Board approves budget, tenure

The Coastal Carolina University Board of Trustees approved a \$68.9 million budget for the 2003-2004 academic year at its quarterly meeting May 9.

As part of the budget plan, the board approved a tuition increase, effective for fall 2003. In-state tuition will increase \$420 per semester, from \$2,175 to \$2,595 per semester, an increase of 19.31 percent. Out-of-state tuition will increase \$555 per semester, from \$5,880 to \$6,435, an increase of 9.44 percent.

Coastal's tuition is still below the average for public institutions in South Carolina.

The board approved a 2.85 increase in room, board and health service fees, from \$2,805 to \$2,885 per semester.

The board approved distinguished emeritus status for retiring faculty member Stephen Nagle and emeritus status for Pat Rohr and Robert Squatriglia, who are also retiring. Nagle joined Coastal's English faculty in 1972; Rohr joined Coastal's biology faculty in 1972; and Squatriglia is retiring after 25 years as head of Student Affairs.

The board also approved recommendations by the administration for faculty promotions and tenure:

- Eldred "Wink" Prince Jr. has been promoted to professor of history.
- Sharon Thompson has been promoted to professor of health.
- Darla Domke-Damonte has been pro-
