The Upstage Company of USC-Coastal College will present an original play entitled *Windows* at 12:30 p.m. on Wednesday and Thursday, November 19 and 20, and at 8:00 p.m. on Friday and Saturday, November 21 and 22. Performances will be in the little theatre in the Fine Arts Building on the Coastal campus. Tickets are \$2.50 for students and \$3.50 general admission, and will be available at the door.

Working through a series of improvisations, or theatre games, the cast of six actors created a light-hearted, affectionate portrait of American dreams and values. The play takes place on an American Main Street lined with shop windows decorated for Christmas. FACULTY, STAFF ACTIVITIES

Professor Karen Carpenter, Nursing, attended a workshop, "Faculty Perspective: Faculty Rights vs. Student Rights" in Columbia, S.C. on November 3, 1980.

The workshop was presented by Dr. Poteet, Dean of Graduate Studies, Nursing, Medical University of South Carolina. Topics discussed were recent Supreme Court litigation effecting higher education and the Student and Faculty rights to "due process".

Professors Patty Sue Hickman, Brenda Bellamy and Sada Buck of the Nursing Division attended a Counseling workshop at the Citadel in Charleston, Oct. 31 and Nov. 1. The topic discussed was Human Sexuality and the featured speakers were Drs. William H. Masters and Virginia E. Johnson of the Reproductive Biology Research Foundation in St. Louis.

Dr. Jim Rex will be a keynote speaker at a state-wide conference, to be held in Columbia, on November 18th. The conference, entitled, "Teacher Education: Competency For the Classroom," is sponsored by the South Carolina Department of Education and will involve public school teachers, administrators, school board members, and higher education personnel.

Professor Jim Branham was recently appointed by the South Carolina Hall of Fame to serve on its executive committee and the Board of Directors.

Coastal Athletic Director Walt Hambrick has been awarded a certificate of recognition for outstanding work related to the preparation of teachers of mentally retarded individuals by the Association for Retarded Citizens. He has also been selected to receive a certificate of award in appreciation of outstanding service in behalf of the retarded of all ages by the Georgetown County Association for Retarded Citizens.

Dr. Reinhold Engelmayer addressed the semiannual meeting of the Marion County Historical Society, speaking on the "Prehistory and Early History of the Waccamaw-Pee Dee Region." Dr. Engelmayer lectured a meeting of Georgetown County Boy Scouts last week, speaking on "The Indians of South Carolina."

Professor Joyce B. Parker's Children's Literature class held a "Mother Goose Celebration" in Conway last Sunday.

Coastal faculty member Terry Barnett provided a replay of Coastal's soccer win over College of Charleston last Thursday on WTGR's "Bob Kilpatrick Show."

Coastal English professor Joyce B. Parker presented an in-service program for Conway elementary school teachers. The program was entitled "Be Your Own Henry Higgins." After presenting an excerpt from *Pygmalion*, she conducted a workshop on how teachers should check up on themselves in grammar and composition.

Dr. Charles Joyner, Director of the Waccamaw Regional Studies Project, recently presented a paper at the Duquesne History Forum in Pittsburg, Pa. The paper, entitled "Hagar Brown and the Peculiar Institution," Dealt with slavery on a Waccamaw Neck rice plantation. Two weeks ago, Joyner read a paper on Waccamaw Neck folklore at the Julia Peterkin Centennial Symposium in Columbia. Last week he presented another paper analyzing the significance of an historical analysis of "Alice of the Hermitage" at the American Folklore Society in Pittsburg, Pa.

Silvard Kool, Mauricio Behar, Leonardo Nakayama, Khaled el-Miniawi, and Robert Benneyworth, all foreign students at Coastal, accompanied Dr. Bruno Gujer, Director of the International Program, to the Methodist Church in Aynor for a dinner offered by the Aynor Pilot Club. Their presentation, and particularly Silvard Kool's dinner music, were most cordially appreciated.
