Jazz pianist Allen Farnham will return to Coastal Friday, Jan. 21 at 7:30 p.m. to perform in Wheelwright Auditorium as part of the Wheelwright Series. Tickets are \$12, \$5 for students.

The 32-year-old accompanied soloist Susannah McCorkle on the Wheelwright stage four years ago.

Farnham remembers his 1990

appearance well. "That was a very knowledgeable and appreciative audience," he said. "Any performer would like at least one of those qualities in an audience," he said, "to have them both is a rare treat."

Drummer Jamey Haddad and bassist Drew Gress comprise the rest of the Farnham trio. Farnham began studying

Fred McCall-Perez – health care consultant, psychologist and educator – will speak Thursday, Jan. 13 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium as part of the Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series. The lecture is free and open to the public.

McCall-Perez is a nationally recognized leader in health care, and recently worked with President Clinton's Health Care Task Force and served on the White House Health Professions Review Group. He is president of Group Practice Consultants, Inc., a Miami-based health care firm serving physicians, insurance companies, managed care companies, and large employers. McCall-Perez has been a senior executive with several national managed behavioral health care firms.

He earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Illinois, a master's degree in developmental psychology from The Ohio State University and a Ph.D. in learning disabilities from the University of Arizona. McCall-Perez is a past associate professor of special education at San Jose State University in California. He has been published in numerous professional journals and is a frequent writer and speaker on health care issues.

HGTC and Coastal to continue vanpool with extended route for commuter students

A vanpool/commuter program will be continue to be available for students of Horry-Georgetown Technical College and Coastal Carolina University who live in the Georgetown/Andrews and Pawleys Island/Murrells Inlet areas and are enrolled in courses or programs not offered on the Georgetown campuses of the two institutions.

In an effort to broaden the service areas of the vanpool program, the new spring semester 1994 route will be accessible to residents near Highways 17 and 501

The Coastal Rapid Public Transit Authority (CRPTA) van will provide round trip transportation, five days a week, beginning Monday, Jan. 10 and continuing through the semester. The van will leave Georgetown at 7 a.m. and depart from Conway no later than 4 p.m. depending on passengers' needs. The route begins at the Georgetown County Library on Cleland Street and follows Highways 17 and 501 to the

Conway campuses.

The cost of the vanpool service is \$3 daily, or \$12.50 weekly. In order to keep fares at a reasonable level, a minimum of 10 students must ride in the 14-passenger van. Seats will be available on a first come, first-serve hasis

Seats not filled by students or institutional employees will be available to the general public on a first come, first-serve basis. If demand is great, a second van will be provided.

Two students will be needed to serve as driver and backup driver. These students will be compensated for driving and maintaining custody of the

Fulbright-Hayes grant applications available for travel-study in India

The South Carolina Consortium for International Studies and Francis Marion University have applied for a Fulbright-Hayes grant to take 11 professors and five social science high school teachers to India. The travelstudy seminar is scheduled for July 7 through August 13.

Selection of participants will be made by former Fulbright Scholars from Lander, Francis Marion and Coastal Carolina universities. Applicants must have the endorsement of a school official (academic dean or provost.)

The Fulbright grant will pay for international travel within India, hotels, and most meals. Participants will pay for sundry and personal items. Each participant also must pay an administrative fee of \$1,250 and the participant's institution must pay a registration fee of \$1,000.

If the project is not funded for summer 1994, the consortium will resubmit the project for summer 1995. All applications received will remain in the active file.

Coastal will offer a course entitled Writing the Popular Song: A Lyrics Workshop during the spring 1994 semester. The class will meet Tuesdays from 7:30 to 10:15 p.m. and is open to

songwriters of all levels.

Students may receive three hours of academic credit for the course, or the course may be taken for non-credit through Continuing Education. The course will include discussions of the business and legal aspects of songwriting and will teach the writer how to begin with an idea and end up with a demo - ready to pitch. The ability to play piano or guitar is helpful but not required.

Paul Rice, an English professor at Coastal since 1987, will conduct the class. As a published songwriter and one of the South's most recognized poets. Rice conducts poetry workshops and readings, and leads workshops on the language of country music.

To open the semester-long celebration, "A Peace Circle" will be held Tuesday, Jan. 18 at noon on the Horseshoe in front of the Singleton Building. The African-American Student Association and Student Government Association present this hands-on tribute to Martin Luther King Jr.

The "Greater Gospel Sing Out" will be held Sunday, Jan. 30 at 6 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. This annual event features the Coastal Carolina Gospel Choir as well as guest groups

from the area.

Echoes of Africa" will be performed Tuesday, Feb. 8 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The event, performed by a professional touring group, offers a glimpse of the African folk origins of America's popular music and dance: songs, rhythms, and stories kept on the Georgia Sea Islands, older Piedmont blues from the Virginia Tidewater, kora, music, drumming and solo vocals from West Africa, and modern tap. Third Quarter courses for spring 1994 announced

Coastal invites those age 55 or older to enroll in Third Quarter, an academic and cultural program for older students.

The spring 1994 session begins Monday, Jan. 10 and continues through Monday, March 14; each course meets once a week. No educational prerequisites are required for participants in Third Quarter.

Third Quarter is sponsored through a membership fee that covers the cost of courses; a campus parking decal; Coastal identification and student privileges; use of Kimbel Library; and discounts on the purchase of the university's cultural arts package.

Course offerings for the spring 1994 session include:

Mondays: Jan. 10 to March 14
• Getting to Know the Artist Behind the Masterpiece
1 to 2:30 p.m.

Instructor: Bobbie H. Lawson
This course will delve into the lives and works of two masters in the history of art, Rembrandt and Matisse. Although separated by centuries and nationality, both possessed a rare genius for interpreting the world. Their biographies reveal men of complexity and courage. Discussions will center around the artists' humanity as well as their technical mastery. Format will be lecture and class participation augmented by slide and book illustrations.

• Eastern Europe in Transition: From Communism to Market Economy 3 to 4:30 p.m.

Instructor: James Farsolas
This course will deal with the major causes that led to the collapse of the communist system in Eastern Europe and the major political, economic, and social changes brought about in the former communist countries of Poland, Czechoslovakia, East Germany, Hungary, Yugoslavia, Albania, Bulgaria, and Romania. Emphasis will be placed on the rise of ethnic or separatist tendencies and internal conflicts in this area of Europe.

• Experience the Theater: A Participatory Workshop on Acting 3 to 4:30 p.m.

Instructor: Dan Danforth
This course will involve reading scripts, improvisation, casting and interpretation of characters in plays, working on movements of the actors

(blocking), and lecture. Emphasis will be placed on group participation and participants will end the course by performing excerpts from a Broadway play before a live audience.

Tuesdays - Jan. 11 to March 8
• Great Books Seminar
1 to 2:30 p.m.

Instructor: Jack Riley
This course will focus on a number of short readings in literature, drama, philosophy, history, and politics from the tradition of great books. These readings involve inquiry into the issues and questions that are of enduring human significance. Active discussion is a vital component of this class.

• The History of Horry County: The People Who Shaped the Independent Republic 3 to 4:30 p.m.

Instructor: Catherine Lewis
This course will focus on the people who have moved and shaped Horry County throughout history. Reading, lectures, videotapes, and discussion will introduce students to the men and women who have lived and worked in the county, shaping the distinctive personality, attitudes, and culture of the Independent Republic of Horry.

Wednesdays: Jan. 12 to March 9
• Jazz: America's Classical Music
1 to 2:30 p.m.

Instructor: Ray Morvant
This course will explore the various elements which led to the birth and evolution of America's indigenous art form – jazz. There will be live and recorded performances to sharpen the perception and appreciation of jazz, and presentations are accessible to all regardless of musical experience.
Musicians are encouraged to bring their instruments for spontaneous jam sessions.

• Creative Writing: Revisions as Quest • 3 to 4:30 p.m.

Instructor: Susan Meyers
To revise writing is to re-see it from a different perspective, as well as to improve its style. Class participants will approach each assignment more than once in quest of what does and does not work. The focus will be on exploring the many directions a writer can take with a piece of writing. At the end of the course, class members will self-publish an anthology of their works. This course is limited to 15 participants.

Thursdays: Jan. 13 to March 10
• An Introduction to the Natural
History of South Carolina's
Northern Coastal Plain
1 to 2:30 p.m.

Instructor: Julie Finlayson
This indoor course will focus on various types of wetlands in the Coastal plain, covering the whole spectrum of birds, animals, and plants from the nitrogen poor soils of the coastal plain, to the harsh salt environment of the marshes and beaches. Format will be lectures, slides, projects, hands-on study, and discussion.

 An Outdoor Study of South Carolina's Northern Coastal Plain 3 to 4:30 p.m.

Instructor: Julie Finlayson
This outdoor course will explore the ecology of the coastal plain, from the unique ecosystem of the ocean to the strange phenomenon of the Carolina Bays. Included will be visits to the various wetland habitats of the coastal plain to study the adaptations made by native birds, plants, and animals.

Lectures from the indoor course will be directly linked with this course's planned field trips.

• The American Short Story: Cut to the Bone 3 to 4:30 p.m.

Instructor: John Beard
Can you explain life in 3,000 words or less? Some great writers have attempted it. The short story is a relatively recent development, compared to drama or poetry, but it provides vivid and often intense glimpses of who we are and how we live. This course will study the maturation of the short story and will focus on such recognized masters as Hemingway, O'Connor and Updike. It will also examine new developments in the genre by Raymond Carver, Ann Beattie, Alice Walker and other contemporary writers.

For one or two classes, the fee is \$35 per course. One person may take up to four courses for \$100. If you have a friend, spouse or neighbor interested in joining Third Quarter, the two of you may take four courses each for \$150 (\$75 per person).

Registration continues through Thursday, Jan. 20 in the Continuing Education Office.


