Paragon Ragtime Orchestra to perform as part of Wheelwright Series

Pennsylvania-based Paragon Ragtime Orchestra will present a performance of America's music as part of the 1994-1995 Wheelwright Series. The ensemble will perform Tuesday, Nov. 15 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Tickets are \$12, \$5 for

The 14-member ensemble plays late 19th and early 20th century popular selections using authentic period orchestral arrangements. Classics by Joplin, Sousa and Pryor are among the group's repertoire.

In 1985, then 20-year-old Julliard student Rick Benjamin discovered the long-lost manuscript library of legendary band leader Arthur Pryor. Benjamin, the grandson of one of Pryor's musicians, restored his findings and reunited Julliard colleagues and alumni to create the Paragon Ragtime Orchestra that same year.

According to Benjamin, who serves as conductor, the group seeks to artistically interpret the music, while See Ragtime on page 2.

Eldred E. Prince Building dedicated

Coastal Carolina University dedicated the Eldred E. Prince Building in a ceremony Thursday, Nov. 10.

The Prince Building houses the Department of History, Department of Foreign Languages, International Programs Office, Waccamaw Center for Cultural and Historical Studies, and the Academic Center which includes Computer Assisted Instruction, Foreign Language Laboratory, The Writing Center, and the Athletes' Study Center. The building also includes 10 classrooms and 23 faculty offices.

Construction of the \$3 million, 30,000square-foot facility was funded through the Horry County Higher Education Commission. Building designers and general contractors are Pegram Associates, Inc. and Hay Construction Company, Inc., respectively. Both businesses are located in Myrtle Beach.

Prince became one of the Horry County Higher Education Commission's original members when it was founded in 1959. While chair of the HCHEC from 1961 to 1964, Prince directed a major county-wide campaign which raised \$317,000 for construction of the first building on campus. He was a member of the Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc., from 1959 to 1976, during which time he served as chair and was a member of various committees.

Prince organized Prince Chevrolet Company in Loris, S.C., and served as president and board chairman for 44 years. In addition, he founded business organizations in Loris and Tabor City, N.C. In 1963, Prince was principal organizer of the Horry County National Bank and served as chairman of the board for 24 years. He also served on the Small Business Administration Advisory Council for South Carolina in 1964. With Prince as chairman of the building committee, Loris Community Hospital was built in 1950. He served as chairman of the board of commissioners at the hospital for 36 years.

In 1978, Prince received a citation from the University of South Carolina for See Prince Building on page 2.

outstanding service to Coastal Carolina and to higher education in Horry County. In 1982, the University of South Carolina conferred upon him the honorary degree of doctor of humane letters.

The keynote address was delivered by Thomas K. Hearn, Jr., president of Wake Forest University in Winston-Salem, N.C. Prince was graduated from Wake Forest University in 1933.

Hearn said that buildings are among the most enduring architectural symbols. "It's appropriate that an academic building on a liberal arts campus be named for a forwardthinking man such as Prince," he said.

Portrait artist Lawrence Williams was commissioned to paint a portrait of Prince which is displayed in the foyer of the Prince Building.

preserving the vocabulary of its authentic performance techniques and media. In 1988, the group's critically acclaimed Alice Tully Hall debut marked the first concert ever performed at Lincoln Center by a professional ragtime ensemble.

In addition to its nationwide concert hall, university and festival appearances, the group has acquired a considerable following both in the United States and abroad through a series of radio broadcasts on the New York Times' WQXR, National Public Radio, the BBC, and the world-wide Voice of America networks.

According to *CD Review Magazine*, audiences will "begin to understand why ragtime captured America for a whole generation." A *New York Times* review said "best of all, the concert came off not as a dry musicological dig, but as an evening of abidingly energetic fun."

The Walt Disney Company uses prerecorded selections of the *Paragon Ragtime Orchestra* for theme music at Disney World and Disneyland. The orchestra recently served as an "Ambassador of Goodwill" for the United States at the Universal Exposition in Seville, Spain.

The orchestra's compact disc recordings are featured offerings of the CBS/Columbia and BMG music clubs; the recordings have been widely praised and considered vital in rekindling interest in American theater orchestra tradition.

Provost announces new key assignments

John Idoux has announced the following new assignments in the Office of the Provost.

• Effective immediately, Pat Sizemore will assume a variety of duties and responsibilities within the Office of the Provost as the vice president for enrollment management. She also will continue to work on special projects as assigned by the president.

Sizemore has been a member of the Coastal faculty and administration since 1972. In addition to her role as a biology professor, she also has served as associate vice president for administration, associate vice chancellor of academic affairs and director of admissions.

The identification of an enrollment management effort is intended to provide expanded services to students and address retention issues as an institutional priority. In her role as vice president for enrollment management, Sizemore will report to the provost and will provide leadership to and have overall responsibility for those units or functions which directly

affect enrollment, student success, and student satisfaction. Included among those units and functions are admissions, financial aid, registration, orientation, academic advisement, and other academically-related retention functions.

• Effective January 1995, Charmaine Tomczyk will assume the position of assistant vice president for academic affairs. Tomczyk has been a member of the Coastal community since 1978 and currently serves as the technical services librarian in Kimbel Library and is former chair of the Faculty Senate. This redefined position replaces that formerly held by Pat West who has accepted the position of director of payroll at Coastal.

In her role as assistant vice president, Tomczyk will work with the provost and other academic administrators on all academic issues, policies, and procedures. She will serve as a member of the provost's and the dean's councils and will represent the provost, in his absence, at on- and off-campus meetings.

Library receives grant materials

For the eighth consecutive year, Kimbel Library media collection has been awarded a Mellon Foundation "outreach grant" for the purchase of Latin American feature and documen-

The grant, awarded through the Roger Thayer Stone Center for Latin American Studies at Tulane University, has provided for the purchase of eight new feature films during 1994. Among them are two Peruvian films, Alias, La Gringa and The Lion's Den, which focus on the "Shining Path" revolutionary movement. A Mexican/Spanish production, Fable of the Beautiful Pigeon-Fancier, is based on a novel by Colombian Nobel Prize-winner Gabriel García Márquez. Other Latin American nations represented in the films are Argentina, Venezuela and Brazil.

Since 1987, about 100 films, most of them feature-length and bearing English subtitles, have become part of Coastal's library videotape collection. *

Payroll Office information announced

In January 1995, Coastal's payroll functions will be processed on campus: therefore, all employees must complete new W-4 Forms and payroll authorization forms for all deductions. To make the process as convenient as possible, payroll office personnel have scheduled visits to each campus building.

To expedite the process, employees are requested to bring a paycheck stub when meeting to complete the new forms.

Coastal employees are urged to consider participating in one of Coastal's direct deposit options. The paycheck stub information is the same regardless of whether the money is directly deposited or issued by check. Advantages of direct deposit are: the employee's money is in their account and available at the beginning of the banking day on payday without having to make a trip to the bank; and direct deposit greatly reduces the liability in check handling through loss or by mail.

With Coastal's new payroll system, employees will have more flexibility in direct deposit options. Options available are as follows:

· Direct deposit the entire paycheck into one bank account;

Direct deposit the entire paycheck into two banks, or two separate accounts in the same bank;

· Direct deposit the entire paycheck into a maximum of two banks, or separate accounts in the same bank, plus the University's Credit Union, for a total of a maximum of three different accounts including one deposit to the Credit Union; · Direct deposit a portion of your paycheck into your account at the University's Credit Union and receive the balance in a check on payday; or

· No direct deposit.

Coastal's literary magazine receives national honors

Archarios, Coastal's literary/art magazine, has received fifth place in the Best of Show category at the College Magazine Advisers Convention held in New Orleans, La., Nov. 3 through 6.

The CMA convention is held annually in cities across the United States. Competition categories include: literary/ art magazine, newspaper, features

magazine, and yearbook. In New Orleans, more than 2,300 students and advisers representing more than 350 schools from around the nation gathered for the convention. Judges reviewed more than 350 total entries; 50 entries were in the literary/ art magazine category.

In addition to competition categories, the convention offered more than 380 workshops.

Paul Olsen, who serves as faculty adviser for Archarios, presented a workshop entitled "Troubleshooting

Your Publication." Olsen also chaired the magazine committee which offered sessions presented by magazine professionals such as editors, art directors and publishers

Archarios is produced by Coastal students and published biannually. The magazine contains poetry, art and photography. Entries are submitted by students, faculty and staff, and are selected and judged using a blind selection policy
