Interim director named at Georgetown campus

Coastal Carolina University and the Georgetown County Higher Education Commission announce the appointment of Sarah Magann as interim director of Coastal's Georgetown campus, effective Aug. 16.

Magann replaces Stewart Strothers, who retired June 30.

With the university and the community, the interim director will lead Coastal's efforts as a plan for higher education in Georgetown County is developed. The interim director also serves as an academic and administrative liaison between the Georgetown and Conway campuses of the university.

"I feel confident that the appointment of Sarah Magann as interim director will help ensure that the university continues to fulfill its mission of providing educational

Coastal receives accolades from House and Senate

Coastal Carolina University has been recognized with a concurrent resolution by the S.C. General Assembly commemorating the school's 40th anniversary.

Introduced by the Horry County Delegation, the document is "a concurrent resolution congratulating Coastal Carolina University on its 40th anniversary as an institution of higher learning, and commending the university on its phenomenal success and for its outstanding achievements in higher education."

The resolution sited Coastal's written history which states that 40 years ago on July 23, 1954, a group of citizens met to discuss the creation of a local college.

opportunities in Georgetown County," said Provost John Idoux.

Magann has been an assistant professor in the Department of Educational Leadership and Foundations at the University of South Alabama in Mobile since 1991.

Previously, she was employed by Santa Fe Community College in Gainesville, Fla., for nine years. Prior Santa Fe positions include: high school dual enrollment coordinator from 1985 to 1991; career associate special training program coordinator from 1983 to 1985; and a counselor in special services from 1983 to 1985.

While at Santa Fe Community College, Magann developed a recruitment system which increased and stabilized program enrollment; the school also achieved a 70 percent graduation rate with at-risk students.

Magann received a doctorate in educational administration in 1980, supervision certification in 1972, and a master's degree in curriculum and instruction and certification in exceptional children in 1967, all from UNC-Greensboro. She received a bachelor's degree in sociology from the Women's College of North Carolina in 1962 before it became UNC-Greensboro.

"I'm very pleased about this opportunity and look forward to being available to assist students in Georgetown as well as working with the faculty and staff of Coastal Carolina University," Magann said.

Coastal Carolina Junior College officially opened in September 1954 as a result of the group's efforts. Since then, the university has developed into a four-year degree granting institution with a student population of more than 4,400.

Drivers needed for commuter vanpool

A vanpool/commuter program is available for students of Horry-Georgetown Technical College and Coastal Carolina University who live in the Georgetown/Andrews and Pawleys Island/Murrells Inlet areas and are enrolled in courses or programs not offered on the Georgetown campuses of the two institutions.

A driver has been hired temporarily; in order for this service to continue to be offered, two students age 21 years or older, are needed to serve as driver and backup driver. These students will be compensated for driving and maintaining the van.

The Coastal Rapid Public Transit Authority (CRPTA) van will provide round trip transportation, five days a week, beginning Thursday, Aug. 25 and continuing through the semester. The van will leave Georgetown at 7 a.m. and depart from Conway no later than 4 p.m. depending on passengers' needs. The route begins at the Georgetown County Library on Cleland Street and follows Highways 17 and 501 to the Conway campuses.

The cost of the vanpool service is \$3 daily, or \$12.50 weekly. In order to keep fares at a reasonable level, a minimum of 10 students must ride in the 14-passenger van. Seating will be available on a first come, first-serve basis.

Seats not filled by students or institutional employees will be available to the general public on a first come, first-serve basis. If demand is great, a second van will be provided.

Michael Gilbert, with co-editor Jost Hermand from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, recently had "German Essays on Music" published in Volume 43 of The German Library. The book, a historical anthology of critical writings on music by German writers, philosophers, social scientists, and others, is Published by Continuum, New York, as a companion to Volume 51, Writings of German Composers. The project was supported by grants from Inter Nationes (Bonn) and the Robert Bosch Memorial Foundation, in cooperation with the Deutsches Haus, New York University. The German Library is a 100-volume series of primary texts in English translation covering the history of German literature and culture from the Middle Ages to the present.

Karen Carpenter recently received a sex-equity mini grant of \$4,997 from the South Carolina Department of Education for her middle school program entitled "The New Women's Work: Alternative Careers for Women in Science and Technology." The year long program begins in September and features speakers who are role models in the fields of science and technology. Courses the students elect to take in high school will be monitored as well as pre- and post-program assessment for changes in the girls' interest in technology and science. This project also is funded by Phi Delta Kappa and the American Association of University Women.
