Coastal Carolina University summer registration to begin

Registration for the 1996 May semester, Summer I, Summer Eight-Week, and Summer II sessions begins Monday, March 25.

May semester classes begin Monday, May 13 and continue through Friday, May 31.

Summer I classes begin Monday, June 3 and continue through Friday, July 5.

Summer Eight-Week classes begin Monday, June 3 and continue through Thursday, July 25.

Summer II classes begin Monday, July 8 and continue through Friday, August 9.

New students, students who are attending another college or university, or non-degree-seeking students must be admitted to the university through the Office of Admissions prior to registering. For admissions information, contact the Office of Admissions at extension 2026.

Continuing students must meet with their adviser and have their adviser sign a Registration Form prior to registering. Continuing students register in the department

or school of their major beginning Monday, March 25 at 9 a.m.

Campus housing is available through the Office of Residence Life to students enrolled in summer sessions for \$80 per week, based on availability.

The Office of Student Employment and Career Management Services will assist summer students with finding summer employment.

Tuition bills will be mailed April 9 for May semester, April 29 for Summer I and Summer Eight-Week, and June 3 for Summer II. To avoid schedule cancellation, tuition payments must be received in the Office of the Bursar by May 8 for May semester, May 28 for Summer I and Summer Eight-Week, and July 1 for Summer II.

- Submit a completed nomination form endorsed by a faculty member certifying academic excellence reflected by a "discipline-related activity," and a copy of the students transcript from the Office of the Registrar.

Nominations will be reviewed and a recipient selected by a faculty committee representing the schools of the university and the Office of the Provost. The award will be presented at the Honors Convocation on Tuesday, April 23 at 7 p.m.

Third annual *Songwriters in the Round* at Coastal

Coastal's third annual *Songwriters in the Round*, featuring Nashville songwriters and musicians John Brannen, Bernie Nelson, Kirk "Jelly Roll" Johnson and George McCorkle, will be held Sunday, March 31 at 3 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Tickets are \$8, students \$5.

John Brannen has been described as the Jack Kerouac of Southern sound. He has traveled extensively writing music and performing from Texas honky tonks to rhythm and blues clubs in New York City and Los Angeles. Throughout his travels, he has remained true to his roots which has not gone unnoticed. His hit song *Moonlight and Magnolias* was a top ten hit on *VH-1* and *Desolation Row* reached number 17 on *Billboard's* charts. He has written songs cut by artists Reba McEntyre, Tom Jones, Richie Havens and others. He also wrote most of the songs on the soundtrack of *Homer and Eddie* which starred James Belushi and Whoopi Goldberg.

Bernie Nelson began his musical career as a solo acoustic artist and later formed a group called Salt Creek which was based in Colorado Springs, Colorado. The band toured the Rock Mountain states and most of the Midwest. In 1984, he moved to Nashville where he has distinguished himself as a songwriter with the hit *Daddy Never Was The*

Cadillac Kind for Conway Twitty.

Kirk "Jelly Roll" Johnson has been a favorite at Coastal's *Songwriters in the Round* concerts since it began. His distinctive style of soulful harmonica playing has made him one of the most sought after studio musicians in Nashville. He has recorded with more than 70 different recording artists and has played on nine platinum albums and eight gold albums. He was one of 10 harmonica standouts featured on *Heavy Duty Harpin* produced by Hohner Harmonicas.

George McCorkle is best known for his performances with the Marshall Tucker Band where he played guitar and wrote songs such as *Fire on the Mountain* and *Last of the Singing Cowboys*. A former resident of the Grand Strand area, he moved to Nashville where he quickly obtained a publishing contract and began writing songs full-time. He was co-writer of *William and Mary*, a hit for singer Davis Daniel. McCorkle also is a favorite among performers at previous *Songwriters in the Round* concerts.

Danish professor to present lecture

Danish professor Jan Gretlund will present a lecture, *Minding Your Southern Fiction*, March 21 at 1 p.m. in ADM 003. The event is free and open to the public.

Gretlund, an associate professor of American studies at Odense University in his native Denmark, is writing a criticism of today's generation of Southern writers. Assessing his project, he said, "My study is planned as a contribution to the debate about the quality of the literary achievement in today's South. I examine whether distinctive traditional themes and cultural concerns have disappeared from the new fiction; and I try to evaluate to what extent contemporary fiction merits both popular and

critical attention. I argue that the emphasis on everyday problems is the strength, and perhaps also the weakness, of contemporary Southern fiction."

Gretlund is a 1995-1996 Fulbright Fellow at the University of South Carolina Institute for Southern Studies.

Gretlund has coedited two books: *Walker Percy Novelist and Philosopher* and *Realist of Distances: Flannery O'Connor Revisited*. He also is a member of the board of the Southern Studies Forum of the European Association of American Studies.

Freedom of Information Act observance

The Freedom Of Information Act (FOIA) of 1966 requires that the records of United States government agencies be made available to the public unless the documents fall within specific exemptions, such as national security. This Act is the basis for the belief that the public has a "right to know."

In observance of Freedom of Information Day on Saturday, March 16, the South Carolina State Library has announced "South Carolina's 10 Most Notable State Publications of 1995." These publications were selected because they are representative of the wide ranging functions the state government performs and because they exemplify the everyday usefulness of government publications.

Kimbel Library, as a selective depository library, maintains a collection of selective federal and state government documents that are available at no charge to the community.
