ENROLLMENT DATA INCOMPLETE, BUT GROWTH LOOKS FIRM

Coastal Admissions Director Marsh Myers says enrollment data is not finally tabulated, but he predicts another healthy enrollment for Coastal Carolina College.

"Our freshman class and our transfers look real good," he says. "It looks like our freshman class will be significantly larger than last years and will be our largest freshman class ever. Things look good for 1980-81. Enrollment looks very healthy at Coastal and we're very pleased with the reaction to the establishment of a freshman year in our Georgetown program.

"We'll be able to announce our final enrollment data within a week."

COASTAL OFFERS VARIETY IN SHORT COURSES

If you're looking for an alternative to spending your evenings in front of the television, Coastal is offering a variety of evening and weekend short-courses ranging from bridge to watercolor instruction.

The courses are part of Coastal's 1980 Fall I Continuing Education Series, which offers non-credit short-courses in various subjects from mid-September through October.

Among the courses offered in Fall I are Salesmanship - a course covering the fundamentals of selling; Batik Workship - a course in fabric designs for paintings, church banners and sculptures; Beginning and Intermediate Bridge; Beginning and Intermediate Drawing; Beginning and Intermediate Painting; the Art of Middle Eastern Dance; and Beginning, Intermediate and Advanced Tennis.

All courses include fees and registration can be made by telephone. The deadline for registration is Monday, September 22nd.

HORRY-GEORGETOWN MATHEMATICS COUNCIL TO MEET SEPT. 9

The Horry-Georgetown Mathematics Advancement Council will hold its fall meeting at 4 p.m., September 9th at the College Center on the campus of USC-Coastal Carolina College.

Math Consultant Charles E. Allen will be the featured speaker for the meeting. A mathematics instructor at Roosevelt High School in Los Angeles, Allen is the author of a variety of mathematics textbooks and is a popular speaker in the field of education.

A graduate of Central State University in Ohio and the University of Southern California, Allen has written textbooks for Rand McNally, Houghton-Mifflin, Ginn and Company, Creative Publications and other publishers. He has 23 years of experience in the classroom and serves as a consultant for local school districts and state departments of education throughout the nation. He is also a member of the Board of Directors of the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics.

Prior to the Sept. 9th meeting, Allen will spend the day performing in-service work at schools in Horry County.

Teachers who attend the Mathematics Advancement Council meetings will receive staff development credit. The cost of attending Allen's lecture at USC-Coastal Carolina College will be \$3 for members and non-members. The \$3 fee is payment of annual dues for the council and will provide members with special benefits during the year.

WHILE YOU WERE GONE

The Coastal Faculty Senate met July 8. The Senate approved all recommendations by the Academic Affairs Committee, which included the addition of a new course, "Introduction to the Fine Arts 110," and changes in the requirements for a bachelor of science and bachelor of arts degree in interdisciplinary studies. The IS program now requires 12 more hours in humanities courses for the BA degree, and 2 more hours in science and mathematics courses for the BS degree in interdisciplinary studies.

The Coastal administration issued a faculty grievance proposal to the Senate, which was similar to the policy approved in the spring by the Columbia Senate. The proposal received tentative approval as a working document until a final vote on the policy can be taken in the fall.

The next meeeting will be held Oct. 4.

SOCCER SEASON SHOWS PROMISE

The 1980 soccer season may be the best one yet for Coastal Carolina College. Most of last season's 10.4-1 District 6 playoff team is returning says Coastal Coach John Farrelly.

"One of the most impressive things about the preseason practice this year is the degree of enthusiasm and fitness brought back by the players," Farrelly says. "We are far ahead of schedule at this point in time than we were last year. Perhaps this is just as well because after the first game against College of Charleston the pressure is going to be intense.

"The next three games include NCAA powers, UNC-Wilmington and the University of South Carolina followed by the NAIA District 26 champs, Atlantic Christian College."

This year Coastal will use a new soccer field of Tifton grass, located in the rear of the campus. "It is a real boost to our morale to be able to play on our fine new home field this year," said Farrelly.

"The starting lineup is a very well-balanced unit with no obvious weak links and the players compliment each other in their style of play. The influx of new blood has provided us with several key players in the line-up which has given us this balance.

"Of course," continued Farrelly, "the strength of any team lies in its bench and this is going to be a very strong department this year. As the new freshmen continue to develop their skills to the acceptable level, their playing time should increase over the season."
