School of Business unveils Wall Fellows Program

When more than 20 leaders of major U.S. corporations were asked what attributes they look for in young people who are entering the workplace, their responses pointed to individuals with strong leadership skills who have the ability to sustain and discharge significant responsibility with a high level of competence.

In an innovative response to this demand for quality professionals, the School of Business has instituted a new two-year Wall Fellows Program for business majors. Inspired by the needs and concerns of the leaders of these major corporations, the program has been developed by the Wall Fellows Board of Advisers: Peter B. Barr, William J. Baxley Jr., Clay D. Brittain Jr., Fran B. Gilbert, John C. Griggs, E. Craig Wall Jr. and William Woodson.

The Wall Fellows Advisory Board has selected six Coastal business majors to participate in the privately funded program. They are:

- Daniel Aronson junior marketing major from Myrtle
- · Brynjolfur J. Baldursson junior finance and marketing major from Gardabaer, Iceland
- Tammy Bazin junior accounting major from Westminster, Vt.
- · Vicki Elders junior accounting major from Conway
- Jamie Lucas-Scialdone junior finance major from Surfside Beach; and
- Miguel Patiño junior marketing major from Murrells

The board also is responsible for raising private funds to support the program. According to Wall Fellows Program Director William Woodson, support of the program is derived completely from private sources which have been raised by the board. He estimates that the cost to sustain each student in the program is approximately \$10,000 per year - at no cost to the student or the university.

At the center of the multi-faceted program is a three credit-hour undergraduate course per semester that covers numerous non-traditional areas including interpersonal skills, personal health and appearance, personal finance and planning, cultural skills, intellectual acuity, business and social etiquette, foreign language study, travel knowledge, business and personal ethics, and

According to Woodson, as students are immersed in this experience, they are exposed to a learning process that involves conceptualizing a situation, mentally reasoning through a situation, visualizing a response and articulating or executing a response.

The intent of the program is to professionally, socially and intellectually groom students in preparation for the highlight of the program: two two-month paid internships at the close of the junior and senior years.

The first internship is conducted at a major company in a metropolitan U.S. city such as New York, San Francisco or Dallas. The second internship is conducted at a major company in an international city such as Paris, Madrid or Milan. Students are sent in pairs to these cities where they work for separate companies from May through

Student internships are in fields other than the chosen majors of participants. According to Woodson, this is done to provide students with a broad knowledge of the business field.

"Our goal is to round out personal and social skills to complement academic training to make students fully competitive with business graduates from other schools," Woodson said. "There are no short cuts in the learning process," Woodson said.

According to Woodson, "The course is designed to supplement academic training that students are receiving in the business school with certain real world skills that are both necessary and important for them to succeed in business and the larger world of business in the 1990s."

Students are required to read from a multitude of sources. In addition to a subscription to the Sunday New York Times, students must regularly read magazines in the areas of business, general news, lifestyle, personal fitness, art and fashion.

Students use classic texts such as Jansen's The History of Art, Machlis' The Enjoyment of Music, Emily Post's Etiquette - A Guide to Modern Manners and Walter Hoving's Tiffany's Table Manners.

Students work out with a personal trainer on campus three mornings a week and have a foreign language coach assigned to them. •

Coastal students hold leadership positions in Legislature

When the fall session of the South Carolina Student Legislature convened in Columbia from Nov. 1 through 4, Coastal leaders were at the helm.

Several Coastal Student Government Association (SGA) leaders were elected to office in the legislature for the 1995-1996 year. They are:

- James Dukes Jr. SCSL Governor, senior secondary education and political science major from Kingstree, Coastal SGA student body president (SCSL Lt. Governor 1994-1995, SCSL President Pro-Tempore 1993-1994);
- Ryan Brown SCSL Lt. Governor, junior history and political science major from Chesapeake, Va., Coastal SGA vice president (SCSL President Pro-Tempore 1994-1995);
- Michael Hursey SCSL Attorney General, junior political science major from Myrtle Beach, Coastal class president; and
- Trista Welsh SCSL Supreme Court Chief Justice, senior political science major from Wilmington, Calif., Coastal SGA treasurer (SCSL Supreme Court Justice 1994-1995).

Founded in 1954, SCSL is designed to educate students about the functions of democratic government and promote student input into public policy-making in South Carolina by passing bills and resolutions; sometimes these bills find sponsors in the General Assembly and become

SCSL is composed of approximately 150 delegates from 11 South Carolina colleges and universities, and is funded by the South Carolina General Assembly.

The student legislature is a mock government modeled after South Carolina's government. House and Senate members, who are selected by the individual member schools, elect five executive officers: Governor, Lt. Governor, Speaker of the House, President Pro-Tempore of the Senate, and Speaker Pro-Tempore of the House. The student legislature also has a five-member mock Supreme Court which makes rulings on popular cases that are heard by the S.C. Supreme Court.

Several outstanding leaders once served as SCSL governors including Robert McNair from 1956 to 1957, Lee Atwater from 1973 to 1974, and Van Hipp from 1978 to

According to Richard Weldon, Coastal business law professor and SGA and SCSL faculty adviser, the Coastal delegation is composed of some very impressive leaders. "It's rare for an institution to have such heavy representation at this level," Weldon said. He said this is only the second time that a Coastal student has held the position of Governor, and the first time this post has been held by the Coastal student body president.

During the four-day session, students convened in the State House chambers where they met in joint sessions, discussed bills and resolutions and more. Elected officials such as Gov. David Beasley, Lt. Gov. Bob Peeler, and S.C. House of Representatives speaker Tim Rodgers addressed the group.

Center assists with "Reclaiming Our Streets" project

Coastal's Center for Education and Community will serve as the information and communications hub for a county-wide project called "Reclaiming Our Streets." According to Danielle Eiler, who is coordinating the center's efforts, *The Sun News* requested support from the university for the ongoing project which is similar to a program initiated by the *Charlotte Observer* called "Taking Back Our Neighborhoods."

The clean-up of the Racepath community was the first project undertaking. Eiler hopes this will be an ongoing process in which the university can aid the community in ridding its streets of crime and drugs. Volunteer Barbara Bellamy said without Coastal the success of the effort would not have been possible. Joey McNutt, chair of the Horry County Council, said he and the council were grateful for the university's efforts and hoped this was the beginning of something long-term.

Nance selected to revise biography

Professor of History Brian Nance has been selected as one of the authors for the modern revised version of the *Dictionary of National Biography*.

Known to scholars as the DNB, the publication has long been regarded as the original great biographical reference work in the English-speaking world, according to Roy Talbert.

Originally published in 22 volumes in the late 19th century, Talbert said the new DNB is "a monumental effort eagerly awaited by scholars. It is a great honor for Coastal to have one of its professors selected to participate." The project is sponsored by Oxford University Press.

Nance will write the entry on Thomas Cademan, court physician to Queen Henrietta Maria of Great Britain and Ireland, physician to Francis Russell, fourth Earl of Bedford, and first master of the Company of Distillers of London, which was the only distilling company in London licensed by the king in the trade of distilling spirits and making vinegar for medicinal purposes.

According to Talbert, Nance is an expert in the history of medicine. Nance's forthcoming book, *Diaries of Diseases*, focuses on the medical practices in the court of King James I.

"For a century the DNB has been the standard first reference for the lives of British subjects and will probably be so for another century," Nance said.

Nance joined the Coastal faculty in 1991. He earned a Ph.D. in 1991 and a master's degree in 1986, both in history from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill; and a bachelor's degree in history from New Mexico State University in 1984. ◆

Olsen wins national award

Paul Olsen has been named winner of the College Media Advisers Distinguished Four-Year Magazine Adviser Award for 1995.

The award, CMA's highest honor in its division, recognizes Olsen's work as adviser of *Archarios*, Coastal's undergraduate literary arts magazine. The magazine has won numerous awards, including the Best of Show Award at the 1993 Fall National College Media Convention.

In his nearly 30 years of teaching, Olsen said he has found that it is through failure that the lessons of life are learned. "The knowledge we learn from these mistakes is accumulated and kept with us in the form of wisdom," Olsen said.

Dianna Alsup, managing editor of *Archarios*, said Olsen's knowledge in the area of publishing and graphic design has been extremely helpful. "He not only advises, but he is active in helping us achieve our goals," she said.

Olsen was honored at the nation's largest assembly of collegiate journalists and their advisers — the 71st Annual Fall National College Media Convention, held Nov. 2 through 5, in Washington, D.C.

Olsen joined the Coastal faculty in 1989. He earned a master's degree in fine arts in 1975 and a bachelor's degree in 1973, both in graphic design from the University of Miami.
