New master's degree in coastal marine and wetland studies

Coastal Carolina University has been approved by the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education to establish a new master's degree program in coastal marine and wetland studies beginning in the fall of 2003.

According to Valgene Dunham, special assistant to Coastal President Ronald R. Ingle, the program was developed in response to the impressive growth in enrollment and academic achievement of undergraduate science students in recent years. The new program is set up to be interdisciplinary, drawing from across the existing undergraduate science degree programs to allow a broad base of faculty involvement and research opportunities. The program also aims to increase Coastal's community outreach by focusing on research relating to the local environment.

The new program will establish a curriculum that is unique to environmental studies in the region, attracting graduate students from across the nation who are interested in the climate, geography, and landscape of the Grand Strand area. The program's core courses, including ecology, coastal processes and coastal management, differentiate it from similar programs offered in South Carolina. In addition, Coastal's facilities on Waites Island, a 1,062-acre natural laboratory on the Atlantic coast near Little River, will be continued on page 2

Collin to speak on American foreign relations for annual lecture

Richard Oliver Collin, Palmetto Professor of politics and a recognized authority on international affairs and terrorism, will give a public lecture on the faltering relationship between the United States and the global community with specific reference to the Sept. 11 terrorist attack and the proposed American war against Iraq. Collins' talk, titled "Us and Them: Why the World Puzzles America," is the 2002 installment of the annual Distinguished Teacher-Scholar Lecturer series and is scheduled for Thursday, Oct. 17 at 7:30 p.m. in Wall Auditorium. The event is free and open to the public.

In his lecture, Collin draws on his wide experience both as a scholar and as a former intelligence officer for the U.S. Defense Department. He critiques America's hegemonic position as the world's sole superpower in the post-Cold War world and examines our status from the perspective of other nations around the world and the Middle East in particular.

Collin earned a bachelor's degree in classical languages and history from Canisius College in Buffalo, N.Y., in 1962, a master's degree in political science from Kansas University in 1973, and a D.Phil. in politics

from Britain's Oxford University in 1983. After earning his bachelor's degree, Collin began graduate school at Harvard but his studies were interrupted



when he was called to active duty by the U.S. Army. He spent two years at the Pentagon as a briefing officer, serving under the Army's Deputy Chief of Staff of Intelligence. As a civilian official for the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA), Collin was stationed in Rome for five years.

In the early 1970s, Collin spent a number of years in the Middle East, where he witnessed civil wars in Lebanon and Oman as well as the events leading to the fall of the Shah of Iran. After resigning from the government, Collin served with the University of Maryland's European division, teaching in Italy, Spain, Morocco, Greece, Great Britain and Germany. He joined the Coastal faculty in 1984.

"Teach-In" on Iraq scheduled for Oct. 10

A "Teach-In" on the Iraqi situation will be held on Thursday, Oct. 10 at Coastal Carolina University. Two sessions are scheduled, one in the afternoon at 3:30 p.m. and an evening session at 7 p.m., in the Recital Hall in the Edwards College of Humanities and Fine Arts. Both sessions are free and open to the public.

The idea to host a teach-in involving students and the community in an open discussion about the looming Iraqi situation originated with faculty members in Coastal's Edwards College of Humanities and Fine Arts.

"The event is meant to emulate the 1960s-style, informal forum in which people from all walks of life can air their views and opinions," said Coastal politics professor James Henderson, one of the organizers of the event. "The growing hostility between

the United States and the Republic of Iraq is a vitally important topic in the world today and, with the possibility of an armed conflict between the two countries on the horizon, it's important that people have an opportunity to express their opinion."

At each session a brief presentation of the basic international political background will be given by a panel of experts. The afternoon session will be led by Coastal professor Richard Collin, international relations specialist in Coastal's Department of Politics and Geography who served with the Army and the Defense Intelligence Agency in Europe and the Middle East. The evening speaker will be Max Carter, director of the Friends Center at Guilford College and a Middle East specialist. Following their brief talks, the discussion will be opened to the audience in an open-mike format.

In addition to Collin and Carter, members of the panel will include:

- Douglas Benson, a 20-year veteran of the U.S. Army who has served in airborne and special operations in the U.S., Korea, Saudi Arabia and other parts of the Middle East;
- Lee Bollinger, an assistant professor of Engish and journalism at Coastal;
- James Henderson, professor of politics at Coastal and a specialist in contemporary history and international political economics;
- Father Richard Labecque, pastor of Saint James Roman Catholic Church in Conway;
- Preston McKever-Floyd, senior instructor of religion and philosophy at Coastal.

affairs, Collin has been particularly interested in studying the roots of political violence. His novels include: *Imbroglio* (1981), *Contessa* (1994) and *The Man With Many Names* (1995). His latest book, *Whole Earth: Life and Politics on a Small Planet*, will be published in 2003.

Collin is the seventh recipient of the Distinguished Teacher-Scholar Lecturer award, sponsored annually by Horry Telephone Cooperative.

The new program will be the first master's degree offered by Coastal outside the College of Education as well as the first to require a thesis as part of the curriculum. Another goal of the program is to develop various cooperative educational programs with the University of South Carolina, the College of Charleston and Clemson University.

As part of the conference, Guentzel also served as a member of a panel of experts who identified gaps in our understanding of atmospherically transported pollutants.
- Jo-Ann Morgan and Charles Wright participated in "Sculpture Celebration," an outdoor sculpture exhibition in Lenoir, N.C. on Sept. 6.
