R. Cathcart Smith named trustee emeritus

The Coastal Carolina University Board of Trustees has named long-time university supporter R. Cathcart Smith trustee emeritus.

According to James J. Johnson, who was chair of the board when Smith was selected for the prestigious honor, "Cathcart Smith is a leader whose pioneering spirit has served as a guiding force in the creation of higher education in Horry County and South Carolina – he richly deserves this honor."

Smith was appointed by former Gov. Carroll A. Campbell Jr. to serve as a member of the first Board of Trustees of Coastal Carolina University, a position Smith held from July 1993 through February 1995. As part of his more than 40 years of service to Coastal Carolina University, Smith also was a founder and first president of Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc. At the state level, he was vice chair of the South Carolina Board of Education. He was a member of the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education from 1971 to 1978; he served as chair of the commission from 1972 to 1978.

A retired physician, Smith was graduated from

Duke Medical University in 1939. He received a bachelor's degree from The Citadel in 1935. In 1995, Smith received the honorary degree of Doctor of Public Service from Coastal Carolina. In 1977, he received the honorary degree of Doctor of Science from The Citadel. In 1975, he received the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters from the University of South Carolina.

Smith opened Baskerville Medical Clinic in Pawleys Island in 1985 to serve the medically indigent of the Waccamaw Neck area.

In 1978, Smith received the Order of the Palmetto, which was established in 1970 by former Gov. John West to recognize distinguished individuals for outstanding service to the state.

Smith lives in Murrells Inlet.

The board also honored Johnson at its October meeting. He was presented a framed Atheneum print in recognition of his service to the institution as first chair of the university's Board of Trustees. Johnson served two terms as board chair: he was elected chair of the board by his peers in 1993 and 1994. ♦

Coastal Invitational Sportfishing in Murrells Inlet

Coastal Carolina University will sponsor its 22nd annual sportfishing match and seminar in Murrells Inlet on Friday, Oct. 27.

When the first Coastal Carolina Invitational Sportfishing Match was held 22 years ago, it was Coastal Carolina vs. Francis Marion University in a one-day deep sea competition. Through the years, teams from New England, Canada, Japan and numerous southeastern schools have competed in the tournament, which is the successor to intercollegiate tuna matches formerly held in Nova Scotia.

According to tournament director Donald Millus, all of the competing teams – University of South Carolina Medical School, Clemson, Francis Marion, Western Ontario and Coastal Carolina universities, – will economize by fishing from the same headboat, the *New Captain Bill* out of Captain Dick's Marina in Murrells Inlet.

Last year, male and female student anglers caught 44 kings and stringers of fat black seabass while using frozen cigar minnows or live bait caught on gold hook rigs.

According to Millus, after 16 years of three-day matches, the invitational was cut to a one-day affair in 1991

and moved from National Hunting and Fishing Day in September to late October. Instead of sailing 50 miles out toward the Gulf Stream, the collegiate anglers take advantage of the October inshore migration of king mackerel to save fuel and catch more fish.

Local fishing captain Skip Opalko fished in the first tournament. Richard Moore will serve as chief judge, as he has since 1974. Richard Lee, head golf professional at The Witch Golf Course, also will serve as judge.

Weigh-in will be at 5 p.m. at Captain Dick's Marina and is open to the public. Prizes have been donated by major tackle companies including Abu Garcia, Ande Line, Berkley, Buck Knives, Daiwa, DataSport, O. Mustad & Son, Penn, Plano, Remington, Shakespeare, Wright & McGill, Zebco, and *Salt Water Sportsman Magazine*.

On-board lunch and an awards cookout are funded by the Murrells Inlet Sportfishing Club. The cookout will be held at the Sunny Side Restaurant in Murrells Inlet at the conclusion of the tournament.

Coastal men attend Million Man March

Among the estimated 500,000 people who attended the *Million Man March* held in Washington, D.C. on Oct. 16 were Coastal's Charles Wright and Ronnie Howard.

Wright was watching a news program on the event with his wife on Sunday night. "I was compelled to attend," Wright said. So compelled that he and his wife drove all night to take part in the monumental event.

According to Wright, a wide variety of people ranging from who he thought were the homeless to gang members gathered for a common cause. "On the whole, the experience was very positive – almost spiritual," he said.

The purpose of the march was to gather African American men from across the country, empower them with goals and ideas, and encourage them to return to their communities as leaders and positive role models.

Howard was part of a bus group. Due to the massive crowd, the group parked several blocks away from the march site and took a subway which was filled to capacity. Howard said it would have been impossible to get an accurate count of everyone who attended due to the crowd movement. Both men agreed the crowd was much larger than estimates quoted in the news.

Wright said, "Even if only a fraction of the people who attended keep their commitment, it will have an impact." Wright described that commitment as going into the community and registering people to vote, speaking to schools and civic organizations and serving as a positive role model for young people. ♦

SCRS contingent beneficiaries information

To clarify any confusion on how the new South Carolina Retirement System (SCRS) contingent beneficiary program operates, the SCRS supervisor responsible for the program provided the following information to the Office of Human Resources and Affirmative Action.

According to Tim Wert, "Members of SCRS may now name someone to receive their contributions to SCRS upon their death in the event the primary beneficiary predeceases the member. That is, you name Person A to

receive your contributions if you die before you retire. Before the new contingency policy if Person A died before you did, your estate received the contributions. Now you may name a Person B to receive the money if Person A dies before you do."

Items in the Coastal Carolina People section will appear in the "On Campus" issue following the presentation or event.

Daniel Abel and **Robert Young** have conducted several workshops on critical thinking at conferences in California. At the 15th International Conference on Critical Thinking, held at Sonoma State University, **Abel** conducted two workshops that dealt with developing and using relevant exercises involving critical thinking and active learning about environmental and other issues. **Abel** defines critical thinking as rigorous thinking that involves ascertaining the central part of an argument and analyzing assumptions thoroughly in an effort to make sound judgements. His workshops also dealt with student course reaction evaluations, or questionnaires which allow students to assess their educational experiences. Among the forms examined, Coastal's evaluation form was chosen as the most effective for evaluating a critical thinking curriculum, beating Mary Washington and Sonoma State University, home of the critical thinking foundation. Both **Abel** and **Young** attended the 1995 National Marine Educators Association Annual Conference in San Diego, where they conducted a workshop together. The focus of the exercise involved using critical thinking skills to solve an environmental problem.

Arlene Adams recently published an article, "Elementary education majors learn key lesson: Teachers of writing must write first," in the fall 1995 issue of the *Teacher Education Journal of South Carolina*. The article describes a teaching procedure that shows students how to overcome fear of writing and of peer criticism.

Karen Carpenter and **Linda Johnson**, and a School of Education graduate student and an Horry County teacher, have published an article, "Maurice, A.K.A. Snoop Dog," in the fall 1995 issue of the *Teacher Education Journal of South Carolina*. The article draws from the ethnographic research **Johnson** conducted as part of the practicum of a graduate level growth and development course taught by **Carpenter**. The article details the bio-social, ethnic, developmental and educational variables that create barriers to learning for a middle school, African American child. Drawing from her in-depth knowledge of the child's learning styles and motivations to learn, **Johnson** synthesized an Individual Educational Plan that successfully assisted the child to competently identify and interpret poetic devices such as simile, metaphor, personifi-

cation, onomatopoeia, repetition, rhyme and alliteration with 90 percent accuracy.

Debbie Dewitt has been awarded the Pee Dee Coastal Association for the Education of Young Children's 1995 Community Service Award. The award was given in recognition of the planning and implementation of "The RainbowFest." This children's festival is held annually at Coastal during the "Week of the Young Child" in mid-April. The award was presented at the SCAEYC conference held in Columbia on Oct. 14.

Jacqueline Gmuca, **Glenda Sweet**, **Brian Nance** and **Ray Moyer** participated in the 21st Annual Carolinas Symposium on British Studies, sponsored by Appalachian State University and held in Boone, N.C., Oct. 7 and 8. **Gmuca**, program committee chair, was installed as president; **Sweet** and **Nance** chaired program sessions. Coastal Carolina has been associated with the Carolinas Symposium since its inception and will host this interdisciplinary organization for the second time in October 1996. Faculty interested in organizing a session, submitting a paper or learning more about the Symposium, should contact **Gmuca** at extension 2418.

The South Carolina Commission on Higher Education has named **Linda Hollandsworth** one of several runners-up from two and four-year institutions across the state for the *Governor's Professor of the Year Award*. Traditionally, a selection committee including representatives from the House, Senate, Office of the Governor and retired educators and members of the business community selects the finalists. In April 1995, **Hollandsworth** was presented the Coastal Educational Foundation Distinguished Teaching Award at Coastal's annual Honors Convocation.

Marios Katsioloudes, **Steinunn Thordardottir** and **Phillip W. Balsmeier** have published an article, "Iceland Drifting Towards International Integration: The Pros and Cons of Joining the European Union," in the *International Journal of Commerce and Management*. The article will appear in an issue in early 1996. **Katsioloudes** also facilitated a board of directors retreat of the South Carolina Victim Assistance Network, a non-profit organization in Columbia that provides services to victims of crime. The board worked on a strategic plan under **Katsioloudes'** guidance.

Cudone Tournament brings women golfers to Strand

Coastal's fourth annual Carolyn Cudone Intercollegiate Golf Tournament will be held Friday, Nov. 3 through Sunday, Nov. 5 at Prestwick Golf Club in Myrtle Beach. Spectators are invited to attend the tournament free-of-charge; tee times begin at 8 a.m. daily.

Teams participating with Coastal in the tournament are Auburn University, Florida State University, University of South Florida, University of Georgia, University of Miami, Duke University, College of Charleston, University of Kentucky, University of Florida, Louisiana State University, Furman University, Oklahoma State University, University of North Carolina and University of Alabama.

The tournament is named in honor of Carolyn Cudone, a Myrtle Beach resident and ambassador of the game of golf.

With 48 championships at the state and national levels, Cudone's experience includes international victories in a 1956 Curtis Cup match between the United States and Great Britain; the 1960 Curtis Cup team, which Cudone captained; and the International Four Ball Match Play Championship in 1962. Cudone also is a five-time winner of the USGA Women's Senior National Championship from 1968 to 1972, and also finished second twice, and third once.

Cudone has been named to the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame, South Carolina Golf Hall of Fame, the Carolinas Golf Hall of Fame, and the New York State Hall of Fame.

In 1981, Cudone, with the assistance of area golf professionals, organized the Myrtle Beach Area Junior Golf program, a prototype program that introduces children ages 8 to 18 to the game. In the 13 years since the junior program was established, many young golfers have participated in the popular program conducted at area
