## Smith Lab Dedicated

The Allison Sloan Chandler Smith Teaching and Research Laboratory, a new health, physical education and recreation facility, was dedicated Friday, Feb. 21.

Located in the Williams-Brice Building, the new facility houses two labs, one dedicated to exercise science and one to movement pedagogy (teaching and learning behaviors). The exercise science lab has state-of-the-art equipment designed to scientifically measure body composition, cardiovascular fitness, metabolic function, flexibility and movement biomechanics. The pedagogy lab allows teachers and coaches to analyze both movement skills and instructional behaviors using a combination of video analysis and computer software.

Julia Orri will manage the pedagogy lab and Sandra Nelson will manage the exercise science lab.

The new facility was made possible by a donation from James Smith, a Coastal alumnus and son of Lindy Smith, in memory of his late wife, Allison Sloan Chandler Smith.

"You won't find many facilities like this one at other institutions our size," said Gil Hunt. "This technology will allow Coastal to advance to a higher level of faculty instruction and student achievement."

"The experience our students are going to have as a result of this facility will challenge institutions of far greater size to upgrade their health and physical education technology," said President Ron Ingle.

# Students organize peace event

Area media turned out in force to cover a peace rally organized by Coastal students last week. Students for Peace, a recently formed organization led by marine science majors Jason Ferrante and Beth Gunter, created an event designed to promote dialogue about peaceful solutions to American relations with Iraq.

In addition to speeches by Coastal students and by faculty members Richard Collin, Jim Henderson, Lee Bollinger and Don Millus, members of the community were invited to mount the "soapbox" and express their views. A roundtable, questionand-answer session with faculty and students was held in the Recital Hall followed by a candlelight vigil on the Prince Lawn.
