

Nine individuals were presented with Coastal Carolina University Service Awards on Friday, Feb. 4 at a dinner sponsored by the Alumni Association. The annual awards are presented by the volunteer boards and support organizations at Coastal in recognition of outstanding contributions and leadership to the university and the community.

The 1994 recipients are :

• Athletic Hall of Fame inductee Michael "Mickey" Brantley '83

Brantley played baseball at Coastal in 1981 and 1982 and was the Seattle Mariners' baseball team's number two selection in the June 1983 draft. Brantley signed with the San Francisco Giants as a free agent in 1991; and signed with the Yomiuri Giants of Japan in June 1993.

• CINO Club

Stephen G. Taylor '76

Taylor was a student assistant for women's basketball at Coastal from 1973 to 1974. He received a bachelor's degree in health and physical education from Coastal in 1976 and a master's degree in secondary education social sciences from the University of South Carolina in 1979. Taylor was women's basketball coach and intramural director at Charleston Southern University from 1985 to 1987; physical education instructor and women's basketball coach at Coastal from 1978 to 1985; and Coastal's women's softball coach from 1980 to 1985. Taylor is currently head basketball coach at Kinard High School in Orangeburg, South Carolina.

Calling All Colors conference a huge success

Coastal's *Calling All Colors '94*, a race unity conference for students in grades three through eight, was held Saturday, Jan. 22 in the Wall School of Business Building.

Two hundred students from 20 Horry County schools attended the conference. The conference gives young people the opportunity to talk about their feelings and experiences with race and race relations, and to learn about other people's ideas for building cross-cultural bridges. The conference included workshops, drama, cooperative activities, art and more.

Through collaborative brainstorming, participants came up with school action plans at the conference. Some of these plans included harmony clubs, debates, poster contests and interactive parent/ student skit clubs.

In an effort to promote a sense of community for conference attendees, conference size was limited to 200 participants; 60 students placed their names on a waiting list.

According to Sally Hare, conference organizers are looking at ways to encourage schools and communities to adopt their own version of *Calling All Colors.* "Our hope is that participants will take what they learned during the conference back to their own schools and communities."

A follow-up meeting is planned for April at Coastal Carolina University.

The first Calling All Colors conference was held in January 1992. Anisa Kintz, the then 9-year-old Conway student who initiated the conference, was named President Bush's 750th Daily Point of Light in April 1992. Kintz was featured on a two-hour Disney special focusing on Point of Light Award recipients that aired July 4, 1992 on CBS. Kintz and six other children from around the country were featured with the Rev. Jesse Jackson on a Disney Channel special on children combatting racism during December 1992.

Calling All Colors also was named a Program of Excellence by the National Continuing Education Association in 1992 and won a Creative Programming Award from the National University Continuing Education Association in 1993.

"Echos of Africa" to be performed in Wheelwright Auditorium

Echoes of Africa, performed by the professional touring group Columbia Artists Festivals, will be presented Tuesday, Feb. 8 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Tickets are \$12; \$5 for students.

Performers will present the Africanfolk origins of America's popular music and dance: songs, rhythms and stories kept on the Georgia Sea Islands, older Piedmont blues from the Virginia Tidewater, kora music, drumming and solo vocals from West Africa, and modern tap.

The performance is best described by Tennessee farmer Charles Boren, who said, "That Juba patting, we learned that from the old people. My Great-uncle Preston, my Grannie's brother, he was born in slavery and he was the best that ever done that. It come down from slavery. They didn't have no instruments to play. So they done that."

Echos of Africa is funded, in part, by the Horry Cultural Arts Council and the South Carolina Arts Commission, which receive support from the National Endowment for the Arts, and the Horry County Council.

Juli Streater Powers '79 and William E. Stanton '86

Juli Streater Powers from Clio, S.C., was elected to the first Board of Trustees of Coastal Carolina University in July 1993. A 1979 graduate of Coastal, she received a bachelor's degree in health and physical education and received the Outstanding Student Award. She was a member of the women's basketball team in 1976.

Teaching in the Horry County School system from 1979 to 1980, Powers wrote and implemented the first elementary level health and physical education curriculum for the county. She also taught and was athletic coach in the Chesterfield County Public School system from 1980 to 1981.

An active member of the community and state, Powers is involved with a number of organizations, such as the South Carolina Arts Commission -Cultural Visions Task Force; Marlboro County Civic Center Foundation; and the Pee Dee Indian Association Advisory Board. Since 1988, She is a founder and has been director of the Children's Performing Arts Camp for the Marlboro Arts Council since it's beginning in 1988. She served as commissioner for the Marlboro County Parks and Recreation Commission from 1988 to 1991; a speaker for the Chamber of **Commerce Leadership Training** Program in 1992; and a guest member of the visiting committee for the Joint Legislative Commission on Cultural Affairs at the South Carolina Governor's School of the Arts in 1991 - 1992.

William E. Stanton has been an active member of the Coastal Carolina Alumni Association since his graduation from Coastal in 1986 with a bachelor's degree in business administration. He served as vice president of the Alumni Association in 1992–1993 and currently serves as president.

Stanton has been employed as director of sales and marketing with Himmelsbach Communications, Inc., in North Myrtle Beach, since 1986.

Smith has been a director of the Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc., since 1959. He has held the offices of treasurer, vice president, and president.
