University hurricane emergency procedures

President Ingle has established an Emergency Operations Committee and charged the group with the development and refinement of a procedure for university crises. The group is representative of all areas of campus administration.

The committee is examining existing procedures for hurricane preparedness and response. The following information is an excerpt from a document which will be completed and widely circulated to the campus in the near future.

It is the policy of
Coastal Carolina University to
view each hurricane threat as an
extremely hazardous condition,
and to minimize the risk to
students, faculty and staff
consistent with protecting
university property. Please listen to
emergency warnings on local television
and radio stations, and take such warnings seriously.

If the university cancels classes due to severe weather or other emergency situations, local radio and television stations and the daily newspaper are notified immediately. All official announcements will be made from the Office of the President. The university's decision to cancel classes or special events is made independently of a decision made by the Horry County Schools. Unless an announcement specifically says Coastal Carolina University has canceled classes, students should assume classes will be held as scheduled. Do not call the switchboard for information because a large volume of incoming calls will tie up telephone lines and hamper efforts to get accurate information to parents and the media.

Prior to a hurricane emergency,
 President Ingle, or his designee, will convene the Management Council for preparedness briefings and assignments.

• When classes are canceled, the Office of the Provost will notify all academic deans.
Each dean is responsible for notifying the faculty of his or her school or area of class cancellations. If classes are canceled, faculty and staff are expected to report to work. If

employees are unable to report to work when classes are canceled, they should contact their supervisors to make arrangements for taking annual leave or compensatory time.

Employees are not expected to risk dangerous traveling conditions to report to work.

- If a Hurricane Warning is issued by the National Weather Service, students who reside in the Residence Halls will be advised to travel home or inland prior to the onset of adverse weather conditions. Students who live in the Residence Halls should communicate, as appropriate, with their RA's as to where they will be going and a telephone number, if available, where they may be reached. For students whose options for travel are limited, the university shall assist in the transportation of these students to emergency shelters, as designated by the American Red Cross.
- Even when classes are canceled, the university will remain open unless the Governor closes the institution. Faculty and staff are expected to report to work or make arrangements for annual leave or compensatory time until the Governor issues a closing declaration. If the threat of a hurricane exists, faculty and staff should unplug all equipment especially computers in their areas prior to leaving campus.
- The university has NOT been designated as an emergency shelter by the American Red Cross. If an evacuation is ordered, the Red Cross will issue a list of available shelters. ALL students, faculty and staff must leave campus when such an evacuation is ordered, excepting Emergency Operations personnel. The university is unable to provide basic necessities for students, faculty and staff during or in the aftermath of a hurricane.
- Following a hurricane, movement to and from the campus may be restricted. Persons who must be available following a hurricane, to protect university property, must be on campus prior to the arrival of the storm.

Budgetary surplus bolsters Coastal projects

Coastal Carolina University will receive \$850,000 from the State of South Carolina Supplemental Appropriation Bill for 1994-1995; the funds will be used to complete architectural and engineering work on the new humanities and fine arts building, and for construction of a community fitness center.

Supplemental appropriations totaling \$148,815 million were part of the state's 1994-1995 budgetary surplus of \$392,685 million. The funding for Coastal was announced by the Comptroller General in Columbia on Aug. 18.

Of the total funds the university received from the Supplemental Appropriations Bill, approximately \$600,000 will be directed to complete the architectural and engineering work for an 118,000-square-foot humanities and fine arts building to house the academic departments of art, English, history, music, philosophy and religion, politics and geography, and theater. The Stubbins Associates, Inc., of Cambridge, Mass., is preparing the design work for the building. The project is anticipated to cost approximately \$14.5 million.

The balance of the funds from the Supplemental Appropriations Bill will be used to design and construct the community fitness center. Designed to meet NCAA specifications, the facility will include an eight-lane, 400-meter composition track and related fitness areas for use by the university and community organizations. It is estimated that the facility will be complete in spring 1996.

"The support Coastal Carolina has received at the state level recognizes this institution as an emerging force in South Carolina higher education," said President Ingle. "These funds could not have been allocated to Coastal without the diligent support of the Horry-Georgetown Legislative Delegation and members of our Board of Trustees."

"Coastal Carolina has earned the attention and support of this state," said S.C. Rep. Mark Kelley. "The delegation is working to further the fine reputation of learning and the possibilities that Coastal Carolina provides for the region and the state. I am proud to be a part of the efforts that bolster the academic mission of this university."

Wetland course offered

The Center for Marine and Wetland Studies will sponsor a four-day course designed to provide a basic understanding of current regulatory and technical criteria used by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in determining jurisdictional wetland boundaries. "Basic Wetland Delineation" will be held in two sessions: Thursday and Friday, Sept. 28 and 29; and Thursday and Friday, Oct. 5 and 6.

Participants must attend both sessions; all classes begin at 8 a.m. Course fee is \$500.

Registration deadline is Wednesday, Sept. 20. Space is limited; early registration is recommended.

Lectures will be presented on campus in the morning and field exercises will be conducted in the afternoon. Equipment and transportation to the field will be provided; however, participants are responsible for meals and lodging.

Did you know?

Approximately 3,500 students ranging from middle school to university level and adults participating in continuing education programs were housed in the Coastal Carolina University Residence Halls from May through August. From junior scholar programs and athletic camps to Orientation and art seminars, groups from Georgia to New Jersey booked housing in university accommodations.

Additional off-campus housing contracted for fall 1996

The university has contracted with the North American Institute of Aviation to provide off-campus housing to 45 students for the fall 1995 semester. The agreement is in response to the demand for student housing at the university.

According to Bob Squatriglia, "National statistics show that students who live on campus are likely to enjoy a more complete intercollegiate experience than those who live off campus." This trend, accompanied by the scarcity in rental properties along the Grand Strand due to the area's rapid growth, equals a greater demand in campus housing, he said.

The apartments are owned by NAIA and are used for those enrolled in that institution's pilot training school. The fully furnished apartments are located approximately eight miles from campus. Each unit features two bedrooms, two full bathrooms, a full kitchen and a living room and dining room area with cable television hook-up and local telephone service; each apartment is equipped with its own

washer and dryer.

"We're very pleased with the assistance we have received from NAIA," Squatriglia said. "Their cooperative spirit and willingness to support our endeavors as a fellow educational institution are appreciated."

Housing at the NAIA will be managed by the university's Office of Residence Life. Two resident assistants will live at the site; campus security also will be assigned to the site.

A shuttle van service is available to students for transportation to campus.

University officials anticipate that Coastal's housing demand will be alleviated with the addition of a 400-bed residence hall/dining facility which is scheduled for completion in August 1996. Approximately 600 of the university's more than 4,500 students live in eight residence halls. The residence hall under construction will almost double the number of students living on campus to 1,000 — close to one-fourth of the student population.

Self-defense course offered for women

A 12-hour non-credit self-defense course, Rape Aggression Defense Systems for Women, will be held on Wednesdays from Sept. 13 through Oct. 4 from 6 to 9 p.m. in the Physical Education Center, room 114. Women age 16 and above are eligible to enroll; registration is \$39. Space is limited; early registration is recommended.

The course instructor is Les Haga, training officer in Coastal's Office of Law Enforcement and Safety.

The objective of RAD is to develop and enhance the options of self-defense so these techniques may become

more viable considerations for women who are attacked. RAD is not a martial arts class; it is a class that shows basic moves women can use to protect themselves.

The course training will end Wednesday, Oct. 4 with a "dynamic simulation" in which participants will use the techniques they learned to escape the RAD attacker, a police officer dressed in protective gear.

New student activities director appointed

Ellen Parsons has been appointed director of Student Activities at Coastal.

In addition to serving as a liaison between the students and the university, Parsons is responsible for student government, student media, Greek and other student organizations, and the Campus Program Board.

Parsons has five years of higher education experience in the area of student activities. Before joining Coastal, she worked as assistant director of the James

Madison University Center; coordinator for Student Organization Services at Louisiana State University; and as a graduate assistant in the Department of Student Life at the University of South Carolina.

She is a native of Georgetown County. Parsons earned a master's of education degree in student personnel services from the University of South Carolina in 1992 and a bachelor's degree in political science from Clemson University in 1988.

Volunteers needed for dolphin count

The Center for Marine and Wetland Studies is seeking volunteers to help monitor the dolphin population. Counts will begin Monday, Sept. 18 and continue on weekdays for five to six weeks.

Volunteers who can contribute several mornings to dolphin surveys will be paired with other observers and stationed every two miles along the beach from Cherry Grove to Myrtle Beach. Volunteers will count dolphins that pass their observation sites from 9 a.m. to noon.

In return, volunteers may go out on Coastal's research vessel for one of the offshore dolphin surveys. No experience is required; volunteers must attend a one-hour training session at Coastal.

Robert Young, dolphin count program coordinator, hopes the data collected will provide reliable population

estimates which are needed for the management of the species. The information will be used to define long-term population trends with regard to seasonal variations and response to major events such as hurricanes and the 1987-1988 die-off of dolphins along the East Coast.

The research will build upon data from the annual 1994 and 1995 South Carolina Dolphin Counts and from several preliminary counts made by Coastal students along the Grand Strand last year.

In July 1995, volunteers counted approximately 120 dolphins along the Grand Strand from Waties Island to Bull's Island.

Jump for the Sun to be held at Coastal

Jump for the Sun: A Research Project to Encourage Girls and Women in Science and Math will be held at Coastal from October through June. Twenty-four third-through eighth-graders and six teachers from Horry County Schools, and six undergraduate education students from Coastal will be selected to receive full scholarships for the program which lasts one academic year. Scholarship application deadline is Friday, Sept. 15.

Sally Hare and Mary Crowe received a \$99,998 grant from the National Science Foundation for the program. *Jump for the Sun* is designed to increase the number of girls enrolling in math and science courses at the middle and high school levels in an effort to increase the number of women who enter careers in these areas.

Participants will meet monthly during the school year, including two overnight field trips in the spring.

Jump for the Sun focuses on the importance of science and mathematics in the ways human beings live and treat the planet. Through hands-on activities, participants see how science and math apply to their lives.

Teachers and parents are included in the program to build a support system to encourage the girls and women and strengthen their self-concepts. A special program will be offered for the parents of elementary and middle school participants.

Recycling program established by Facilities Management

The Office of Facilities Management has established a campus-wide recycling program.

Recycling carts for paper only have been placed in most campus offices. White and colored paper and envelopes should be placed in the carts. Do not recycle manila folders, brown envelopes or envelopes with plastic

Other items that can be recycled on campus should be retained in separate containers and will be collected periodically. To arrange for pick-up of these items, contact Denzil Simmons, coordinator of the campus recycling program.

Other items for campus recycling include: Aluminum, metal and steel cans: Recycle aluminum beverage cans, metal and steel food cans, aluminum foil and aluminum pie pans. Rinse out cans and put lids inside cans before recycling.

Plastic: Recycle all plastic bottles, such as soft drink bottles, milk and water jugs, detergent, and shampoo bottles, yogurt containers and margarine containers. Rinse containers and remove caps. Do not recycle styrofoam products such as food containers, egg cartons, meat trays and plastic wrap.

Glass: Recycle all glass bottles. Clear and brown glass must be separated. All other glass may be placed together. Remove lids and rinse containers. Do not recycle drinking glasses, mirrors, window glass, Pyrex dishes, ceramic light bulbs or any glass that is not a container.

Newspaper: Recycle clean, dry newspapers, magazines, and advertising inserts that are placed inside a newspaper. Newspapers, telephone books and magazines should be placed in a separate container.
