

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## **Coastal unveils Campus Master Plan for the future**

The Board of Trustees was presented with the Campus Master Plan that will guide campus planning into the 21st century. The plan includes an estimated \$70 million in capital improvements. The board met for its quarterly meeting April 5.

"The development process for this plan has involved the input of students, faculty, administrators and our many constituent groups," said Coastal President Ronald R. Ingle. "The trustees have encouraged building a plan that realizes the infinite potential and guides the vision of Coastal Carolina for providing educational and enrichment opportunities for our students and the region," Ingle said.


"The study will help us understand the consequences of the removal of oyster reefs, a process that is occurring on a larger scale as a result of human influences," said Dame. "By studying the oyster reef dams, we will advance the understanding of the impact of sea level rise in shallow coastal ecosystems." Supportive studies will be conducted on plankton, bacteria, mobile animals, nutrient cycling and metabolism.

The University of South Carolina's Belle W. Baruch Institute for Marine Biology and Coastal Research professors Dennis Allen, Dave Bushek, Don Edwards, Bjorn Kjerfve, Allan Lewitus and Joe Schubauer-Berigan will participate in the investigation.

Dame joined the Coastal faculty in 1971. He served as chair of the Department of Marine Science until 1991 when he was named the first Palmetto Professor in the state. He earned a Ph.D. in biology and marine studies from the University of South Carolina in 1971; a master's degree in zoology and ecology from the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill in 1967; and a bachelor's degree in biology from the College of Charleston in 1964. Koepfler joined the Coastal faculty in 1990. He earned a Ph.D. in marine science from the College of William and Mary in 1989; and bachelor's degrees in biology and chemistry from the University of Toledo in 1981. ♦

## Deer Trail Preserve nature trail to open

Though Coastal biology major Cissy Lynn Elliott graduated in December 1995, she has devoted much of the new year to a project which she began as an intern last fall - Deer Trail Preserve, the university's first nature trail.

The mile-long trail is set on a 10-acre tract located directly across College Boulevard from the campus near the entrance to Quail Creek Golf Course. Elliott has identified 16 species of trees along the path.

The project is made possible through a \$3,930 grant from the South Carolina Forestry Commission to Coastal biology professors Colleen Lohr and Katherine Taylor for the development and assessment of an urban forest appreciation program.

In addition to enhancing the campus' natural environment, the project is designed to encourage public and private maintenance of trees and improve the public's

knowledge and understanding of the area's trees and vegetation.


Lohr, Taylor and Elliott have named the path Deer Trail Preserve because much of it follows an old deer track. The trail will open in conjunction with campus Earth Day festivities on April 19.

Lohr joined the Coastal faculty in 1974. She earned a Ph.D. in biology from the University of South Florida in 1974 and a bachelor's degree in biology from California State University in 1968.

Taylor joined the Coastal faculty in 1992. She earned a Ph.D. in botany from Louisiana State University in 1992, a master's degree in biology in 1988 and a bachelor's degree in biology, both from Western Washington University.

More than 620 students voted in the March 27 election, a "much higher turnout than in previous elections," according to Ellen Parsons, Coastal's director of student activities. "It was also a much closer race than we have seen in many years," she said.

The Student Government Association serves as a liaison between students and the administration. SGA officers serve on many joint faculty-student committees and represent student opinion to the administration.

institution experienced in the 1980s. With more than \$8 million in construction in the past year, and another \$20

planned for the next two years, Coastal's physical resources must continue in a growth mode, while the academic programs enter a period which emphasizes quality over growth," she said.

"Campus safety and environmental concerns are of prime importance to our students; the plan addresses these kinds of issues as well as landscaping and signage, building design and maintenance," said Stan Godshall, Coastal's director of Facilities Management, the office responsible for directing campus planning and capital projects.

J. David Utterback, a Myrtle Beach-based landscape architect/site planner, prepared Campus Master Landscape Guidelines which are part of the Campus Master Plan.

In other action:

• The board approved admissions criteria, to be phased in through five years, which are based on the applicant's SAT score and high school grade point average. "These performance standards are part of Coastal Carolina's progression as a university," said John Idoux, Coastal provost and vice president for academic affairs. "We are trying to send a message of expectation to students. Although the accepted SAT scores for admission may rise 100 points in five years, the new policy also has a provision

## University receives \$55,00 grant from Knight Foundation

Coastal has received a \$55,000 grant from the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation which will be used for new curricula designed to redefine the long-term educational mission of the E. Craig Wall Sr. School of Business Administration and Computer Science, according to Peter Barr, dean of the school. The Knight Foundation is private, philanthropic organization which supports worthy causes in communities served by the Knight-Ridder newspaper chain.

According to the proposal submitted to the Knight organization by the Coastal Educational Foundation in September 1995, the grant will be combined with monies from local governments and other gifts to help underwrite three programs designed to link the educational mission of the Wall School of Business to the needs of the local community, particularly the area's tourism industry.

The three programs are: the Cooperative Golf

· The board approved an increase in residence hall fees. Effective August 1996, students will be charged \$1,405 per semester, plus fees for health services and meal plans. The increase reflects a 3.31 percent increase, or an additional \$45 per semester.

• The board approved Eric T. Koepfler to be promoted, with tenure, to associate professor of marine science, effective Aug. 16, 1996.

- The board approved the following faculty members for tenure, effective Aug. 16, 1996:
  - William B. King Jr., associate professor of psychology;
  - Linda J. Palm, associate professor of psychology; and
  - Marchita Phifer, assistant librarian.

· The board approved sabbatical leave for Wade Baird, professor of psychology, and for Subhash Saxena, professor of mathematics, for fall 1996 and the 1996-1997 academic year, respectively.

• Joseph E. Cicero, professor of mathematics, has been named distinguished professor emeritus; and Albert B. Cannon, assistant professor of mathematics, has been named emeritus professor. Cicero and Cannon will be recognized during May commencement.

• Writer Jonathan Kozol will receive the honorary degree Doctor of Public Service and Georgia State University Professor of English William Alfred Sessions will receive the honorary degree Doctor of Humane Letters during May commencement. Kozol, who has been an influential voice for educational reform through his passionate, widely-read and award-winning books, will deliver the commencement address.

The next meeting of the board will be Friday, June 21 at 9 a.m. in the Wall School of Business Board Room. ♦

encompassing the Grand Strand's tourism industry; and the establishment of educational links with local high schools, which will involve approximately 120 Horry County high school students in a four-year program exposing them to the value of higher education and its relevance to success in the modern business world.

Barr says university faculty traditionally tend to focus upon specific research which they feel will best serve the needs of a particular academic discipline. "But given the external pressures and the rising costs of education, this flexibility is no longer feasible. Faculty members must continue to conduct research but must direct their efforts toward the mission of the school and the community it serves," said Barr. "This initiative will begin that process."

Barr joined the Coastal faculty in 1987. He earned a doctorate in business administration from Louisiana Tech University in 1985; a master's degree in business


