COASTAL CAROLINA TO HOLD SEMINAR ON MANAGING PERSONAL FINANCES ON FRIDAY, MAY 9TH

In reaction to the current concern with inflation and its effect on personal finances, USC-Coastal Carolina College will sponsor a public seminar entitled "Personal Financial Planning," on Friday, May 9th, from 9 a.m. — 4 p.m. in the campus College Center. Registration for the seminar is now being accepted by the college Department of Continuing Education.

The seminar leader is Lewis J. Walker, a certified financial planner and a partner in Walker-Stevens Associates in Atlanta, Georgia, a firm specializing in personal and business financial planning. A graduate of Georgetown University, Walker holds an MBA degree in Marketing from Northwestern University. He is a member of the International Association of Financial Planners and the Institute of Certified Financial Planners. An active proponent of "conceptual financial planning," Mr. Walker is a well-regarded speaker before business, social and professional organizations. He has been a frequent guest on radio and television programs and his articles have appeared in various publications. Faculty and staff may attend for half-price—\$25 per person or \$30 if you bring your spouse.

COASTAL CAROLINA COLLEGE SPONSORS SUICIDE SEMINAR

Each year suicide claims 50,000 lives in the United States, says Dr. Friedrich V. Wenz, the leader of a Suicide Workshop planned at USC-Coastal Carolina College on Monday, May 12th.

"Suicide is the nation's 10th leading cause of death," Wenz says. "It is common in all segments of society. In fact, the number of deaths is only part of the problem. Add to it the 250,000 unsuccessful suicide attempts and the more than a million suicide threats that take place each year and the true picture of the massive problem of suicide emerges."

The truth about suicide and how to prevent it are the main themes of Coastal Carolina College's suicide workshop, which is sponsored by the college's Department of Continuing Education. The college is taking registration now and college officials hope to have the workshop filled by Friday, May 2nd. Enrollment is limited and pre-registration is required. Faculty and staff may attend for half-price—\$25 per person.

On March 29, 1980 Dr. Reinhold Engelmayer addressed the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free Masons of South Carolina in Columbia, S.C. by presenting a paper on "The American Indian and Freemasonry". The paper concentrated on the Cherokee tribe, whose history as one of the major tribes of South Carolina is intricately tied in with the history of Freemasonry in South Carolina as well as the Anti-Mason Party of 1832, and its influence on Federal politics. The Cherokees established the first Masonic Lodge in an Indian nation.
