USC-COASTAL DEDICATES NEW BASEBALL FACILITY

Officials from the Horry County Higher Education Commission and administrators from USC-Coastal Carolina College officially dedicated a new \$180,000 baseball stadium at the college Saturday.

"The dedication of this facility is an important milestone for the athletic program at USC-Coastal Carolina College," says Dr. Edward M. Singleton, Chancellor of the institution. "For years now the Coastal Carolina College Fighting Chanticleers have fielded championship baseball teams, but the baseball facility has not been comparable in quality with Coastal's baseball talent. Now the college has a baseball playing facility which ranks among the best small-college facilities in the Southeast. The baseball program deserves a quality facility, the Chanticleer fans deserve a quality facility and we in the administration of the college are glad to see this day arrive."

The stadium, which seats 975 spectators, was designed by Timbes, Wilund and Usry Architects Inc. of Myrtle Beach and was constructed by Farley Construction Company of Columbia at a total cost of \$180,168. Funded by the Horry County Higher Education Commission, the stadium is constructed of reinforced concrete and features press box facilities for two broadcast stations, a professional sound system, concession facilities and rest rooms.

The upgraded playing field is sown with Tifton 419 Bermuda grass and is irrigated by a pop-up system. Existing dugout facilities have also been upgraded.

"While this stadium may not be as large as some baseball facilities at larger universities, it is comparable in quality to any collegiate baseball facility in South Carolina," says Phillip Massey, Deputy Director of Physical Plant at the college. "And it is superior in quality to the baseball stadiums you find at most colleges of our size."

Massey says construction of the stadium is phase one of a three-phase plan for upgrading the baseball facilities at the college. In the future, another phase of construction will add lighting to the field for night games and the final phase will cover the center section of the stadium and will add backed seats to the facility.

In addition to serving as the home of the Coastal Carolina College Fighting Chanticleers, the new facility will also be used by Conway High School, American Legion Post III, Conway City Recreation teams and for area baseball playoffs and tournaments, college officials say.

STATEWIDE TEACHER'S CONFERENCE AT USC-COASTAL

Teachers from throughout South Carolina will be learning about themselves at a novel seminar to be hosted by USC-Coastal Carolina College on Friday and Saturday, April 24-25.

Entitled "Classroom 81: Teacher Self-Concept Renewal," the conference is designed to examine the needs of the teacher as a person and to promote the development of healthy self-images among the state's teachers. Sponsored by a consortium of teachers, administrators and college instructors, the conference will be held at the Landmark Resort Hotel in Myrtle Beach.

"At a time when our society is asking more and more of our teachers, we need to help them feel better physically, mentally, and emotionally," says Bob Vaughn, chairman of the Inservice Committee of the Coastal Carolina/Horry County Teaching Center Network. "Our teachers are under a lot of stress and we need to help them learn how to deal with it and how to feel good about themselves and about teaching."

The conference program includes presentations about handling disruptive children, the teacher as a person, and teacher renewal strategies. The program also includes scheduled socials and a two-mile beach run for teachers. Keynote speakers are Kenneth Musko, whose ideas for handling disruptive children have been featured on NBC-TV's The Today Show and other national television programs; Donald Tubbs, an author and an education consultant for three Southern states; and Dr. Patricia Candal, a consultant and a professor in the School of Teacher Education at USC-Coastal Carolina College.

HOUSE SPEAKER TO ADDRESS USC-COASTAL COMMENCEMENT

South Carolina Speaker of the House Ramon Schwartz, Jr. will deliver the keynote address at the 1981 graduation exercises at USC-Coastal Carolina College, college officials have announced.

Commencement ceremonies at the college are scheduled for 10:30 a.m., Saturday, May 2nd in Kimbel Gymnasium of Coastal Carolina's William's Brice Building.

A native of Sumter, Schwartz is a 1948 graduate of the University of South Carolina, from which he received a law degree. He is married to the former Rosa Weinberg and is the father of four children.

A veteran of the European Theater of Operations in World War II, he is a former state president of the South Carolina Jaycees and was president of the Sumter Rotary Club. He was City Recorder in Sumter from 1953 - 1957, and in 1968, he was elected to the South Carolina House of Representatives. Since 1974, he has been reelected without opposition.

In the House, he served on the House Judiciary Committee for four terms and also served as the Chairman of the House Rules Committee. In 1976, he was elected by the House membership to the post of Speaker Pro Tem. Upon the retirement of former House Speaker Rex Carter, Rep. Schwartz was unanimously elected as Speaker of the House in 1980.

He is a member of the Episcopal Church of the Holy Comforter and is a resident of Sumter.
