CCU Board of Trustees meeting report

A conference call meeting of the Coastal Carolina University Board of Trustees was held Thursday Nov. 10 during which the following action was

• The Board adopted the general bond resolution and supplemental resolution, approving the issuance of Coastal Carolina University revenue for the purposes stated therein.

This action represents authorization of two financings which have been combined into one. One of these financings is required under the legislation which the General Assembly

passed establishing Coastal Carolina University as a separate institution, to refund the outstanding USC bonds that were issued to finance the residence hall facilities at Coastal several years ago. A portion of the bonds will be used to pay off those bonds, and that debt will be shifted from USC to Coastal. As was true of the USC bonds, the revenues derived from the residence hall facilities at Coastal will be used to pay off the bonds.

The second part of the financing is to fund the residence hall and dining facility project, which the Board previously approved.

Coastal offers new golf management degree program

Coastal will offer a new cooperative golf management program to be implemented in spring 1995. The South Carolina Commission on Higher Education approved the program in November 1994.

Offered through Wall School of Business, the CGM program will offer students specialized knowledge and preparation for careers in the golf industry. Students will receive an undergraduate degree in business administration with a major in marketing, with complementary training under a PGA "Class A" professional.

Prior to acceptance in the program, students must successfully pass the PGA-administered playing ability test.

Gerontology certificate program implemented during spring 1995 semester

Coastal will award a new undergraduate certificate in gerontology, effective spring 1995. The program received approval from the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education in November 1994.

Offered through the Department of Psychology and Sociology of the School of Natural and Applied Sciences, the gerontology certificate will provide an opportunity for degree-holding individuals to receive basic and applied knowledge concerning the 65 and over population. Undergraduates in any major may enroll in the certificate program; however, the certificate will not be issued until a baccalaureate degree is earned.

Students from 10 states, Great Britain and Canada have enrolled thus far for the spring 1995 semester. The maximum size of the program will be limited to 200 students phased in throughout a multi-year process.

The four-year program incorporates 129 hours of course instruction with three six-month internships. The curriculum also includes weekly seminars and several courses offered in conjunction with Horry Georgetown

Technical College.

According to Peter Barr, the cooperative golf management program is an "intensive educational experience designed specifically for those individuals who wish to pursue a successful career in golf or golf-related enterprise." Barr said the program draws upon the educational resources of the Wall School of Business in close cooperation and partnership with local industry professionals.

With almost 100 public and private golf courses in the Waccamaw region that attract 500,000 golfers annually, university officials anticipate that Coastal Carolina University, with its educational resources and laboratory facilities, will offer an outstanding

program.

Participating area courses include: Bay Tree, Beachwood, Buck Creek, Burning Ridge, Eagle Nest, Long Bay, Myrtle Beach National, Quail Creek, Sea Trail, Surf Club and Wild Wing. University officials anticipate more involvement from area courses.

According to John Idoux, the cooperative golf management program "is an excellent example of how Coastal can network with other higher education entities and with a local industry to respond to a need and deliver a quality educational experience; this program can serve as a model for other cooperative ventures."

Barr said only five other institutions in the nation offer similar programs. They are: Ferris State University, Methodist College, Mississippi State University, New Mexico State University and Pennsylvania State University.

According to Hills, the integration of multiple disciplines in the curriculum allows for a comprehensive and informed view of aging in society. The program is designed to meet baccalaureate standards recommended by the Association for Gerontology in Higher Education, which advances gerontological studies through a national membership of more than 350 higher education institutions.

A survey of local businesses and organizations serving older adults indicates a demand for undergraduatetrained personnel with specialized knowledge in gerontology in the Myrtle Beach area.

According to Hills, the new program will meet an important need along the Grand Strand by directly addressing the concerns of an aging population. Hills said the only similar program in the state is offered at Lander University.

Dean Elizabeth Puskar said, "We're eager to begin this exciting new certification program and are looking forward to working closely with area agencies that assist our senior citizens."

SADD founder to speak at Coastal

Robert Anastas, founder of Students against Drunk Driving, will speak in Wheelwright Auditorium on Monday, Nov. 28, at 1 p.m. The presentation is sponsored by Better Brands of Myrtle Beach, and is free and open to the public.

Anastas is an educator, author, lecturer and counselor. He is on the Board of Directors of the National Commission for the Prevention of Alcoholism and Drug Dependency and the National Commission Against Drunk Driving. He has written numerous articles about adolescents and is the author of three books dealing with parent/child communication.

Anastas also is the founder of Check In, a program that is an expansion of the SADD philosophy to empower students to take charge of their lives. A television movie dramatizing Anastas' life and his fight against drunk driving

has appeared on CBS and HBO.

Anastas has received the Massachusetts Teacher of the Year Award, the National Merit Award of Educators, the National Commission Humanitarian Award, the United States Department of Health and Human Services Award, and more.

The former school administrator and coach has taught at the high school and

college levels.

Anastas received a master's degree and honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters from American International College in Massachusetts. As a college student, Anastas received All American honors in football and hockey. After he was graduated, he was drafted by the New England Patriots as a quarterback.

Richard Collin will conduct the threecredit undergraduate course (CEGL H462) in a seminar-style setting. No final examination will be administered. but students will be expected to complete or make substantial progress on one work of fiction.

Some classes will focus on the commercial and financial aspects of fiction publishing such as dealing with editors, agents and publishing houses. Other classes will deal with the writing

experience, techniques and potential problem areas in writing.
