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Students and faculty recognized at Honors Convocation

Coastal Carolina University presented awards for student academic achievement at the recent annual Honors Convocation in Wheelwright Auditorium. Faculty recognition awards were also presented.

Kara M. Koppel received the 2002-2003 Faculty's Academic Excellence Award. Candidates for this award must have a minimum cumulative grade point average of at least



3.5, the endorsement of a faculty adviser and a record of academic honors. A psychology major, Koppel has maintained a 4.0 cumulative grade point average, has been on the indoor and outdoor track and field teams and was team captain of the women's cross country team in 2001 and 2002.

As a student-athlete, she has received the Big South Scholar Athlete of the Year for 2001, 2002 and 2003, as well as the Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All American Award for cross country/track for 2002. She plans to pursue a master's degree in occupational therapy at Colorado State University.

Brian C. Núñez received the 2002-2003 Ronald D. Lackey Service Award. Named in honor of the late Coastal faculty member and university chaplain, the



award is given annually to a senior on the basis of conspicuous service to the university through involvement and leadership in campus organizations. Núñez, who went from Coastal mascot to an unprecedented two-year term as president of SGA, was cited for his leadership qualities, his high principles and reliability.

Susan M. Libes received the Distinguished Teacher-Scholar Lecturer Award. Sponsored by HTC, Inc., this award was initiated in 1996 to recognize faculty mem-

bers who distinguish themselves as teachers, scholars and communicators. During the fall, the recipient delivers a public lecture drawn from his or her area of expertise.

Libes is the author of one of the first textbooks in marine chemistry, has secured grants to upgrade teaching laboratories in science and to support her research, has distinguished herself by developing a highly effective pedagogy in the classes that she teaches, and is one of the leaders in overseeing independent undergraduate research projects. During the present semester she was one of the first four faculty members selected to participate in Coastal's new Public Engagement Directed Studies program and is working with the City of Conway and the Environmental Protection Agency to facilitate the Waccamaw Riverkeeper program.

Darla J. Domke-Damonte was presented the Student Affairs Division Award, which honors faculty who make significant contributions to the quality of student life



through participation and leadership in the co-curricular activities of the university. An assistant professor of management, she serves as director of International Programs, chairs the university scholarship committee and was nominated for the Distinguished Teacher of the Year Award in 2002.

Domke-Damonte has been instrumental in establishing exchange programs with universities abroad, particularly in Germany, and she has served as faculty adviser to Coastal's Society for the

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



Peer mentor program receives honor

The Coastal Carolina University Peer Mentor Program was recently honored at the 2003 annual spring conference of the South Carolina College Personnel Association (SCCPA) as one of two Honorable Mentions for the 2003 State Programming Award.

The award recognizes outstanding efforts and dedication to student development in the state of South Carolina. Coastal's Peer Mentor Program competed in the category Public Institutions with 5,000 or More Students, which matched it against programs at larger institutions such as Clemson University and the University of South Carolina. While a program at Clemson University won the award, the Peer Mentor Program was one of the only other two mentioned for honors.

Under the direction of Brad Harmon, the program annually recruits and trains outstanding students to serve as role models to first-year students at Coastal. Mentors serve as co-instructors in the First-Year Student Success Program and work with a member of the Coastal faculty to plan and teach a success seminar to first-year students.



History speaks

Pulitzer Prize-winning newspaperman Horace Carter spoke to students in Wink Prince's History 389 class (History of the New South) recently. Carter, longtime Tabor City, N.C., editor and founder of Atlantic Publishing, won the 1953 Pulitzer for Meritorious Public Service for his newspaper's stance against activities of the Ku Klux Klan. He received an honorary degree from Coastal last year.


