USC-COASTAL STUDENTS HONORED FOR ACHIEVEMENT

Seventy-two students from USC-Coastal Carolina College were honored last week in the First Annual Honors Convocation at the college. The students were recognized for achievement in three major areas: Participation Awards, Honorary Awards and Academic Awards.

The prestigious Faculty Award for General Excellence was presented to Silvard Kool, a senior student from The Netherlands. Kool holds a 3.6 grade point ratio on a 4-point system, has made the Dean's List for four semesters and has been on the President's List one semester. He has a double major in Marine Science and Biology, is fluent in five languages, has received two scholarships and was selected for Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities. He is Vice President of Coastal's International Club, is active in a variety of student organizations and is a member of the college soccer team.

The coveted George C. Rogers Award went to Coastal senior Dan Hambrick, a senior who is president of the college Student Government Association. He is also president of the Student Christian Movement; is vice-president of service for Alpha Phi Omega; is vice-president of the Karate Club; is vice-president of the Canterbury Art Club and was a fall delegate to the South Carolina State Student Legislature.

The highest award a faculty member at Coastal can receive, the Distinguished Teaching Award, was presented to Dr. Eddie Dyer, Assistant Professor of Political Science at the college. Dyer holds a bachelor's degree from Gilford College, a master's degree and a doctorate degree from the University of South Carolina. He was selected as the faculty member most knowledgeable about his subject; most able to communicate his knowledge and most interested in his students.

HOUSE SPEAKER TO ADDRESS USC-COASTAL COMMENCEMENT

South Carolina Speaker of the House Ramon Schwartz, Jr. will deliver the keynote address at the 1981 graduation exercises at USC-Coastal Carolina College, college officials have announced.

Commencement ceremonies at the college are scheduled for 10:30 a.m., Saturday, May 2nd in Kimbel Gymnasium of Coastal Carolina's William's Brice Building.

A native of Sumter, Schwartz is a 1948 graduate of the University of South Carolina, from which he received a law degree. He is married to the former Rosa Weinberg and is the father of four children.

A veteran of the European Theater of Operations in World War II, he is a former state president of the South Carolina Jaycees and was president of the Sumter Rotary Club. He was City Recorder in Sumter from 1953-1957, and in 1968, he was elected to the South Carolina House of Representatives. Since 1974, he has been reelected without opposition.

In the House, he served on the House Judiciary Committee for four terms and also served as the Chairman of the House Rules Committee. In 1976, he was elected by the House membership to the post of Speaker Pro Tem. Upon the retirement of former House Speaker Rex Carter, Rep. Schwartz was unanimously elected as Speaker of the House in 1980.

He is a member of the Episcopal Church of the Holy Comforter and is a resident of Sumter.

CLASSIC FOREIGN FILM SHOWN TO PUBLIC AT COASTAL

Motion picture buffs will be able to view a classic British film this week at the final presentation of the USC-Coastal Carolina College International Film Series.

The film *The Devils*, which was made in England, will be shown at 8 p.m., Thursday, April 23 in the College Center at USC-Coastal Carolina. Admission is open to season ticket holders and is \$2.00 for others.

The film is directed by Ken Russel and stars British performers Oliver Reed and Venessa Redgrave in the title roles. The film's plot centers around the execution of a worldly 17th century priest (Oliver Reed), who is accused of sorcery by a misdirected group of nuns led by Venessa Redgrave.

The foreign films series is sponsored by the Coastal Carolina College International Club and the Coastal Council for Internationals.

TEACHER ED WINS STATE AWARD

The South Carolina Association of Supervision and Curriculum Development has presented its annual award for the state's outstanding higher education to the School of Teacher Education at Coastal Carolina College for its field-based teacher education program.

Although the award was presented to Coastal, Dr. James Rex, Dean of the School of Teacher Education, says much of the credit for the success of the Teacher Education program must also go to the 10 area public schools which serve as teaching centers for the program.

BASEBALL STADIUM DEDICATED

Officials from the Horry County Higher Education Commission and administrators from Coastal Carolina College have officially dedicated a new \$180,000 baseball stadium at the college.

"The dedication of this facility is an important milestone for the athletic program at Coastal Carolina College," says Dr. Edward M. Singleton, Chancellor of the institution. "For years now the Coastal Carolina College Fighting Chanticleers have fielded championship baseball teams, but the baseball facility has not been comparable in quality with Coastal's baseball talent. Now the college has a baseball playing facility which ranks among the best small-college facilities in the Southeast. The baseball program deserves a quality facility, the Chanticleer fans deserve a quality facility and we in the administration of the college are glad to see this day arrive."

The stadium, which seats 975 spectators, was designed by Timbes, Wilund and Usry Architects inc. of Myrtle Beach and was constructed by Farley Construction Company of Columbia at a total cost of \$180,168. Funded by the Horry County Higher Education Commission, the stadium is constructed of reinforced concrete.
