## USC-COASTAL OFFERS LUNCHTIME LEARNING

If you're a secretary eager to improve your skills, a businessman anxious to gain self-confidence, a parent who wants to understand your child better, or someone who is experiencing a change in lifestyle, USC-Coastal Carolina College has a way to let you learn at lunchtime.

As part of the college's newly expanded Continuing Education Office, Coastal is offering four middle-of-the-day non-credit courses called "Lunchtime Learning." The unique program is the idea of Dr. Sally Z. Hare, Director of Continuing Education at the College.

"We think this special lunchtime program will enable some people to develop or improve skills in a convenient way - by attending class during their lunch hours," she explains. "You get a good lunch and you learn a valuable skill at the same time." The courses last only a few weeks and they're particularly convenient for people who couldn't attend courses at any other time."

No prior educational experience is necessary to enroll in the classes, no college credit is offered, and no examinations are conducted.

The four short-courses offered at lunchtime are Assertiveness Training, Effective Communications, Effective Parenting, and Re-entry. Assertiveness Training, which meets on Thursdays, March 5-26, at the college, is designed to give participants greater self-confidence by teaching listening skills, conflict management, and development of relationships. Effective Communications, which meets on Thursdays from 12:30-2 p.m., January 22-February 12, is held at Bob's Restaurant near Conway. The course is designed to help secretaries communicate more effectively in person, by telephone, with dictation, letter writing, and speaking.

Effective Parenting promises to help parents learn more about their children and how to communicate with them. It meets on Tuesdays, from 12-2 p.m., March 3-31 at Western Steer Restaurant in Conway.

Re-entry is a unique course designed to assist people who are experiencing re-entry into a previous lifestyle, like returning to school or work, or entry into a new lifestyle, created perhaps by retirement or death of a spouse. The class meets on Wednesdays, 11:30-1 p.m., at Bob's Restaurant, Feb. 4-25.

The average cost of each course is \$50, or an average of \$10 per session. The fee includes the cost of lunches. Hare says Coastal faculty and staff will receive a discount.

## USC-COASTAL OFFERS GOLF LESSONS

Need some help improving your golfing handicap? Starting this week, USC-Coastal Carolina College is signing up participants in golf clinics for men and women, due to begin in early January.

The clinics are for people who know nothing or little about golf and are sponsored by Coastal's Office of Continuing Education. For as little as \$10 a lesson, clinic participants will get instruction from a golf pro on basic grips, line-up, chipping, sand shots, basic wood and iron shots and other golfing fundamentals.

A golf clinic for women is scheduled for Saturdays, Jan. 3-24, at Bay Tree Golf Club in Myrtle Beach from 10 a.m.-noon.

A golf clinic for men is scheduled for Tuesdays, 10 a.m. - noon, Jan. 6-Jan. 27 at Bay Tree. The instructor for men's and women's clinics is Sam Timms. The cost of the four-lesson clinic is \$40.

Dr. Sally Z. Hare, Director of Continuing Education at the college, says the clinic's openings are scheduled on a first-come, first-serve basis. Scheduling is done by telephone. She says Coastal faculty and staff receive discounts.

Christmas gift certificates for the clinics are now available, she says.
