Annual contest brings many top high school math students to Coastal

The Department of Mathematics will hold the 15th annual Mathematics Contest for High School Students on Friday, March 11 on campus. More than 200 high school students representing 19 schools are expected to participate in the competition.

The competition is funded, in part, by a grant from GTE to Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc. The 1994 contest marks the third year of sponsorship by GTE. The contest winner will be awarded \$500 in scholarship funds derived from the GTE gift.

In addition, the Horry County Higher Education Commission will award the top finisher from Horry County a full tuition scholarship to attend Coastal for four years and major in mathematics.

Participating South Carolina high schools are: Andrews, Berkeley, Brookland-Cayce, Conway, Georgetown, Goose Creek, Hammond, Hemingway, Irmo, James Island, Johnsonville, Lake View, Marion, North Myrtle Beach, Pee

Dee Academy, Socastee, Waccamaw, Wando, and Wilson.

Students in the competition will be given one-hour examinations consisting of written, objective questions. Participants compete for individual awards on two levels: Level I questions are taken from Algebra I, Algebra II, and Geometry; Level II questions are taken from Algebra I, Algebra II, Advanced Algebra, Geometry, and Trigonometry. For each school, the top three scores in each level will be added together to determine a team score. An awards presentation follows the competition.

Registration begins at 9:30 a.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium, examinations will be held from 11:20 a.m. to 12:20 p.m., and the awards presentation will be held at 2 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Coastal co-sponsors nature-based tourism development conference

Coastal is co-sponsoring the first *Nature-Based Tourism Development Conference* on Monday, March 14 and Tuesday, March 15 in Pawleys Island. Conference cost is \$75, or \$85 at the door; early registration is recommended.

Through the cooperative efforts of 10 sponsors, the conference intends to bring together people interested in the development and marketing of this growing industry throughout the state. Speakers from Clemson University, the University of Idaho, and several state environmental agencies will present talks designed to address topics such as what nature-based tourism is; why nature-based tourism is important to business and community; how to start a nature-based tourism business; and more.

Conference participants will take one of five educational field trips to learn of the opportunities and challenges of nature-based tourism. Field trips sites include Back Woods Quail Club, Baruch

Institute Nature Tour, Brookgreen Canoe Trip, Captain Dick's Marina and Captain Sandy's Tours. Field trip assignments are limited and will be made on a first-come, first-serve basis upon receipt of registration forms.

Medical ethics and health care policy videoconference to deal with quality of life

Continuing Education will present *Quality of Life at the End of Life*, a live interactive videoconference about medical ethics and health care policy, Thursday, March 24 from 12:30 to 3 p.m. in the Graduate and Continuing Education Building, room 003.

The videoconference, produced by the Virginia Polytechnic Institute, is especially appropriate for health care professionals, social workers, and mental health professionals who are concerned with medical ethics and health care policy.

The focus of the videoconference is to clarify exceedingly difficult issues about how technology affects the quality of life, whether patient wishes for suicide or for prolonged life should be honored, and what role government should play in rationing or ensuring health care.

A clinician, medical ethicist, theologian, lawyer, and public policy expert will provide their insights into these questions. Case study dramatizations offer true-to-life situations for review.

Participants will receive certificates for 0.25 Continuing Education Units (CEUs) and 2.5 training hours approved by the South Carolina State Board of Social Work Examiners.

This teleconference is funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Registration is \$20, which will include lunch if registered by Thursday, March 22. Space is limited; early registration is recommended.
