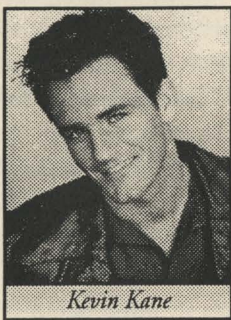

Hamlet opens Thursday, Nov. 6

Hamlet, Shakespeare's most highly acclaimed play, considered by many to be the greatest literary work in the English language, opens Thursday,

Nov. 6 at Coastal and will star Coastal theater alumnus Kevin Kane, now a professional actor based in New York City.

Performances are scheduled for Nov. 6 and 7 at 7:30 p.m., Nov. 8 at 2 and 7:30 p.m. and Nov. 9 at 3 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Admission is free with a Coastal ID, but you must have an admission ticket.

The 17-member cast includes Dan Ennis as Polonius, Coastal graduate Sean Pierce as Claudius, Kris Rau as Queen Gertrude, and Eddie Dyer as the ghost of Hamlet's father.

Student cast members include: Jed Keck as Horatio and Hamlet's understudy; Mike Bratsafolis as Laertes; Julia Burgoyne as Ophelia; Tiffany Scribner as Guildenstern; Dave Thomas as Rosencrantz; Julian Colleta as a gravedigger; Jenny Greer as Marcellus; Kenny Greer as Francisco and the priest; Rob Davidson as Osric; Danny Hinckley as Bernardo; and Charlotte Dyal and Dan Morgan as elite soldiers.

Libes to give Teacher-Scholar lecture

Susan Libes, a marine science and chemistry professor at Coastal and a founder of the Waccamaw Riverkeeper program, will give a

public lecture on the state of the river titled "Why We Should All Be Waccamaw Waterwatchers" on Thursday, Oct. 30, at 7:30 p.m. in the Wall Auditorium. The lecture is the 2003 installment of the annual Distinguished Teacher-Scholar Lecturer series.

In her lecture, Libes will draw from her extensive research to present a detailed account of the environmental well-being of the river and its importance to the future of the region. She will outline proposals for educational programs, public service efforts and governmental coordination aimed at improving the management of local natural resources.

Libes, a native of New York, earned a bachelor's degree in chemistry in 1977 from Douglass College, Rutgers University, graduating with general honors and distinction in chemistry. She

received a Ph.D. in chemical oceanography from the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution and Massachusetts Institute of Technology's joint program in oceanography and ocean engineering in 1983.

Libes joined the Coastal faculty in 1983 and served as chair of the Department of Marine Science from 1993 to 2000. She is the founding program director of Coastal's state-certified Environmental Quality Laboratory, which conducts water quality analysis of area beaches and waterways. Libes is also a research associate at USC's Belle W. Baruch Institute for Marine Biology and Coastal Research, an adjunct professor in Clemson University's Department of Forest Resources and a research associate of Coastal's Burroughs & Chapin Center for Marine and Wetland Studies.

In 2001, Libes helped create the Winyah Rivers Foundation, whose official purpose is "to protect, preserve, monitor and revitalize the health of the lands and waters of the greater Winyah Watershed." She is the author of *An Introduction to Marine Biogeochemistry*.

Coastal profs publish new ed book

The Modern Middle School: Addressing Standards and Student Needs, a new book co-authored by three professors with Coastal Carolina University ties, is designed to help educators understand and meet the unique challenges needed for successful teaching in the middle school environment.

The book is by Gilbert Hunt, dean of Coastal's College of Education; Dennis Wiseman, associate provost for academics at Coastal; and Sandra Pope Bowden, dean of the School of Education at Charleston Southern University and a former education professor at Coastal.

Published recently by Charles C. Thomas, Ltd. (Springfield, Ill.), the book will be distributed internationally.

According to the authors, successful middle school teachers in today's schools must adopt a teaching philosophy that accommodates the strong focus currently being given to increasing student achievement based on standardized testing and an

equally important focus on student-centered approaches to teaching and learning and the development of the whole child.

"The methods outlined in the book reflect our basic philosophy that the teacher ultimately determines the quality of the school and that the learning environment should be student-centered while maintaining a strong academic foundation," said Hunt.

Topics discussed in *The Modern Middle School* include the psychological development of middle school students, approaches and skills relevant to effective instruction, planning the curriculum, and assessing and reporting student progress.

This is the third book on which Hunt and Wiseman have collaborated.

They have also co-authored *Best Practice in Motivation and Management in the Classroom* and, with Coastal education professor Timothy Touzel, *Effective Teaching: Preparation and Implementation*, now in its third edition.

Freshmen with up to 29 credit hours: Wednesday, Nov. 12 and Thursday, Nov. 13, starting at 9 a.m.

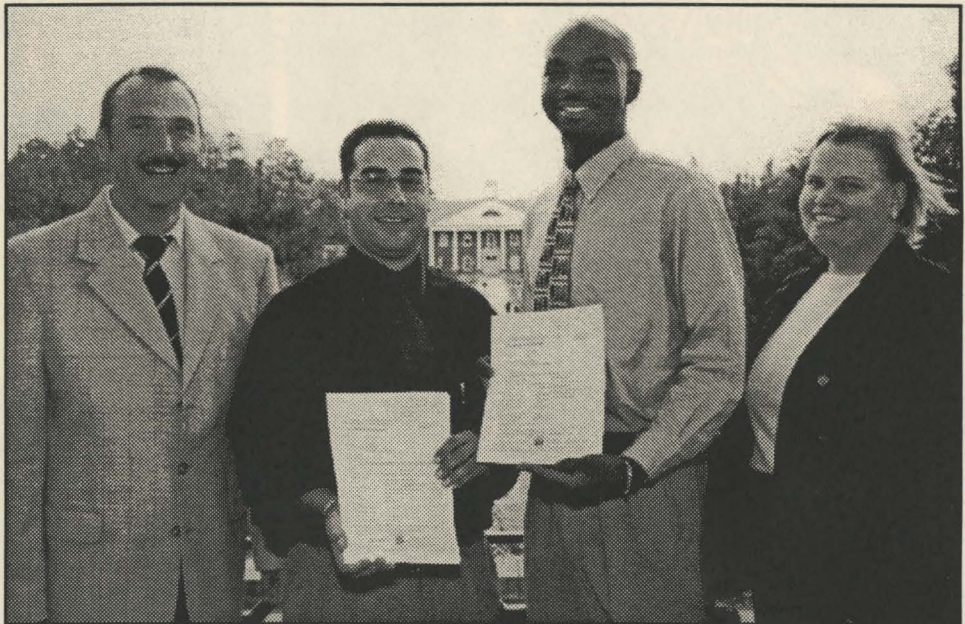
Eligibility status will be based on credit hours earned plus credit hours currently enrolled. For questions, call the Office of the Registrar at 349-2030.
