INTERCOLLEGIATE FISHING TOURNAMENT BEGINS OCT. 16

One of the nation's most unusual intercollegiate sporting events will begin off the South Carolina coast on October 16 - the Seventh Annual Coastal Carolina Intercollegiate Fishing Invitational.

Teams of fishermen from colleges and universities up and down the east coast and from institutions in Canada will be going after deep sea catches like king mackerel, black sea bass and snapper. Sponsored by the fishing club of USC-Coastal Carolina College, the invitational lures college fishing teams to South Carolina's Grand Strand for the weekend of Oct. 16-18 to see which team wins the championship in ocean fishing.

Besides heading out to sea for the deep sea competition, students will also get the chance to display their skill in surf fishing for spotted sea trout and red drum at Huntington Beach State Park, south of Myrtle Beach.

Evening programs on fishing and the coastal environment will include public participation and the S.C. Wildlife and Marine Resources Department will supervise fish tagging during competition.

The student fishermen will ride the waves on The Flying Fisher, a charter fishing boat captained by Tommy Sing of nearby Murrells Inlet. The Leroy Springs Company will provide competition headquarters at housing at Springmaid Beach and Pier in Myrtle Beach.

PACIFIC ISLAND DANCERS TO PERFORM IN CONWAY OCT. 1

The islands of Fiji, Samoa, Tahiti and Hawaii are halfway around the world from South Carolina, but the native dances and songs of those exotic Pacific lands will come to life in native color and costume Wednesday, Oct. 1 at 8 p.m. in the auditorium of Conway High School.

Kanikapila, a unique group of performers from the Pacific islands will open the 1980-81 season of USC-Coastal Carolina College's Cultural Arts Series.

Using ancient instruments like split bamboo, lava rocks and feather gourds, the dancers create the songs and dances of New Zealand, Fiji, Samoa, Tahiti and Hawaii, accompanied by guitars and drums. The performers wear native costumes, which add color to the production.
