COASTAL COMBINED CAMPAIGN BREAKS RECORD

The Coastal Combined Campaign for 80-81 at USC-Coastal Carolina College surpassed all previous campaigns in donations and participation. Almost 90% of Coastal's faculty and staff participated in the campaign, donating \$7,842 to the three non-profit organizations involved in the fund-raising effort. The Coastal Educational Foundation received \$3,515.50; the USC Foundation received \$2,749.50; and United Way received \$1,577.

"The faculty and staff should be commended for the success of this year's compaign," says Coastal Carolina College Chancellor Edward M. Singleton. "Your spirit, leadership and contribution to the college and to the community are invaluable. You have given the College a reputation for service with which all of us can be pleased."

TEACHER ED MAKES COMMUNITY CONTACTS

Coastal's Instructional Media Services and the School of Teacher Education are helping the state procure video-tapes of public school classroom teachers for an upcoming pilot training program.

Coastal was chosen as one of the institutions of higher education to be involved with the state pilot study regarding the evaluation of student teachers. Nine interns, at Conway High School, will be involved in the study and will be coordinated by Patsy Candal, Director of Field Experiences.

Effective January, 1981 two new teaching centers will be added to the Coastal Carolina/Horry County Teaching Center Network. The new centers are Myrtle Beach Primary School and Myrtle Beach Elementary School.

UPSTAGE COMPANY TO PRESENT EUGENE O'NEILL PLAY

One of the milestones of the contemporary American theatre is being brought to the Coastal Carolina College theatre stage beginning Wednesday, February 18th by the Upstage Company, for an engagement of four performances, through February 21st. The play is Eugene O'Neill's "A Moon for the Misbegotten", the last drama from the pen of this four times Pulitzer Prize winner who has been acclaimed America's greatest playwright.

The play will be presented on Wednesday, February 18th at 12:30 p.m., Thursday, February 19th at 12:50 p.m. and Friday and Saturday, February 20 and 21 at 8:00 p.m. in the Little Theatre on the Coastal Carolina College campus. Tickets will be available at the door for each performance.

The workshop was held at Francis Marion College. Jones has also been active recently in helping the Theatre of the Republic select a cast for a production of Thornton Wilder's Our Town.

USC-Coastal Carolina College will present award-winning soloist Beverly Hoch in concert at 8:00 p.m. Monday, February 2nd, at the Conway High School Auditorium. The concert is part of the college's 1981 cultural arts series. Tickets are available at USC-Coastal and will be sold at the door.

Beverly Hoch won the 1979 Young Concert Artists International Auditions. Miss Hoch has been the recipient of numerous awards and honors. She was a Regional Winner of the 1977 Metropolitan Opera Auditions in the Midwest, and was named West Central Singer of the Year in 1976. In 1977, Miss Hoch won the Sterling Staff International Competition.

As a Winner of the YCA Auditions, Miss Hoch was presented in her acclaimed New York recital debut in the Young Concert Artists Series at Kaufmann Auditorium on January 22, 1980. She has already been heard with enormous success as soloist with many prestigious organizations and in very varied repertoire. She has appeared as soloist with the Oklahoma City, Wichita, and Austin Symphonies, and participated in opera and choral programs of the Aspen Music Festival on scholarship in 1977 and 1978. In nationwide tours with the John Biggs Renaissance Consort, she appeared as a featured singer, and also played the recorder, krummhorn, and portative organ.
