from again. Historical writings contain conflicting reports of the ship's disappearance - attributable to a pirate attack or a storm.

Four years later, her husband, who was elected governor of South Carolina in 1812, died at *The Oaks*.

The Oaks passed to Joseph's nephew, also named Joseph, and even though the plantation was active in terms of rice production, it had no permanent planter. The house burned to the ground sometime between 1816 and 1854, and after emancipation, the plantation fell into ruin and collapsed. In 1930, Archer Huntington purchased the property, which was covered with a thick forest of oaks and undergrowth.

Michie has 18 years of professional archaeological experience; he has led excavations at Richmond Hill and Wachesaw plantations, among others. He joined the Coastal faculty in 1990 and is associate director of the Waccamaw Center for Cultural and Historical Studies at the university. He received a master's degree from the University of Tennessee in 1987.

Reading and book signing by Coastal author announced

Stacy Cretzmeyer from Coastal's Center for Education and Community is the author of a recently published book about the experiences of a 4-year-old Jewish child who was in hiding with her family in Nazi-occupied France during World War II. A reading and book signing will be held Tuesday, Dec. 14 at 5:30 p.m. in the GCEC 003. Books will be available for purchase; refreshments will be served.

The book, *Your Name is Renée... Ruth's Story as a Hidden Child*, is the true story of Ruth Kapp Hartz, who survived the Nazi occupation of France through the cooperative efforts of a network of local French families, church leaders, and organizations that sought to shelter Jewish refugee children during the dark years of the Holocaust.

The original manuscript of *Your Name is Renée* has been selected to become part of the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum Archive. Cretzmeyer's book, published by Biddle Publishing Co., is available in local book stores.

Following her war experience, Hartz remained in France and graduated from the Sorbonne. In 1958, she came to the United States, where she met her husband and raised a family. Hartz taught French language and culture for 22 years at the Springside School in Philadelphia, Pa., where Cretzmeyer was her student.

As a student of Hartz, Cretzmeyer had an interest in learning more about the role that Catholics and other religious organizations played in sheltering Jewish children during the war. It was this desire that led to Cretzmeyer's collaboration with Hartz which has lasted nearly a decade.

Cretzmeyer received a master's degree in English and creative writing from Hollins College in Roanoke, Va. in 1982. She has received several writing awards including the Academy of American Poets' Prize and the Hollins Fiction Prize. She is currently completing further graduate studies in educational psychology at the University of South Carolina.
