Career development course prepares students for job search

College students of the '90s are interested in experiencing more than the *Animal House* version of higher education; they're concerned with securing a job after college. In an effort to address this concern, Coastal will offer a new undergraduate course for juniors and seniors beginning in October.

Transition to Careers is an eight-week, one-credit-hour career development course designed to help students evaluate the college experience, prepare for a professional job search, manage the transition from college to career and examine community responsibilities.

The course represents a structured effort to introduce students to the numerous services that are available through the Office of Student Employment and Career Management Services such as career counseling and workshops on how to use the Internet for a job search. The course will focus on job search and strategizing, exploring the marketplace, graduate school, interviewing, personal finances and more.

According to Mollie Fout, as consumers of the institution, students want to know how their educations can benefit them most. "As the price of higher education increases, students want to know what their educations can

do for them," Fout said.

According to Charmaine Tomczyk, the state of the economy and the job market are cause for student concern. "Students have a heightened awareness about the need for marketability and are expressing great interest in life after college."

Tomczyk said it is important for students to remember that a college education provides not just a means to an end but rather an environment that promotes free thinking and intellectual growth.

Another program in place at the university that is promoting academic and professional preparedness for students is a *Freshman Success Seminar* developed by the E. Craig Wall Sr. School of Business Administration and Computer Science for its business majors. This course introduces students to the university and assists them in successfully making the transition from high school to college. The course focuses on academic information, personal and social activities and university resources. Coastal faculty and staff serve as guest speakers on topics ranging from academic regulations and counseling services to consumer rights and personal budgeting.

Faculty Senate elected

Wink Prince of the School of Humanities and Fine Arts and Gil Hunt of the School of Education have been elected chair and vice chair, respectively, of the university's Faculty Senate. Both will serve two-year terms.

TEAM COASTAL Challenge kicks off campaign

Team Coastal Challenge, the campus annual fund campaign, began Monday, Sept. 18 and will continue through Friday, Oct. 6. The campaign goal is \$24,000.

As of Tuesday, Sept. 19, the campaign has raised \$7,028 with 10 percent of the faculty and staff donating or making a pledge.

During the campaign, Team Coastal Challenge committee members will be visiting all faculty and staff to invite participation and contributions for the campus annual fund. Information also will be provided concerning how the funds raised will be used.

Coastal Carolina University Theater opens its 1995-1996 season with Tennessee Williams' *Summer and Smoke*, Friday and Saturday, Oct. 6 and 7 at 7:30 p.m., and Sunday, Oct. 8 at 3 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Tickets are \$8, \$5 for students.

Summer and Smoke portrays the long, torrid summer of Alma Winemiller, a straitlaced minister's daughter enamored of John Buchanan, a young doctor. Set in early 19th century Glorious Hill, Miss., the two face malicious gossip, unrelenting puritanical codes and their moral differences.

Director Thomas Jones said, "Summer and Smoke is an excellent depiction of genteel society in the South."

James Gross of Coastal's Department of Theater is set and lighting designer. According to Gross, the visual quality of the set tries to create an atmosphere that reflects both Alma's soulful qualities and John's clinical view of life.

Professors receive grant from Forestry Commission

Colleen Lohr and Kathy Taylor have received a \$3,930 grant from the South Carolina Forestry Commission for the development and assessment of an urban forest appreciation program.

According to Lohr, the goal of the program is to identify, label and create maps of the unique trees found on the Coastal campus. An undergraduate student has been hired to assist with this project.

The year-long program is designed to encourage public and private maintenance of trees, improve the understanding of the benefits of trees, and provide technical assistance to those involved in the planning, development and maintenance of community forests.

"One of the advantages to having a campus located on natural wetlands is the large variety of trees and vegetation found there," Lohr said.

Lohr anticipates that an informal path or walkway with identified plants will be established so campus and community members can learn more about the vegetation that exists on campus.

South Carolina forestry representatives will conduct a workshop for members of the Coastal grounds staff.

Lohr joined the Coastal faculty in 1974. She earned a Ph.D. in biology from the University of South Florida in 1974 and a bachelor's degree in biology from California State University in 1968.

Taylor joined the Coastal faculty in 1992. She earned a Ph.D. in botany from Louisiana State University in 1992, a master's degree in biology in 1988 and a bachelor's degree in biology in 1986, both from Western Washington University.

Third Quarter sets fall 1995 schedule

Coastal Carolina University invites those age 50 and older to enroll in Third Quarter, an academic and cultural enrichment education program.

The fall 1995 session begins Monday, Oct. 2 and continues through Friday, Dec. 8. Each class meets once a week. No educational prerequisites are necessary for participation in Third Quarter.

Third Quarter is supported through a membership fee that covers the cost of courses, a campus parking decal, Coastal identification card, student privileges and use of Kimbel Library

The program is administered through the Center for Education and Community.

Course offerings for the 1995 session include:
• The History of Horry County: Timber, Turpentine, Tobacco and Tourism

Instructor: Catherine Lewis • Mondays from 1 to 2:30 p.m. The combination of timber, turpentine, tobacco and tourism make Horry County's history quite different from that of its neighboring counties. Development has been determined by its physical characteristics and the strong, determined people who settled here and earned for Horry the county's nickname, *The Independent Republic*. This class will focus on the chronology of events that occurred in creating the county as we know it today.

• Western Europe: The Modern and Contemporary Period

Instructor: James Farsolas • Mondays from 3 to 4:30 p.m. This course will review the major issues in the history of modern and contemporary Western Europe with emphasis on the social, political, intellectual, religious, military and economic developments from the scientific revolution to 1914. Discussions and film presentations will accompany class lectures.

• Introduction to Computers

Instructor: Terri Brown • Mondays, Tuesdays and Fridays from 4:30 to 6 p.m.

This course will cover basic components of computers as we know (or don't know) them. This course will provide the perfect opportunity to use a computer and ask questions as you go. You will learn the basics of the operating system, word processing, spread sheets, software programs and more. This course is limited to 15 participants.

• Great Books Seminar

Instructor: Jack Riley • Tuesdays from 1 to 2:30 p.m.
This course is a reading and thinking experience that will focus on a number of short readings in literature, drama, philosophy, history and politics from the tradition of great books. These readings involve inquiry into the issues and questions that are of enduring human significance. Active and intelligent discussion is a vital component of this class.

• There's No Business like Show Business: Plays and Playwrights of Contemporary American Theater Instructor: Tom Jones • Tuesdays from 3 to 4:30 p.m. This course is an exploration of contemporary plays and playwrights in the American Theater. Tennessee Williams' Summer and Smoke, Edward Albee's Three Tall Women, Jon Robin Baitz's Three Hotels, Terrence McNally and Lanford Wilson's Talley's Folly, and other playwrights and their works will be discussed. Opportunities to attend some of the plays will be offered during the course with an option to go to New York at the end of the session. Interviews with directors, actors and scene designers are another element of the course.

• Mind & Body: Health and Spirit Connections
Instructor: Deborah Pittman-Page • Wednesdays from 1 to 2:30 p.m.

This course will familiarize participants with the connection of the mind, body and spirit in their overall well-being. Topics will include the historical and religious traditions surrounding the fields of health and wellness including myths and old wives tales regarding home remedies. Current news from the media will be presented.

• Writing Workshop: Language as Discovery Instructor: Susan Meyers

Wednesdays from 3 to 4:30 p.m.

This course offers participants a chance to get carried away with writing and follow their words into a work of poetry, prose, or both. Through writing assignments, participants will try a variety of forms to take risks with their writing.

The emphasis is on paying attention to the language and form in order to allow the content to develop in its own direction. At the end of this course, participants will self-publish an anthology. This course is limited to 15 participants.

• Learning-By-Doing Investing

Instructor: Debbie Bell • Wednesdays from 3 to 4:30 p.m. Seasoned investor, or new to this system of making your money grow, you will be exploring the difference between saving and investing. Challenges facing today's investors and techniques in managing a portfolio will be discussed. Fundamental and technical analysis will be covered and guest speakers will be featured. Class members will invest fictional money and study their investments. This course also will feature the step-by-step process of starting an investment club under guidelines of the National Association of Investment Clubs.

• Intermediate Computers Instructor: Abdallah Haddad

Wednesdays and Thursdays from 4 to 5:30 p.m.

This course is for those who have had some basic computer instruction and no longer qualify as beginners. Participants will define the topics to be included; the instructor will have a basic plan on what will be covered, but student input will be vital in sharpening particular skills participants wish to enhance. This course is limited to 15 participants.

• Blues, Gospel, Spirituals and Jazz

Instructor: Ray Morvant • Thursdays from 1 to 2:30 p.m. This course will explore the key elements and styles of jazz, with an emphasis on the blues tradition and its religious twin, gospel music. There will be live and recorded performances to deepen the perception and appreciation of this music. Presentations are accessible to anyone, regardless of musical experience. Musicians (and singers) are encouraged to bring their instruments for spontaneous jam sessions.

• The History of Canada

Instructor: Sam Syme • Thursdays from 3 to 4:30 p.m. Approximately 90 percent of all Canadians live within 100 miles of the U.S. border. The issues covered in this course are up-to-date and timely. The instructor will also include a study of the 18th century conflict in North America between Great Britain and France, the 19th century development of Confederation and the 20th century search for a national identity.

• Indoor/Outdoor Nature Study

Instructor: Julie Finlayson • Fridays from 1:30 to 5 p.m. In this course, you will explore the ecology of the coastal plain throughout Horry and Georgetown counties from the unique ecosystem of the ocean to the strange phenomenon of the Carolina Bays. Included will be visits to various wetlands habitats, covering a wide spectrum of birds, animals and plants from the nitrogen poor soils of the coastal plain to the harsh salt environment of the marshes and beaches. Indoor classes will consist of course lecture accompanied by slides, projects, hands-on study and discussion. This course is limited to 30 participants.

Word Perfect

Instructor: Abdallah Haddad • Saturdays from 1 to 3:30 p.m.

This course will begin with a brief review of the rules and concepts of word processing. Participants will learn how to utilize some of the powerful resources of Word Perfect 6.1 for Windows including specific word processing features, merging documents to create mailing letters and labels, and desktop publishing. Previous computer experience is helpful. This course is limited to 15 participants.

Program fees are \$35 per course with the following exceptions: computer classes are \$40 to cover an additional lab fee; and the indoor/outdoor study is \$55 for individuals and \$100 for couples because it is a double session. One person may take three or four courses for \$100.

Registration will be held Sept. 21, 22, 27 and 28 from 1 to 5 p.m. in Kearns Hall, room 103. Participants are welcome to audit classes before making final decisions on registration. First week audits of computer and creative writing classes are based on space availability.

Two Coastal faculty members retire

Marshall E. Parker, associate professor of education, and Albert B. Cannon, assistant professor of mathematics, have retired from Coastal Carolina University, effective fall 1995.

Parker joined the Coastal faculty in 1974 as assistant director of Continuing Education and associate professor of education. He has served as director of Graduate Regional Studies and as assistant dean of the school of education. While at Coastal, he started *A Better Lifestyle Experience* (ABLE) program for senior adults, for which he received the Governor's Award for Health Promotion. Parker coached the men's tennis team for eight years, advancing the Chanticleers to national competitions three times. He was named Coach of the Year of the NAIA division in 1979.

Parker was named Professor Emeritus by the Coastal Carolina University Board of Trustees in July. He earned a Ph.D. in education administration from the University of Wisconsin in 1966, a master's degree in secondary administration with a minor in chemistry from Vanderbilt — George Peabody Teacher's College in Nashville in 1961 and a bachelor's degree in science and mathematics from Erskine College in 1957.

Cannon joined the Coastal faculty in 1968 as an instructor of mathematics. He was active in several of the departmental self-study programs for the math department and assisted in math competitions for local high school students. He was a member of the American Association of University Professors and the Mathematical Association of America.

Cannon earned a master's degree in mathematics in 1968 and a bachelor's degree in mathematics in 1959, both from East Carolina University. ◆

Benefits Fair hosted by Office of Human Resources

The Office of Human Resources and Affirmative Action will sponsor an employee Benefits Fair on Thursday, Oct. 12 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in ADM 003; individual appointments may be scheduled on Friday, Oct. 13 from 9 a.m. to noon by contacting Tim Wert in the Benefits Office.

October is benefits open enrollment month for employees who need to add or make changes to their health benefits. This year, employees also will have the opportunity to add or make changes to their dental coverage.

New benefits include a state supplemental long term disability plan (LTD) Well Baby Care through the State Health Plan, and the ability to designate contingent beneficiaries with the South Carolina Retirement System.

The new State Supplemental Long Term Disability plan is an alternate to Coastal's Paul Revere supplemental LTD plan. Additional information will be available for comparison of the two plans. All employees will be requested to either apply for the new plan or sign a release form stating they were offered the opportunity to apply for the new plan during the month of October.

The new Well Baby preventive care through the State Health Plan encourages medical check-ups and immunizations which were not previously a covered expense. The new care begins Jan. 1, 1996 and will be provided at no extra premium charge to State Health Plan enrollees. Additional information also will be available during the open enrollment period.

South Carolina Retirement System participants designate beneficiaries for their amount of contributions and for Group Life Insurance (one year of salary). Previously a contingent beneficiary was not stated, which meant if a beneficiary pre-deceased the employee, the contributions (six percent of salary) stayed with the state. Enrollees may now designate a person to receive contributions if the primary beneficiary becomes deceased before or at the same time of the enrollee. The forms to designate a contingent beneficiary are available in the Benefits Office.
