

### **3 new trustees** join Coastal Board

Three new members were named to Coastal's Board of Trustees.

Joe L. Carter, Dr. Samuel J. Swad and Samuel H. Frink have been selected to



serve as members of Coastal Carolina University's Board of Trustees.

Carter, of Myrtle Beach, is a gubernatorial appointee replacing George Williams Sr.; Swad, of Gaffney, replaces Juli Power of the Fifth Congressional District; and Frink, of Conway, is also a gubernatorial appointee.

Carter is a partner in Keystone Commercial Realty, LLC. He is vice presi-

of dent the Historic Ricefields Association, chairman of the Winyah Bay Focus Area Task Force and serves on the Ribbon Blue Mitigation Panel.



He led the effort to establish the Waccamaw National Wildlife Refuge and received the Sierra Club Award in 1997. He is married to Debra M. Carter, and they have two children.

### **Coastal joins hands with Russian colleges**

Coastal President Ron Ingle recently signed agreements with three universities in Moscow, Russia, initiating the development of a number of academic and cultural exchange programs. These agreements mark the first such association between Coastal and institutions of higher education in Russia.

The three universities with which Coastal has established relationships are Open Moscow State Pedagogical Social University, Moscow State University, and the Institute of Market Infrastructure of the Plekhanov State Academy of Economics.

Dennis Wiseman, associate provost for academics at Coastal, and Darla Domke-Damonte, director of international programs for Coastal's E. Craig Wall Sr. College of Business Administration, met in Moscow with representatives of each institution in January to outline the goals of the respective programs.

"These educational institutions in Russia are very interested in partnerships with Western universities," says Wiseman. "Each of the three universities has a different academic focus, and we found several areas of mutual interest that will benefit Coastal and help the Russian universities further their goals."


"Russia has entered a new phase of social and economic development, and these three academic institutions are each taking very proactive approaches to broaden the depth and reach of their educational initiatives in response to market realities," says Domke-Damonte. "It will be both a privilege and a challenge for Coastal to be a part of this dynamic process."

Coastal and Moscow State Open Pedagogical University are looking into developing a program allowing Russian students to complete a bachelor's degree in Moscow and then build on that degree to complete a second bachelor's degree at Coastal.

Tentative plans call for a Coastal faculty member (or members) to travel to Moscow each May to lead a summer program designed to help orient the Russian students in American education methods and language. The first such program will probably be held in May 2004, with Russian students arriving at Coastal for the fall 2004 semester.

Moscow State Social University is



Not only that, but the marching band has been invited to lead the midday parade down Main Street USA in Walt Disney World's Magic Kingdom on Sept. 19, the day before the CCU vs. Jacksonville football game. Spirit will perform in Disney on Friday, spend the day in the park, and cheer the team on at the football game in Jacksonville on Saturday.

Tully predicts 75 to 100 students will sign up for band by fall semester. "Some new people will just show up," says Tully, who played the trumpet in the West Virginia University marching band.

"It was the most exciting experience I've ever had in band," says Tully. "I was able to travel to a lot of places I never



would have gone to otherwise."

He recruited for the new musicians in West Virginia, Wilmington, Hartsville, Charleston and Georgetown.

Practice for the new band begins in August with a couple of band camps beginning on Aug. 10 and culminating on the Aug. 19 with a picnic at Huntington Beach State Park.

interested in developing exchange programs focusing on aging and gender studies, cooperative research in social education, and preparing managers for employment in the social sector, including tourism. These are natural areas for collaboration with Coastal, with its baccalaureate degree in resort tourism and its gerontology certificate. Additional programs are sponsored through Coastal's Center for the Study of Aging and Active Retirement and Clay D. Brittain Center for Resort Tourism.

Coastal will work with the Institute of Market Infrastructure of the Plekhanov State Academy of Economics to create an advanced training program in appraising that will apply to real estate as well as intellectual property.

These programs will provide numerous opportunities for student/faculty exchanges, creating new cross-cultural advantages for both institutions.

### **Coastal Athletic Hall of Fame to be named for Sasser**

Coastal's Athletic Hall of Fame will be named in honor of former athletic director George F. "Buddy" Sasser, President Ron Ingle has announced.

"It is a fitting tribute to Buddy that his name should be permanently linked with Coastal's Athletic Hall of Fame," said Ingle. "Buddy embodies the highest qualities associated with college athletics – integrity, leadership and scholarship."

The Athletic Hall of Fame will be a significant feature of the proposed Athletic Field House scheduled to be constructed near the north end zone of Coastal's new football stadium, probably in 2005. Until that structure is built, the Hall of Fame will be temporarily located in the new stadium, now under construction and scheduled to be completed this summer.

"This is a real honor," said Sasser.

Sasser was recently induct-

ed, along with three other Coastal Carolina athletic administrators and student-athletes, in the inaugural class of the Big South Conference Hall of Fame. Sasser served as the Big South Commissioner from 1989-1996 and had two stints as Coastal's Director of Athletics (1986-1989 and 1996-1999).

A native of Conway, Sasser served as athletic director and head football coach at Conway High School from 1963 to 1970, leading the Tigers to a 66-17-5 record. He was assistant football coach and assistant athletic director at Appalachian State University from 1972 until 1977, and was athletic director and head football coach from 1977 until 1982 at Wofford College.

#### Campbell competes

Coastal Carolina's Amber Campbell competed at the NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships in the hammer throw. Her competition was set for June 12-14, but the outcome was not known by deadline.

Campbell is also scheduled to compete in the U.S. Track & Field Championships in Palo Alto, Calif. Her hammer throw competition is scheduled for Thursday, June 19 at 5:30 p.m. Her mark of 63.76 meters at last year's U.S. Championships is the eighth-best mark of any of the competitors entered in this year's event.

Coastal Carolina men's track and field head coach Andrew Allden was named the Southeast District Coach of the Year recently by the U.S. Track Coaches Association. As the recipient of the award, Allden is one of nine coaches that will be considered for Division I National Coach of the Year honors.

#### CCU player drafted by Padres



### University gets national award for financial reporting

Coastal has received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting, a national award given by the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA), for its comprehensive annual financial report (CAFR).

According to GFOA, the

Certificate of Achievement is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting, and its attainment represents a significant accomplishment by a government and its management.

As the individual primarily responsible for preparing the award-winning CAFR, Linda P. Lyerly, controller at



Coastal Carolina University, received an Award of Financial Reporting Achievement.

The award letter states that the CAFR has been judged by an impartial panel to meet the high standards of the program including demonstrating a constructive "spirit of full disclosure" to clearly communicate

its financial story and motivate potential users and user groups to read the CAFR.

"As a certified public accountant, as well as a trustee, I am doubly excited by the significance of this award," said Clark Parker, board chairman. "The Board of Trustees is always fully informed with management data for decision making."

President Ron Ingle added this praise,

"In these hard financial times, the national recognition that accompanies this award confirms that Coastal's excellence in financial management includes not only sound fiscal responsibility, but also a continuing commitment to the full disclosure for which the award was given.

"I am especially proud of the excellence in financial leadership exhibited by our chief financial officer, Executive Vice President Sally Horner, and by Mrs. Lyerly as controller," Ingle said.

Other South Carolina senior colleges and universities that received the award last year are Clemson University, the College of Charleston and the Medical University of South Carolina.
