Coastal Carolina University selected by NASA for project

Coastal Carolina University is one of 21 universities selected by NASA to participate in the Cooperative Program in Earth System Science Education (ESSE). The four-year program is designed to develop new earth and environmental science curriculum and to integrate NASA's global change research into undergraduate education. Other universities participating in the project include Cornell University, Georgia Institute of Technology and Florida Institute of Technology.

NASA will grant the university \$90,000 over a period of three years for the project. Two-thirds of the funding will be used to build a multimedia remote sensing laboratory in Coastal's Science Building. The laboratory, scheduled to be fully operational during the 1997-1998 academic year, will enable the university to gather direct, up-to-date data and images for the purposes of research and education. "Instead of pointing to a figure in a textbook to indicate how the oceans or atmosphere looked five years ago, we will be able to bring the actual image

into the classroom to show how the oceans and atmosphere looked an hour ago," said Craig Gilman, the program's principal investigator. Kevin Hefferan and Paul Gayes are co-investigators of the program.

Prior to activation of the lab, Gilman, Hefferan and Gayes will collaborate with participating universities and NASA scientists on ways to incorporate the most recent developments in global change research into the Coastal curriculum. The collaboration will result in two new classes on earth and environmental science for both science and non-science majors at Coastal. Because the program is designed to stimulate exchange among the participating universities and NASA, curricula developed at Coastal will be provided to the other universities via the Internet, according to Gilman. "We plan to develop classes and labs investigating the ocean's role in global change. These will be incorporated into the curricula of major universities which don't currently study the ocean," he said.

NASA is funding 100 percent of this project. •

Dean of Extended Learning and Public Service named

Peter P. Balsamo has been named Dean of Extended Learning and Public Services, effective July 1, 1996. His responsibilities will include the development and coordination of new and existing conference activities, credit and non-credit continuing education programs and, in cooperation with academic school deans, the promotion and marketing of off-campus and evening academic offerings and summer academic programs.

Balsamo earned a Ph.D. in higher education administration from the University of Alabama and master's and bachelor's degrees in psychology from Montclair State University in New Jersey. He has participated in the Institute for the Management of Lifelong Education at Harvard University and in the Management Institute at the Center of Creative Leadership in Greensboro, N.C. He has significant experience in programming, management and marketing of educational programs.

Since 1985, Balsamo has served as director of continuing education at Radford University in Virginia, where he has taught both undergraduate and graduate courses relating to computer technologies, adult and continuing education, grant writing and telecommunications. He served as associate dean of Radford's Graduate College. In 1988 he received a Kellogg Project Visiting Scholar Research Award at Syracuse University to research the use of technologies in distance learning programs.

Prior to Radford, Balsamo held positions in the College of Continuing Studies at the University of Alabama beginning in 1974.

NCAA Peer Review Committee meets

A five-member team of peers from other colleges, universities and athletic conferences has concluded its visit to campus as part of a more than 16-month study of the university athletic program. As part of the NCAA Division I athletics certification program, the Peer Review Committee on Athletic Recertification studied academic and financial integrity, rules compliance and commitment to gender equity. The committee also examined how the activities of the university's athletic program relate to the mission and purpose of the university. The committee was on campus March 25 to 28

"During the exit meeting, committee members were complimentary of the widespread campus involvement in the study process," said President Ingle. "The committee will report its findings to the NCAA Committee on Athletics Certification and an official report of the university's certification status will be released to the university. I thank the many individuals across the campus

who have contributed to this comprehensive project," Ingle

The NCAA certification program serves to ensure the integrity of each institution's athletics operations, and intends to increase awareness of an institution's athletic program, confirming its strengths and developing plans to improve areas of concern.

The three options of certification status are: certified, certified with conditions, and not certified. Universities and colleges that do not conduct a comprehensive self-study or take corrective actions may have NCAA sanctions imposed. Universities and colleges have an opportunity to correct deficient areas. University officials expect the NCAA to announce Coastal's certification status in summer 1996.

The NCAA certification program is not related to the NCAA investigation of 1994. ◆

Math contest for high schools attracts more than 175 students

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The Department of Mathematics 17th annual Mathematics Contest for High School Students attracted more than 175 students representing 15 middle and high schools. Dobyns-Bennett High School of Kingsport, Tenn., was the overall winner of the competition held at Coastal March 8.

The contest was funded, in part, by a grant from GTE to Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc. The 1996 contest marks the fifth year of sponsorship by GTE. The Horry County Higher Education Commission awards the top finisher from Horry County a full tuition scholarship to attend Coastal for four years and major in mathematics. This winner also will be awarded \$500 in scholarship funds derived from the GTE gift.

In addition to Dobyns-Bennett High School, participating South Carolina high schools included: Andrews, Aynor, Beaufort, Cardinal Newman, Conway, Georgetown, Goose Creek, Hammond, James Island, Johnsonville, Myrtle Beach, North Myrtle Beach, Socastee and Waccamaw Academy.

Students were given one-hour examinations consisting of written, objective questions. Participants competed for individual awards on two levels: Level I questions are taken from Algebra I, Algebra II and Geometry; Level II questions are from Algebra, Geometry, Advanced Algebra and Trigonometry. For each school, the

top three scores in each level were added together to determine a team score. Schools were separated into two categories: Competition I for small schools and Competition II for large and private schools. An awards presentation followed the competition. Individual winners received a Texas Instruments 82 graphing calculator.

Arlene Adams presented a paper, "Preservice Teacher Training in Literacy Instruction: A Journey of Self-Discovery," at the World Conference on Literacy held in Philadelphia. Her paper described the innovative approach to teacher training in literacy that is implemented in Coastal's School of Education. The goal of using this approach is to assist students who have only traditional educational experiences to move into using effective whole language instruction. The conference was jointly sponsored by UNESCO and the International Literacy Institute of Pennsylvania State University.
