The Horry County Higher Education Commission has announced the appointment of three new members. Terry G. Chandler, Etrulia P. Dozier and Peggy M. Vogel will each serve four-year terms as commission members.

Chandler is a retired educator who has served as a teacher, principal and administrator. He earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education from Catawba College and a master's degree in educational administration from the University of Virginia. He was an elementary and junior high school principal in Florence County, S.C., before joining Horry County Schools in 1977 as director of Elementary and Middle School Education. The organization has played a significant role in the continuing development of Coastal Carolina University.

Prince wins book award

Eldred E. "Wink" Prince Jr., associate professor of history and chair of Coastal's Department of History, has won the prestigious George C. Rogers Jr. Award for the Best Book of South Carolina History for 2001. Prince's book *Long Green: The Rise and Fall of Tobacco in South Carolina* was published last year by the University of Georgia Press. Prince received the award recently at the South Carolina Historical Society's 147th annual meeting in Charleston.

The South Carolina Historical Society presents the award annually to recognize extraordinary accomplishments in the historiography of South Carolina. The award is named for the late George C. Rogers Jr., distinguished historian, professor and author of many books on South Carolina history.

A native of Loris, Prince joined the Coastal faculty in 1987. He earned a bachelor's degree, master's degree and a Ph.D. in history from the University of South Carolina.

Grande Dunes tour raises money for archaeology, history

An event showcasing one of the area's newest housing developments is helping support the study of the area's past.

The recent tour of the new Grande Dunes development, a 2,200-acre resort and residential community in Myrtle Beach developed by Burroughs and Chapin Company, Inc., raised a total of \$7,645. Proceeds from the event, which was organized by Susan McMillan of Conway and Joanne Milnor of Murrells Inlet, were donated to Coastal Carolina University's Archaeology Endowment and to the Horry County Historical Society.

McMillan has been closely involved with many of Coastal's past archaeological endeavors, which were led for many years by former history professor and archaeologist Jim Michie. In the 1980s and early 1990s Michie led many successful archaeological excavations on the sites of several Georgetown County plantations including Richmond Hill, The Oaks, Arcadia and Mansfield.

The Archaeology Endowment at Coastal will help fund future archaeological programs in the area.
